Snow & Extreme Weather Procedures

With an arctic cold snap fast approaching, please could we remind all our families about the school's procedures should we receive substantial snowfall and extreme weathers. The school will endeavour to remain open in the first instance and closing the school will only ever be chosen in the final instance. Please can I ask that you do not contact the school office asking if we are open, as we will always use our main methods of communication in the event of such a decision. You will all receive a text

message, and the school Twitter account will also be used to state that this decision has been made. Please ensure that the school office has up-to-date contact details for you. We hope that we are not required to close but such a decision must take into consideration many factors, not just the amount of snow on the school grounds. For example, the safety of parents and families on their journey to school, the staff and their journey to school (many of whom travel some considerable distances through remote areas) and, of course, the weather forecast, and Met Office advice all play a part. I hope that this clarifies our procedures for you and many thanks for your understanding in this matter.

Punctuality

At Shobnall Primary & Nursery School, we monitor punctuality as well as attendance. The law treats some persistent lateness in the same way as irregular attendance and parents may be prosecuted by the Local Authority if late arrival is not resolved. The school gates open daily at 8:45am

It's a new year and the perfect time to make sustainable resolutions to do your bit for the environment! You could start with:


> Reducing your meat and dairy intake can help to reduce your impact on the environment. Why not try a meat free Monday? Choosing local

Nursery

We have had a fantastic first week back in Nursery! It has been wonderful hearing all about the children's Christmas fun and they have all had something to share and lots of questions to ask.

Our new topic 'All Aboard!' has begun this week with a story called, 'Zoom Rocket Zoom' and there has been some fantastic story telling going on. The children have also completed a



range of space-based activities based on our story and the children have been sharing their fun facts about space and aliens!

On Thursday, the aliens arrived in Nursery and left an explosion of peas! The children used their fine motor skills to carefully pick up the peas with their spoons to put inside the plastic bottles and had lots of fun!

A wonderful start to the spring term – Nursery, you are amazing!

Reception

Reception Adventures this week...

We have had a fantastic start to the spring term! On Monday we returned to school with big smiles and full of wonderful news to share from our holidays! It was fun listening to each other's New Year's Eve celebrations and we discussed the tradition of New Year's resolutions. We all thought carefully about what we would like to try or do better at this year.

We also began exploring the Arctic as part of our new topic, 'On the High Seas!' We have been mesmerised by the beautiful scenes of this very special part of the world and shared our thoughts and questions...

"People can't live there it's too cold for them." (Ava. T)

"Are the polar bears cuddly?" (Fred)

We created some exciting paintings of polar bears and wrote messages to the baby cubs to find out more about their homes. We are looking forward to continuing our arctic adventure next week...

Year 1

What a fantastic first week back for Year 1! We have hit the ground running with our learning and the children have thoroughly enjoyed the week. In English, we have started our new unit of writing, which is based on instructions. The children have been exploring the model text as well as looking at the order in which instructions are written. We also had a go at following instructions to make our own rainsticks. In Maths, we have been looking at counting forwards and backwards to 20 as well as understanding the numbers 10, 11,12 and 13. We have been learning all about tens frames and how 11 is 10 + 1 and 12 is 10 + 2, etc. In our afternoon sessions, we have been using Beebots in Computing and looking at our body in Science. We also had our first Forest School session, which was extremely muddy, but we all had a marvellous time and are looking forward to next week already. Well done, Year 1!

Year 2

Year 2 have had a great week back! In English they have been continuing to write their non-chronological report on a member of the Royal Family. The children really enjoyed using the iPads to research their chosen member. In maths this week the children have started their shape unit. They have enjoyed exploring the properties of 2D and 3D shapes. In DT this week the children have enjoyed making delicious, healthy wraps. The children practiced their chopping, snipping, spreading, and grating skills. They also taste tested ingredients before selecting their final design. Well done Year 2 on a great first week back!

Year 3

Year 3 have had a fab week back! They have been working hard in Maths to solve division with remainders. In English they have written a diary entry based on our new text, 'The Cave Challenge!' During guided reading we have started our new text, 'The Iron Man' and we have made predictions. We have also started our new French unit, learning about colours. Well done for a great week!

