# The King's Coronation

The Coronation of His Majesty The King will take place on Saturday 6 May 2023. The Coronation Ceremony will take place at Westminster Abbey, London, and will be conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Ceremony will see His Majesty King Charles III crowned alongside The Queen Consort. The Coronation will reflect the monarch's role today and look towards the future, while being rooted in longstanding traditions and pageantry. Over the course of the short three-day week prior to the Coronation, we will be engaging with a variety of activities to mark this momentous and very special, historical occasion...



<u>The Coronation Curriculum</u> – The children will be engaged in themed learning over the course of the week. As well as focusing on British Values in assemblies and in classrooms, the children will be exploring some history in learning about the life of King Charles III and the historical traditions associated with the coronation.

<u>Coronation Craft</u> – The children will be creating their own 'Coronation Corridor' in school with a collection of coronation craft, made and created by themselves, to celebrate this special occasion.

<u>Coronation Clothes</u> – On Friday 5 May 2023, children and staff will be allowed the opportunity to come dressed to school in their finest regalia, appropriate for a coronation or wear red, white and blue. The latter may be more appropriate as some classes have a PE or cricket session on this day.



Coronation Big Lunch – There will be a special coronation-themed menu (see attachment at the end of the newsletter) for the *whole* week, culminating in traditional street party food on Friday 5 May. We would love as many of the children (and staff) as possible to indulge...

Coronation Big Party – On Friday 5 May, we will be having a big party on the field, weather permitting in the afternoon. Children will be able to enjoy playing a variety of traditional games, music, and snacks to celebrate the King's Coronation!

<u>Coronation Gift</u> – The school has purchased a bespoke, specially designed pin badge to give to all the children and staff as a gift to commemorate His Majesty The King's Coronation at Shobnall Primary & Nursery School. These will be given out at the end of the school day on Friday 5 May.

Don't forget the wider programme of events and activities planned for His Majesty The King's Coronation, including a concert at Windsor Castle, street parties, The Big Help Out and an extra bank holiday for the weekend itself from Saturday 6 May to Monday 8 May 2023.

# **Eid al-Fitr**

Eid al-Fitr, also known as "Festival of Breaking the Fast," is the most prominent Islamic festival celebrated by 1.8 billion Muslims all over the world that marks the end of Ramadan, the Islamic holy month of fasting. Here are some other interesting facts about this holy festival:

Eid al-Fitr is the day of celebrating the happy end of Ramadan.



- Many sweet treats and delicacies are consumed to celebrate the sweet end of this holy month.
- The festival traditionally holds a three-day celebration which involves praying, feasting, family gatherings, exchanging gifts and helping the needy.
- Eid al-Fitr is a day of thanksgiving to Allah for showering the eternal blessings and giving all a chance to enjoy the blessings of the month of Ramadan.
- Zakat al-Fitr is a kind of donation where you lend a hand to the poor and needy conducting the charity at the end of the fasting month, Ramadan. Such a practice is done to cleanse a Muslim soul from any sins, committed during the month of Ramadan as well as for inner peace and happiness. This is the most beautiful part of this festival which is done with great love. Muslims shower the needy with great gifts, sweets, clothes and food items and bless their day with eternal joys.
- Like many festivals, Eid al-Fitr involves the practice of gifting. As we all know, gifts act as a perfect medium for expressing your emotions. Be it expressing the feelings of the heart or conveying the best wishes of the occasion; they are often given to increase the charm of the moment.
- Hillary Clinton hosted the first Eid al-Fitr at White House in 1996. Later, the Clintons continued the tradition every year after. The dinner was attended by the prominent members of the Muslim American community, including politicians, leaders and students. With the passage of time, the Eid al-Fitr dinner tradition has continued with every president. George W Bush and Barack Obama hosted the Ramadan dinner every year of their presidency.

# **Nursery**

This week in Nursery we have started our new topic, 'All Creatures Great and Small'. Having read the story Dear Zoo by Rod Campbell, we have discussed animals that would and would not make good pets and have met some pets that belong



to members of staff in school! Mrs France brought in Pippy, her



hamster. The children thoroughly enjoyed learning about how to look after him. They were very excited about their special visitors and enjoyed learning about the needs of different animals, as well as showing great care whilst petting them! This week the children have also had a great time in PE with Mr Attwood, learning how to copy and explore different movements.

# Reception

Reception have had an exciting start to the new term. It was fantastic to see them arrive to school eager to begin learning all about minibeasts for our new theme, 'It's a Bugs Life.' They have also started writing sentences and I am so impressed with how hard the children have been working in ensuring they

remember their capital letters at the beginning of a sentence, their finger spaces and a full stop at the end.

The children were very excited as we headed down to Forest School to begin our first session. I was very impressed with the children as they listened carefully to the various expectations such as, walking around





the fire circle and moving natural materials appropriately. They became explorers as they found a variety of minibeasts including a huge worm and beetle! They also created homes for the minibeasts they found using natural materials and joined in with games and songs. We can't wait for next week's session when we hope to bring some minibeasts back to the classroom!







