

To see if your child is up to date with their MMR vaccines, check your child's personal child health record (PCHR), known as the red book, or contact your GP practice. peaceful resolution that everyone can live with. This includes families and neighbour-to-neighbour. The



Online Safety Tips

Criminal organisations digitally 'launder' the illegal profits of their operations (including scams and drug deals) by moving funds through innocent-looking accounts, which makes it harder for the police to track.

To achieve this, they often recruit young people – money mules – who are trusting enough to be taken in by their advances and simply see an easy way to make some cash.

These impressionable youngsters are sometimes approached to take part in person – but more commonly it happens through social media, where the criminals use euphemistic titles like 'money transfer agencies'.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

Nursery

This week in Nursery we have continued with our superheroes theme and the children have continued to immerse themselves in imaginative play, dressing up, making their own props to go with their costumes and re-enacting their own stories as fictional superheroes. The children have been very creative this week and have demonstrated the skills they have acquired during their nursery year to create a picture of their own choice. We have really been impressed with the fictional superheroes they have created, and they have loved listening to the superpowers each child has given them! We have also been practising our events for Sports Day, learning about sun safety with the arrival of the summer sun and have been talking about our homes and what makes them special to us.

Reception

It has been a fun week in Reception as the children began the week with a very special Father's Day lunch. The children were very excited to be sharing their lunch with their dads and other male family members.

During the week the children explored their new theme, 'Bon Voyage!' They had lots of fun sharing their past holiday experiences as well as explaining what a holiday is. The children




have also enjoyed listening to the story 'Tiddler' and have produced some amazing writing of their own 'Tall Tale' to explain why we are late in the story Tiddler. In art this week, they have blown us away with their tremendous creativity as we have had lots of fun designing and making our fish from a plastic bottle.

On Thursday the children took part in the class assembly based on our topic 'A Bugs Life!' We were all so proud of the children as they shared their learning, dancing and singing to a packed audience. They truly were amazing and have grown so much since the last time they were on stage at Christmas!

The children worked hard on a special piece of art for Father's Day and used extra special handwriting to write a message. They were also all eager to share the different things they love about their dads.

Year 1

This week Year 1 have worked really hard on their phonics! They have been writing an explanation text about the lifecycle of a sunflower in English. They have enjoyed making predictions about their book in whole class guided reading sessions. In Geography, we have looked at positives and negatives of living in remote areas and children had a go at being weather forecast presenters. They did so well! Well done for a great week!



Year 2

Year 2 have had another brilliant week. In Maths they have cracked 'time' and are able to read the time to intervals of 5 minutes, calculate the amount of time between two periods and solve problems involving time. In English, Year 2 have written rhyming poems about a season of their choice. They have been able to use rhyming couplets and alliteration to make sure their stanzas are exciting to read. In the afternoons, the children have been exploring the enquiry question,

'Does going to mosque give Muslims a sense of belonging?'. It has been so lovely to hear the children's experiences of going to mosque and how it might compare to a Christian church.

Year 3

In Science this week we have been learning all about the parts of a plants by labelling the features. We also learnt about photosynthesis and how a plant can create its own food and nutrients. We had a lovely art afternoon on Monday where the children finished off their printing and created a fantastic two-page spread explaining all about the different printing techniques they have explored. In Maths, we have been learning to tell the time to the nearest minute on both an analogue and digital clock. The children have preserved with this tricky concept. Keep up the good work Year 3!

Year 4

We have had another brilliant week in Year 4. In English, the children have been looking at the etymology and morphology of words, which the children have found really interesting. In maths, the children have



shown a fantastic amount of resilience when focusing on our time unit, something that I know the children have found challenging. Elsewhere in the curriculum, the children have written a letter to the Prime Minster, Rishi Sunak, to explain the impact on the environment of transporting bananas and oranges into the country in one of our geography lessons. Finally, as a celebration for completing their multiplication check last week, the children enjoyed a game of rounders out on the field on Thursday afternoon. Another brilliant week Year 4. Well done!



Year 5

The children in Year 5 have started their new unit in science of 'Living Things and their Habitats'. They have enjoyed finding out about how plants reproduce and how seeds disperse.

The children have had to use a protractor in Maths this week to measure angles of several shapes. Despite some children finding this tricky, they have all been resilient. They have

had to recall the properties of 2D and 3D shapes, to help them decide if shapes are regular or irregular, and recall how many sides, faces and vertices they have.

In English, the children have been considering how the choice of words/phrases in their writing can have a greater impact on the reader. They've discussed how synonyms and adverbial phrases can change the meaning of sentences and tested this out in their own writing (some of the battle scene from 1066!).

Year 5 have also taken part in the JTMAT Reading Mastermind quiz - testing their knowledge of authors, book covers and their contents.

