

Dear Parents/Carers.

With only a week to go until the end of the academic year, the newsletter remains as full and as action-packed as ever!





Final rehearsals have been taking place for the forthcoming junior production (Years 4 - 6 inclusive) of 'Peter Pan'. It promises to be a great show! Tickets will be sold on a first come, first served basis and families are now free to purchase any additional seats they require. Remember, there are two productions, 1.30pm and 6.00pm. Tickets for the 1.30pm performance will cost £7.00 each and tickets for the 6pm performance will cost £8.00 each.

Next week's newsletter will be the final one of the year and will be as full as ever with plenty of events happening in school, including the Nursery Graduation on Wednesday and the Year 6 Leavers' Assembly on Thursday.

School Assessment Results

As the year draws to a close, we are finally able to share with all stakeholders the incredible success that we have achieved with the results of all the statutory assessments our pupils have been required to complete. We are always proud of our pupils and celebrate their achievements both in and out of the classroom but the results that they have obtained this year truly are fabulous!

The full validated results and comparisons with local and national statistics will be published on our school website imminently, but the main headlines are tremendous. Our reception pupils have scored an exceptionally high Good Level of Development (GLD) that showcases the quality of the provision they



have experienced over the course of the year. 93% of our year 1 pupils successfully passed the Phonics Screening Check in June and are now ready to become fluent and competent readers.

Year 2 SATs results were also amazing and have been validated through a robust moderation process with 83% of our pupils achieving the expected standard in reading (37% of the cohort achieving greater depth), 83% achieving the expected standard in writing

(37% of the cohort achieving greater depth) and 87% achieving the expected standard in maths (30% of the cohort achieving greater depth).

Our year 4 pupils completed the Multiplication Tables Check (MTC) and achieved an average score of 24 out of 25, with 67% of the cohort achieving full marks. Wow!

And finally, the year 6 children have again blown us away with their SATs results! 97% of our children met the national standard in reading, with 72% working at greater depth. 97% met national standard in spelling, punctuation, and grammar, with 45% working at greater depth, 93% achieved the expected standard in writing with 31% working at greater depth and 97% met or exceeded the national standard in mathematics, with 45% working at greater depth.

All these results are amazing and are not only down to the children and staff at school, but you as well. From regular reading at home, spelling support, phonics practice, homework etc, the list goes on. On behalf of the school, I would like to pass on my sincerest thanks and gratitude to all of you, who play such a vital and significant role in the achievement of our wonderful children.



Ready, Set, Read! The Summer Reading Challenge 2023

Don't forget, the Summer Reading Challenge 2023 has started in Staffordshire Libraries. Please pop into your local library to sign up for free and remember, the challenge runs until 11 September.

If children are not a member of the library, then joining is free and parents / carers can also join their child online through Staffordshire Libraries website or in person at any Staffordshire Library.

Remember, our school is also eligible to take part in the Burton & Uttoxeter Libraries' Summer Reading Challenge Cup. The school that has the highest percentage of children on roll taking part in the

Summer Reading Challenge will receive a trophy to keep in school and £150 to spend on books for school with H & H Spaldings of Barton under Needwood! We would love as many children as possible to get involved with this! Happy reading!

Year 1

Year 1 have had a great week! In Maths they have been learning how to tell the time to the hour and half past the hour. They have done so well with this! In English we have been going over spelling and grammar rules and we have also been having extra pre cursive handwriting

practice. In History we have been learning about Christopher Columbus and his significance before comparing him to Neil Armstrong.



Year 2

Despite it being the penultimate week term, year 2 are still doing lots of learning! On Monday, the children enjoyed an art day where they looked at the work of Claude Monet. Year 2 created doublepage spreads about Monet's work and practiced impressionist painting techniques which included stippling, hatching, cross hatching and dry-brush washing.

All the children were then able to implement these techniques in their final piece where they created an impressionist style sunset painting. They were truly beautiful! In guided reading, year 2 created persuasive posters to convince Maud (from The Worst Witch) to buy a new broomstick, as well as book reviews upon the completion of the book. On Friday, Year 2 enjoyed a DT day where they had to create a stable chair for Baby Bear to sit on. It took a lot of patience, an understanding of stable and unstable 3D shapes, joining techniques and teamwork, but all the children were able to successfully create a chair!

Year 3

Year 3 have had a great week learning all about pictograms, bar charts and tables. The children have thoroughly enjoyed being able to collect data as well as being able to choose the correct way to present their data. In English, the children have been looking at poetry and learning about specific poetic terminology and structures. In our afternoons, we have been finishing our learning about Sikhism, The Iron Age and Computing.

Year 4

Year 4 have had a fantastic penultimate week of the year! In children maths, the have completed their final unit looking at coordinates and position, and I have been so impressed with how well all of the children understood how to plot points on a graph and their ability to be able to read a graph. Elsewhere this week, we have continued with our brewhouse performance



rehearsals in preparation for our performance next week! In particular, on Thursday, the children had their dress rehearsal in front of the rest of the school in preparation for the final show, which is now only days away! The children have also completed their final piece of art creating a piece of abstract artwork in the style of Wassily Kandinsky which looked amazing! A brilliant week again!

