#### **Online Safety Tips**

Behind video-sharing platforms (like YouTube) and streaming TV shows and movies, gaming is the third most popular online activity for children in the UK.

In fact, according to recent data from Ofcom, an overwhelming 89% of children aged 3 to 17 play video games. Of those, more than one in five (22%) talk to other players online who they don't know outside the game.

The risk of contact from strangers is just one of the reasons that many parents are concerned about their child's gaming: increased screen time, inappropriate content and in-game spending also figure among the most frequent fears.

Agreeing on some rules around your child's gaming activities can certainly help, and our guide has some useful tips for establishing these boundaries.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

#### **Nursery**

Our nursery children have been absolute superstars with how well they have settled without their parents for the first time! They have all shown great independence by saying their goodbyes at the gate whilst

coming into nursery in the mornings. They have even remembered where to put their water bottles and book bags as they come in! How amazing is this! All the children should be proud of the brilliant start they have made in nursery.

#### Reception

Our adventures in reception this week....

We arrived at school on Monday to find we had a removal delivery. It was great fun unpacking the boxes and finding lots of fantastic items for our house. We had a big surprise when the Big Bad Wolf was found in one of the boxes! Don't worry - he has been behaving himself and helping to make cups of tea!

It has also been a week filled with love as we had a wonderful time sharing the story 'One Love' by Cedella Marley and joined in with the song by Bob Marley. We had great fun dancing and making up some actions.

We went onto decorate some hearts using a variety of craft materials. We were very creative, and all our hearts look different some have feathers, buttons, handprints, sticks etc.

The heart theme continued as we baked biscuits. We carefully measured ingredients using scales and had to stir the mixture well so we could roll it out. The best part was using icing and sprinkles to decorate!

We made a great start on our half term focus book 'The Three Little Pigs,' and have enjoyed retelling the story using our story map and actions. We are excited to have even more adventures with this story next week!

#### Year 1

Year 1 have been working extremely hard this week. In Maths, we have continued with learning how to count and recognise numbers within 10. In English, we have been continuing our learning about 'The Gingerbread Man' and the children have been retelling the story and looking more closely at our Tier 2 and Tier 3 vocabulary. We have also started our PSHE learning about why it is good to be me as well as where we feel safest. The children have also enjoyed their first Science lesson looking at different materials.



#### Year 2



Year 2 have had a great week getting stuck in with their learning. In English, we have been focusing on the story Chicken Licken. They have been re-telling the story through drama, sequencing story cards and drawing story maps. This is in preparation for them to write their own journey story. In maths we have been exploring place value and using our knowledge of counting in 10's to find 10's and 1's within numbers. For science this week we have been focusing on everyday materials and their properties. The children have explored vocabulary such as suitability, object and material. Well done Year 2 on working hard this week!

#### Year 3

Year 3 have had a fab week! We have been working hard on place value in Maths and have been partitioning numbers into 100s, 10s and 1s. We have been using descriptive writing skills in English and

have planned our own version of a folk tale. In History, we have been looking at the Stone Age and created a timeline of events. Well done for a great week!





#### Year 4

Wow, what a great week! All the children have been working hard and I have been so impressed with all of them in all aspects of learning. The presentation of work is continuing to reach a really high standard and we have been looking at place value in Maths, Buddhism in RE and Lowry in Art. A fantastic first week in Year 4 children, keep up the great work!



#### Year 5

Year 5 have had another fantastic week of learning! In Maths, the children have been learning about partitioning numbers to 1,000,000 as well as investigating how many 1s/10s/1,000s/10,000s/100,000s go into a given number. In English, the children have had a SPAG focus, looking at homophones, homonyms and homographs, as well as how commas can be used to clarify and avoid ambiguity! 'Let's eat Grandma' and 'Let's eat, Grandma' certainly made us giggle. On Monday afternoon, Y5 tested the properties of materials in Science, including whether the material could conduct electricity or if it was

magnetic. The children have also been learning about biomes in their geography lessons this week, which included the very interesting fact that the North Pole is actually considered a desert due to the lack of rainfall. Keep up the great work Year 5!!

