News from the classrooms this week! Let's take a look at what the children have been up to across the school...

## Nursery

Growing in confidence, the Nursery children have continued their transition visits to the Nursery classroom. They are becoming more familiar with the environment and are beginning to show some great independence by accessing their own water bottles. The 3 hour Nursery sessions are back to normal next week, from 8:45am – 11.45am for all children.

## Reception

The children in Reception have had another great week. We continue to be impressed with how brilliantly the children have settled in and their excellent learning attitudes! They have enjoyed taking part in our circle time activities and were all eager to talk about some of their favourite things, having lots to say! The children have also enjoyed staying for school lunch this week and have been absolute superstars, adapting to the lunchtime routine fantastically. We are so excited for next week as the children will be spending the whole day at school, which means more time for fun learning!

## Year 1

This week the Year 1 children have been working extremely hard in their learning. They are becoming much more independent when coming in, in the morning and have now become super speedy hand-washers! This week the children have had Power Maths lessons every day. They have worked exceptionally hard in them and have shown Miss Martin-Mills how fantastically they can work

independently! Miss Martin-Mills is also ecstatic to see how many children in Year 1 have been reading every evening – amazing! Keep up the great work children, you are all superstars!

## **Year 2**

This week Year 2 have been very enthusiastic and have worked extremely hard. In Maths, we have been learning about numbers to 50. In English, we have started learning about traditional tales. Our first story is 'The Gingerbread Man'. This week we have also had our first Forest School session and started our science learning. Well done Year 2 on a fantastic week!



## **Year 3**

Year 3 have had a fantastic week this week! They have completed 5 lessons of their first Power Maths unit on Place Value. They have also started to look at our guided reading text Charlotte's Web and have begun to predict what they think is going to happen in the story. The children have enjoyed starting our science unit on Rocks. They have learnt about the different types of rock and have been able to sort them into categories such as man-made and natural and igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic. The year 3 class have such a positive attitude towards their learning and have worked incredibly hard! It has been a great week – well done Year 3!

## **Year 4**

Year 4 have really enjoyed this week. We have been tasting chocolate in preparation of creating our own Willy Wonka chocolate bar. The children will be writing a descriptive recount next week which I cannot wait to read. In Science this week, the children have been learning about the human digestive system and the functions of the different parts. An amazing week!

## **Year 5**



Year 5 have had another great week and have shown how resilient they are. We have started the week by recapping our understanding of rounding numbers before moving on to applying it when rounding numbers to the nearest 100,000. In English, we have begun learning about performance poetry and are excited to begin writing our own next week. We have also had a fantastic afternoon learning all about 'dancing raisins'.

## **Year 6**

Year 6 have had a busy week and every pupil should be proud of their efforts and how well they have settled back into routine. In maths, we have been looking at the place value in numbers up to 10,000,000 and rounding these numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000. We have started a new unit in English and have been studying a classic poem called The Raven by Edgar Allen Poe. We have been using evidence from the text to support our inferences and we have also been exploring the challenging vocabulary. During the afternoon sessions, we have started to look at our topic, World War Two, in more detail. Well done Year 6, a great week!

## Burton's Local Outbreak Control Plan

To help curb the spread of coronavirus in Burton, Staffordshire County Council have updated advice from immediate effect, as stated below. To help support this advice could we also be mindful when following our own school guidelines. Could I remind you please that there should only be one parent dropping off or collecting at the end of the day. Avoid congregating around the school gates by making a swift get away and ensuring that our timings are fully adhered to, this will eliminate any unnecessary time, waiting for your child. Thank you for your help in protecting everyone in our community.

### START

**8.45am – 8.55am: Children with surnames A – L** (for siblings, key stage 2 pupils to be dropped off at the junior gate first, then key stage 1 at the infant gate, followed by Reception pupils at the EYFS gate)

**8.55am – 9.05am: Children with surnames M – Z** (for siblings, key stage 2 pupils to be dropped off at the junior gate first, then key stage 1 at the infant gate, followed by Reception pupils at the EYFS gate)

### FINISH

**3.20pm: Children with surnames A – L** (for siblings, key stage 1 pupils to be picked up at the infant gate first, then key stage 2 at the junior gate)

**3.20pm: All Reception pupils** (EYFS Gate)

**3.30pm: Children with surnames M – Z** (for siblings, key stage 1 pupils to be picked up at the infant gate first, then key stage 2 at the junior gate)

1. **Cases and close contacts:** *Anyone who gets symptoms must stay home for ten days and get a Covid-19 test. Close contacts must stay at home for 14 days. Spot checks will be made to make sure people are in*
2. **At home:** *Your household can meet one other household per week with a maximum of ten people at a gathering*
3. **In gardens:** *You can meet outdoors with up to six people from other households or up to ten people if everyone is from only two households*
4. **Extremely vulnerable:** *Any residents who have recently been 'shielding' should continue to take extra care*
5. **Face coverings:** *Must be worn on public transport and in shops.*
6. **Organised indoor gatherings:** *This includes weddings, funerals, religious ceremonies, activity clubs and support groups. Maximum of 30 people and precautions to be taken*
7. **Organised outdoor gatherings and events:** *Keep your space at least 2 metres, follow stringent hygiene and keep records of who attended*
8. **Businesses:** *Must follow the national advice. Spot checks and penalties and even closure for those who flout rules*
9. **Shops:** *Small local shops should allow no more than two customers at one time*
10. **Pubs, bars and restaurants:** *Groups of no more than two households and a maximum of ten people indoors. Contact details must be left*

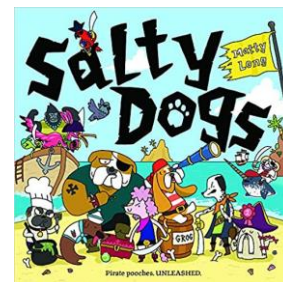
## Reading Corner