The children have enjoyed their penultimate week in school where they have been in full swing of Peter Pan rehearsals. The children have been practising their words for the songs and remembering their actions too! They enjoyed their dress rehearsal in front of the whole school on Thursday.

In English, the children have been researching facts about Elvis Presley to help them write their introductions for a magazine report.

The children have been finding the difference between negative numbers in Maths. They have moved onto their final topic on measures, looking at converting millimetres to metres and millilitres to litres. The children have had to remember lots - how to multiply by 10, 100 and 1000 and how they can use their place value understanding to help them (particularly with decimals).

their art day next week - considering different layouts for their sketch books and how to present their work.

Year 6

What an amazing week Year 6 have had! On Tuesday, they got their SATs results, and I am incredibly proud of each and every one of them. They all should be super proud of themselves too as they have done fantastically well. We have been busy finalising the final few finishing touches to our Peter Pan performance ready for next week and cannot wait to share it with you. We felt very adult this week where we were investigating basic rate tax and hourly rates in Maths. In English, we were persuading our fellow classmates as to what item of disgust or annoyance were to be banished to Room 101. We finished the week with a great forest school session where we made smores and fried halloumi.




Child Death Prevention Newsletter



This newsletter is designed to raise awareness of the work of the Stoke-on-Trent and Staffordshire Child Death Overview Panel (CDOP) and to bring news on our ongoing campaigns

Tragically a number of Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent children have died on our roads as pedestrians, cyclists, drivers and passengers in cars

Road Safety Reminders



Young children

- Hold your child's hand, particularly when crossing.
- Use footpaths and let your child know the pavements is for people and the road is for vehicles.
- Lead by example, show your child that you are making safe choices using safe places to cross and not taking risks.
- Start to introduce the Green Cross Code. Talk about stop, look, listen, and think before crossing the road.

Learning independence

 The age that children can start to walk to school alone depends on their confidence, the environment and distance.

• Practice the route together before they walk it alone, stick to safe pavements.

- Electric cars can be very quiet at low speed
- Discuss safe places to cross
- Make sure that phones, devices, and earphones are away during the walk
- Sign your child up for cycling proficiency courses
- Wear a helmet if cycling or scootering!





Older children and teens

- This age group will be aware of road safety, but may still need reminding of some aspects.
- Mobile phones can be a big distraction, do not use phones when walking, air pods can prevent you from hearing traffic.
- Follow correct safety advice for cycling. E-scooters are not legal to use on the road.
- Just as with driving, alcohol and drugs can impair reactions.
- Be seen in the dark, wear light or reflective clothing, choose well-lit routes when possible.
- Face oncoming traffic if you are walking on a road with no pavement, you will be able to see vehicles approach and act.

Young drivers

- At 16 years old, you can apply for a provisional licence for certain mopeds.
- Teens can learn to drive after their 17th birthday and need to develop their road safety further.
- Young drivers are more likely to have an accident when the car is full of other young people, do not feel pressured into offering lifts or driving dangerously.
- Mobile phones can be distracting, make sure your phone is away and on silent whilst driving.
- Road conditions and visibility can be poor in the dark and bad weather
- Do not drive if you have been drinking alcohol or taking drugs.
- New drivers will have their licence cancelled if they get 6 or more points in 2 years.

All schools in Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent are offered free road safety education commissioned by SSRP and delivered by Staffordshire County Council's road safety education officers

BE WATER AWARE

Drowning prevention and water safety

Don't be tempted to cool off in Rivers, Canals, Lakes or Reservoirs as swimming in open water can result in drowning

If you see someone in the water

- Call 999 and ask for fire and ambulance. Ask for the Coastguard if by the sea.
- Location give as much information on your location, look for landmarks, signs or bridges or use WHAT THREE WORDS service to find your location.

- Stay on the telephone to the emergency services.
- Tell the person in the water to float on their back, extend arms & legs & to move hands and feet to stay afloat.
- Use lifesaving equipment such as lifebuoy or throw line if close by.
- NEVER ENTER THE WATER TO SAVE SOMEONE ELSE or an ANIMAL

During the school holidays, and in particular in hot weather, increasing numbers of children are drowning. On average, there are 50 of these tragedies each year in the U.K.

Keep reading to see our top tips on how to stay safe around open water.



Water is often far deeper than people think. Only swim where there is supervision or a lifeguard. Water that looks calm on the surface may have a fast current underneath.



It's very cold and can quickly cause cramp and breathing difficulties. Cold water shock can paralyse your ability to move and kill within a minute



The depth of water can be deceptive and may contain hidden rubbish and debris such as shopping trolleys or broken glass which can cause injuries and drowning.



Sometimes it can be polluted and make you ill. There is a serious risk of waterborne diseases