#### Year 6

We have had a very productive week this week in Year 6. We started the week with an RE lesson discussing what is meant by commitment and how this can sometimes be difficult to sustain. In maths we completed our unit on place value where we looked at numbers up to 10,000,000 and negative numbers. In English we revised relative clauses, modal verbs, and adverbs of possibility in preparation for using these language devices in our persuasive writing piece next week. As a class we found it very interesting looking into the key events of WW2 and began to think about how this impacted life in Britain. Some of the children even brought in their own WW2 books they have been reading



at home and have shared them with myself and the class. It is lovely to see such a love of learning happening in the classroom. A very positive start to Year 6!

# Top Tips for SETTING BOUNDARIES AROUND CAMING

If your child loves video games, then you'll probably be aware that how long they spend gaming – and what they're actually playing – can occasionally become a source of concern or conflict. The UK's trade body for interactive entertainment, Ukie, has recently launched a campaign to promote safer and more responsible gaming among young people – with parents and carers helping by setting sensible and fair boundaries. Our guide has tips on key areas where you could agree some healthy ground rules for your child's gaming activity.

# PROMOTE SAFER GAME CHOICES

Deciding which online games are OK – and which should be avoided – is tricky. Some titles allow children to cooperate or compete with strangers, which creates potential risks. Watching your child play online for a while could provide more insight into a particular game, while the parental controls on most consoles allow you to limit who can chat to your child or send them friend requests. Remind your child of the hazards around strangers online when you discuss this boundary with them.

## ENCOURAGE REGULAR BREAKS

Help your child understand the need to take regular breaks, playing in shorter bursts rather than marathon sessions. Bear in mind that some games (such as role-playing games) require time investment from the player, while others (online team games, for example) can't be stopped or paused at a moment's notice. A quick break every hour or so is good practice, and you could suggest some things to do in these breaks, such as having a drink of water or getting some fresh air.

### AGREE SPENDING LIMITS

There's no doubt that gaming can be expensive, and younger players often don't realise how much paying for digital items and subscriptions can add up to. Many young gamers love to buy new skins or upgrades for their character, so you could settle on a fixed amount that your child is allowed to spend on in-game items each week or month. This sort of boundary will not only help your child to manage their expectations but will also make you more aware of the price of these items.

## DISCUSS AGE RATINGS

18 CENSORED

Children often ignore the age ratings on games – or are unaware they even exist. If you're happy with your child playing a particular game even though it's rated above their age, then establish that as a boundary: emphasise that you've made an exception, and talk about what age ratings mean and why they're important. You could add context to this boundary by browsing games' boxes together while shopping, discussing why some games might have earned certain age ratings.

# Meet Our Expert

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# FACTOR IN FRIENDS

If your child is a keen video gamer, the chances are that they'll have other gamers among their social circle, too. When friends visit, do they instantly dash to their console or computer? You could put boundaries in place before their guests arrive by agreeing on a length of gaming time. Bear in mind, though, that they may try to extend this once they're together. Try coming up with activities or challenges for them during screen breaks – if they join in, they earn a little extra time on their game.

## ENJOY GAMING TOGETHER

Setting time aside to play video games together can be an enjoyable bonding exercise. Undeniably, some young gamers may be less enthusiastic about a parent or carer joining in, but it can be a productive way of encouraging them to share their hobby with you. Setting goals or tasks might be useful: if they love Minecraft, choose something to build together; if Fortnite's their favourite, ask to try out some of the fun game modes, like Prop Hunt, which don't require high skill levels.

# TALK ABOUT EMOTIONS

Help your child to monitor their emotions as they play. Discuss what is (and isn't) an acceptable level of competitiveness to show while gaming. Are they allowed to trash talk other players, for example? Can they notice when they get angry if they lose? Do they think these emotions are healthy? Some games can provoke anger, but others can bring joy, humour and the thrill of overcoming a challenge. Try to steer your child towards games that tend to produce these more positive feelings.

# BE PREPARED FOR TROLLS



A frequent problem when gaming online is other players who are deliberately troublesome. Make sure your child knows how to report and block someone who makes their experience a negative one. Between you, decide if or how they should deal with these online trolls. Talk about where your child's boundaries are in terms of what they think is acceptable: what behaviour by other users is merely frustrating, and what crosses the line to become upsetting or abusive.