Year 6

In year 6 this week we have been busy rehearsing Peter Pan and learning the dances and songs. The children have worked so hard and are really looking forward to their performance in five weeks time. In English, we finished our explanation text and began revising the features of persuasive writing. We have decided to complete a letter persuading our parents to come and watch our performance. We have used lots of persuasive writing features such as, exaggeration, emotive language, and rhetorical questions. In science we looked at what we could do to reduce our energy consumption and in computing we used microbits. We finished the week creating natural viewfinders at Forest School.


This week's recommended read is for children aged 3+

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Money muling involves individuals - very frequently young people - being recruited to transfer illegally obtained funds into and out of their bank account on behalf of criminals (often without even realising that's thekind of activity they/ve become embroiled in), and usually being allowed to keep a certain amount for themselves. It's essentially a digital form of money laundering. This guide highlights some of the risks associated with money muling, and provides parents and carers with useful tips to helpsafeguardyoungpeople against becoming ensnared by this growing online hazard.

LEGAL REPERCUSSIONS

WHAT ARE

THE RISKS?

Young people may be lured by the promise of quick, easy money, but by doing so they will become unwitting participants in activities that can have severe legal and financial consequences. Money muling is a serious offence under UK law: involvement in such schemes can result in imprisonment and fines (or both). Remember, the threshold for criminal responsbility in the UK is 10 years of age.

ONLINE RECRUITMENT

Cyber-savvy criminals are increasingly using various online methods, including social media apps and gaming platforms, in their attempts to recruit young people as potential money mules. The criminals often deploy persuasive, deceptive tactics to gain children's initial interest and attention, then seek to exploit their trust and naivety. HELLO OSC4R to exploit their trust and naivety.

POSSIBLE EXPLOITATION

Money muling is frequently carried out in tandem with other organised criminal activities such as the drugs trade or human trafficking. Not only is money muling a criminal offence in its own right, therefore, but it could also expose young people to harmful situations as well as potentially putting them in contact with some extremely dangerous individuals.

FINANCIAL LOSSES

If they (even unknowingly) transfer funds that are traced back to criminal activities, back to criminal activities, money mules can face considerable financial losses: their bank may freeze their accounts, and they can be held liable for any illegally obtained funds. People involved in money muling often also find themselves at greater risk of becoming entangled in other forms of criminal financial exploitation and fraud.

LONG-TERM CONSEQUENCES

Involvement in money muling can have a lasting negative impact on a young person's reputation, education and employment prospects, and place colossal strain on their family life. A conviction for financial fraud would significantly damage a young person's future opportunities: they could be blocked from opening a bank account, taking out a mortgage or even securing a phone contract.

Advice for Parents & Carers

EDUCATE AND COMMUNICATE

Talk to your child about the risks and consequences of money muling, emphasising the importance of making informed decisions and seeking guidance if they need it. Create an open, non-judgmental space which encourages them to share their concerns and experiences, ensuring they feel comfortable getting help if they suspect they may nave become involved in money muling

MONITOR ONLINE ACTIVITIES

If you have concerns, you might want keep a closer than usual eye on your child's online presence, including their profiles on social media and any gaming platforms that they use. These can often sérve as useful early warning systems which might help you to detect any signs of attempted recruitment by criminals or other types of suspicious beĥaviour

TALK ABOUT MONEY

account

Discussions about avoiding being recruited as a money mule are also good opportunities for a refresher with your child about financial responsibility and good money management. It's also a helpful starting point for highlighting the importance of earning their money by honest means and the potential consequencés of getting involved in illegal activities, both online and of

STAY INFORMED

Criminals' methods and approaches to recruiting young people as money mules frequently evolve to reflect the online landscape. Try to stay aware of criminals' current tactics and make time to regularly check out resources provided by schools, law enforcement and financial organisations. The Don't Be Fooled Campaign (at www.moneymules.co.uk) has plenty of useful information and advice.

BBQ Safety



If you use a disposable barbeque

- Only use on an even surface such as concrete, bricks or paving slabs
- Place it well away from the house, shed or fences
- Allow several hours for the barbeque to cool before putting in the bin. Consider pouring water over it to make sure the fire is completely out
- Never leave a barbeque unattended, especially when there are children around.
- Ensure the barbeque is well away from sheds, fences, shrubs, trees & garden waste
- Keep children and pets away from the cooking area.
- Never light a barbeque with accelerants NEVER use petrol or white spirit
- Always keep water or sand nearby for emergencies.
- Allow several hours for the barbeque to cool
- Never use barbeques or campfires in the countryside as fire can easily spread
- One spark or an abandoned pile of embers can cause a wildfire
- Endangering our countryside, wildlife, property and putting people lives at risk