# Year 1

Year 1 have had a lovely week! They have started their new English topic, writing descriptions about the seaside. In Maths they have been counting in 2s. We have focused on relationships with friends and family in PSHCE and have been focusing on appropriate and inappropriate physical contact. Well done Year 1 for a great week!

## Year 2

Year 2 have come back to school full of energy and ready for learning! In Maths, they got stuck straight into learning about fractions and have blown everyone away with their knowledge and how quickly they have grasped this new and tricky approach. In the lead up to SATS, Year 2 have been focusing on answering VIPERS questions about a variety of texts. They have been learning how to skim and scan large pieces of text to find the answers, as well as how to identify the key parts of questions. In the

afternoon, Year completed a computing unit of learning around pictograms and understanding data. They have been able to interpret tally charts, create pictograms and analyse data. Most excitingly, the class tadpoles returned from their holiday at the Keen household (many thanks to the Keen family for their expert care of our amphibian friends). The children have loved observing the changes in their growth, as well as watching them eat this week's snack of cucumber! What a week – keep up the great work Year 2!



# Year 3

Wow what a great first week Year 3 have had! As a class they have devised three key goals that they want to work towards, 1. respectful, 2. helpful and 3. outstanding. The children worked together in small groups to devise different words they could use and voted as a class what they felt was best. They then

devised definition for these words and rewards they could have if they achieved their goals. I am so impressed with how the children are trying really hard to achieve these on a daily basis. Well done Year 3! We have also started a new writing unit in English called, 'How do magnets help us?', the children are super excited to be able to begin learning about their explanation writing task. In Maths, we have begun our learning on 'mass' and the children have worked exceptionally hard at reading scales. We have also begun our new class text, 'The Iron Man' which the children have already produced some work for a class display. Keep up the fantastic work Year 3!

## Year 4

We have had a brilliant first week back in Year 4. In maths, the children have started their decimal unit and it has been brilliant to see the children have shown such a secure understanding of place value to be able to identify tenths and hundredths. In English, we have been identifying the features of a narrative explaining the dangers of electricity ready to write our own narrative in a couple of weeks sharing our own views on the dangers of electricity. Furthermore, across the curriculum in history, we have started our topic for this term on the Ancient Egyptians and the children have been plotting the most important events throughout this period onto a timeline. Finally, the children have been predicting the outcome of our new class text, The Firework-Makers Daughter and the children have been thoroughly engaged in discussing what the book could be about. A brilliant first week back Year 4!

# Year 5

Year 5 enjoyed the start to the term with a new topic in Science of Animals Including Humans. They created their own human life cycle. The children also had the pleasure of their first Forest School session with Mrs Johnston and Mrs Martin. It was beautiful weather for the children to enjoy the fresh air.

In Maths, the children have continued well with the decimals, fractions, and percentages unit.



They have been converting fractions to decimals and practising ordering and comparing them. Great confidence has been shown and they are using their vocabulary to explain their understanding.









We have introduced our new reading text, Journey to the River Sea by Eva Ibbotson. The children have used their inference and prediction skills to write about what they think happens in the story. They looked for clues in the images on the front cover and linked this to the blurb.

Our topic focus this week has been French. The children watched a video (all in French) about *le systeme solaire*. This topic on space exploration will enable the children to retrieve their learning in Science from last term too!

A great discussion was had during the RE lesson about actions and consequences. The children had to consider what the consequences could be to certain actions, and whether they were positive (good) or negative (bad).

# Year 6



This week in Year 6 we have been busy preparing for our SATs test in three weeks time. Not only have we been busy revising, but we have also started our new unit in English - recounts. We have based our recount on a music video called 'Titanium' and we are planning to write it in the first person, as if we were the boy from the video. We are really enjoying this and can't wait to produce the finished product. We finished the week with Computing, Music, and Science. We have also been lucky to have an extra PE lesson in cricket delivered by a visitor from Staffordshire Cricket.


This week's recommended read is for children aged 9+

# Drowning prevention and water safety

Don't be tempted to cool off in Rivers, Canals, Lakes or Reservoirs as swimming in open water can result in drowning

# If you see someone in the water

- Call 999 and ask for fire and ambulance. Ask for the Coastguard if by the sea.
- Location give as much information on your location, look for landmarks, signs or bridges or use WHAT THREE WORDS service to find your location.
- https://what3words.com/news/emergency/three-words-for-a-faster-emergency-response
- Stay on the telephone to the emergency services.
- Tell the person in the water to float on their back, extend arms & legs & to move hands and feet to stay afloat.
- Use lifesaving equipment such as lifebuoy or throw line if close by.
- NEVER ENTER THE WATER TO SAVE SOMEONE ELSE or an ANIMAL

During the school holidays, and in particular in hot weather, increasing numbers of children are drowning. On average, there are 50 of these tragedies each year in the U.K.

Keep reading to see our top tips on how to stay safe around open water.



Water is often far deeper than people think. Only swim where there is supervision or a lifeguard. Water that looks calm on the surface may have a fast current underneath.



It's very cold and can quickly cause cramp and breathing difficulties. Cold water shock can paralyse your ability to move and kill within a minute



The depth of water can be deceptive and may contain hidden rubbish and debris such as shopping trolleys or broken glass which can cause injuries and drowning.