Year 4

Year 4 have had a wonderful first week back. It has been so lovely to hear about what the children got up to over the Christmas break and I have been so impressed with their attitude to learning this week after two weeks off! In maths, we have continued with our multiplication and division unit and the children have been identifying multiplication and division facts. In our new English unit, we have been researching about Banksy and identifying why some people see him as a vandal and others see him as an artist. The children loved taking part in a debate towards the end of the week to express their own opinions on the matter! In Science, we have been looking at states of matter and we have been identifying the make-up of particles inside a solid, liquid and gas. Finally, I have been blown away by the timetables knowledge that the children are currently showing! Keep it up Year 4. A wonderful first week back!



Year 5

Year 5 have come back from the New Year raring to go! In Maths the children have continued their learning on fractions, which includes adding and subtracting mixed number fractions. In English, Year 5 have started a new unit called 'Visit Yorkshire!', within their learning this week, the children have learnt what constitutes a persuasive text, identified features within the text, learnt new Tier 2 and Tier 3 vocabulary as well as using etymology and morphology to help them spell new words. Miss Hyden (our new student teacher) introduced the children to their new history topic on Thursday afternoon, where the children created a timeline of Burton-Upon-Trent's history.

Year 6

What a great first week back! It was so lovely to see all the children looking refreshed and ready to learn. The children have returned to school with a fantastic attitude to learning ready for all the hard work that this term brings. In Maths, we began our new topic on ratio and proportion and the children have really enjoyed exploring the ratio of scale drawings and seeing how this relates to real life. In English, we have started a new topic, looking at poetry and in particular one poem about a river's journey. We have explored a range of figurative language and cannot wait to start our own poems. In Science, we started our new topic on Evolution and Inheritance and explored how offspring vary and are not identical to their parents. A great week, well done Year 6!


Reading Corner



What Children & Young People Need to Know about

FRESIVE HATE SPECH SPECH

Everyone in the UK has the right of "freedom of expression". That's the right to voice your opinions and share information and ideas with others. It's not the right to say whatever you want without regard for others' feelings and values. We all have a responsibility to use this right properly: being respectful and inclusive to those around us, rather than making offensive and threatening remarks. That's called 'hate speech' and knowing the difference is incredibly important.

Free speech is a person's legal right to share information, opinions and ideas without fear of retaliation, censorship or legal consequences.
This freedom of expression is recognised in international human rights legislation, and here's what it does for us in our day-to-day lives ...

The Human Rights Act 1988 states that everyone has the right to express themselves freely – even if their views are unpopular and might offend others.



Freedom of expression encourages
listening to others and allowing opposing
views to be heard. It's important to respect
someone's opinion, even if we disagree
with it. Free speech lets us engage in
meaningful discussions with people who
feel differently.

Any concept could potentially offend someone. Galileo's theories were incredibly offensive to many at the time, while not everyone agrees with Darwin, even today. A frequent exchange of ideas is vitally important for a healthy society.

FKEEDUM



Freedom of expression includes the right not to do something, like not standing up for – or singing – the national anthem.

Even though some people would find that offensive, it isn't illegal. By law, nobody can force you to say anything you don't want to.

Free speech is a powerful tool for change, justice and reform. Many modern UK rights – such as women being allowed to vote, decent working conditions or same-sex marriage – couldn't have been achieved without it.

Hate speech refers to any communication – like talking, texting or posting online – that negatively targets a group or an individual because they are perceived to be different in some way. Demonising and dehumanising statements, threats, identity-based insults, offensive name-calling and slurs would all count as hate speech. Here are some common forms it takes...

Targeting people or groups because of a protected characteristic – like race, gender identity, sexuality, nationality, religion or a disability – and verbally abusing them with slurs and name-calling. The Equality Act 2010 has more information on this.

Content that dehumanises people based on the same characteristics: referring to them as if they were animals, objects or other non-human entities, for example. Separating the target from other human beings is usually an attempt to justify the speaker's bigotry.



Calling for violence or hatred against certain people or groups and justifying and glorifying those actions. Suggesting that a certain group should be removed from society could be seen as a call to arms, for example – potentially putting people from that group in danger.

Claiming that specific types of people are physically, mentally or morally inferior (or even that they are criminals) to encourage others to view them in the same way. This kind of thinking is always incorrect – but can be incredibly harmful to the group in question.



Spreading damaging misinformation about a person or group that the speaker views as "different" – essentially, trying to turn others against them by lying. Someone might claim that a recent tragedy is the fault of this entire group, when this is simply not possible.

Promoting the segregation of certain groups, or discrimination against them, because of who they are. This has been illegal in the UK for a long time – but some people still try to promote the exclusion of others, which can cause a huge amount of distress.
