
The eventual winners of the Sports Day shield were **Claymills**, but for reference we have provided the final 'scores on the doors' for you below.

Ready, Set, Read! The Summer Reading Challenge 2023

It's that time of year again when we are approaching the start of the **Summer Reading Challenge**. The aim of the Challenge is to help encourage children to read during the summer holidays so that they maintain and improve their reading levels and interest in reading for pleasure. The Summer Reading Challenge can:

- Help to prevent the summer reading 'dip' for pupils.
- Ensure pupils are ready for their return to school in the autumn.
- Support the transition between year groups and key stages.
- Improve language skills, especially for those for whom English is a second language.

Presented by The Reading Agency. Delivered in partnership with libraries. From 8 July 2023, children aged 4 – 11 can join the Challenge for free at Burton Library, Uttoxeter Library, Barton Community Managed Library, or the Mobile Library that visits communities in those areas. The free Mini Challenge for children aged under 4 is also available so that they can have fun reading for pleasure too!

As usual, children will receive a collectors card , stickers, a certificate and a medal for participating in the Challenge.

Books read **must** be borrowed from a Staffordshire Library; this includes fiction and non-fiction, physical

books, audio

books and all reading formats borrowed through our e-library (this includes ebooks, e-audiobooks, e-comics and emagazines). Although children are encouraged to read 6 books during the summer holidays, this is flexible as we appreciate that for some children reading one book will be a big achievement for them whilst for others 6 books is not enough!

The Challenge will end this year on 11 September.

If children are not a member of the library, then joining is free and parents / carers can also join their child online through Staffordshire Libraries website or in person at any Staffordshire Library.

Our school is also eligible to take part in the Burton & Uttoxeter Libraries' Summer Reading Challenge Cup. The school that has the highest percentage of children on roll taking part in the Summer Reading Challenge will receive a trophy to keep in school and £150 to spend on books for school with H & H Spaldings of Barton under Needwood! We would love as many children as possible to get involved with this!

Due to the commitment of being Deputy Headteacher and SENDCo, she is stepping away from the classroom to ensure that she has the capacity to fulfil the demands of these very important roles. I know she is looking forward to the challenge!

Remember to Wear your Seatbelts!

You may not realise it, but this year is very special when it comes to seat belts as it's 40 years since it became legal for all drivers to wear a seat belt.

Although most people wear a seat belt for every trip, there are still a small number of people who don't, or who think they're not at risk on a short familiar route, so we're promoting the

#EveryTrip campaign to encourage everyone to wear a seat belt when travelling in a vehicle, no matter how short the journey.

Last year more than 800 people were found travelling in a vehicle in Staffordshire without wearing one. The majority of these seat belt offences, 686, were committed by the driver, and 91% of these drivers were men.

Unfortunately, you never know what might happen on your journey, and if you're involved in a crash you're twice as likely to die if you're not wearing a seat belt. A seat belt is designed to keep you in your seat and prevent or reduce injuries suffered in a crash.

A passenger not wearing a seat belt can be thrown forward and may injure other people in the car, as well as themselves. If the collision happens at 30mph they will hit the front seat, and anyone in it, with a force of 30 to 60 times their own body weight.

As well as the safety dangers, drivers and passengers can also face an on the spot fine of $\pounds100$ for not wearing a seat belt and this can increase to a maximum of $\pounds500$ if prosecuted.

Drivers also have a responsibility to make sure any children under the age of 14 are wearing a seat belt, or are in an appropriate child seat









if they're up to 12-years-old or 135 centimetres tall. You can check if you have the correct seat for your child <u>here</u>.

By belting up every time you're in a vehicle you're helping to keep everyone in your car safer, as well as other road users.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

Nursery

The nursery children have been exposed to so many different resources this week, starting with Sports Day on Monday, where they showed great resilience and determination whilst taking part in their physical activities. Later in the week, they worked together in groups to set up their own obstacle courses, giving instructions to others on how to navigate them. During this task they demonstrated great teamwork and pulled on all their experiential knowledge of using PE equipment and resources in the outdoor learning environment. Inside the classroom, further collaborative learning took place as the children chose a wide range of resources to represent a body. It was fantastic to see so many unique bodies being created, we certainly have great creativity in nursery!

Reception

It was an active start to the week as the reception class joined in with Sports Day! There was fun, laughter and competitiveness as the children took part in a variety of team races including football shoot, beanbag balance and hula hoop throw. The children all participated brilliantly, and we are extremely proud of them.

The holiday theme continued this week with the lovely 'What the Ladybird Heard on Holiday' by Julia Donaldson.

On Thursday, the children went on their summer walk across to Shobnall Fields and enjoyed looking for signs of summer. The children showed excellent observation skills and identified lots of signs of summer during the walk. The children have also recognised the affects the heat can have on our bodies and the importance of taking care of themselves by drinking lots of water, wearing sunhats and applying sun cream.

Year 1

This week year 1 have been working hard in maths to understand place value of numbers to 100. They have been working hard on finding 1 more and 1 less and comparing numbers using greater than and less than. In English, they followed instructions to make honey sandwiches! They enjoyed eating them too! In geography, they have been working hard on a fieldwork enquiry, investigating if we have enough plants on the field to attract wildlife. Well done year 1 for a great week!



Year 2

In Maths, Year 2 have started tackling the abstract concept of multi-step word problems. Although some of the lessons have been tricky, everyone persevered and used everything they have learnt this year to support them, including bridging, number bonds and inverse operations. In writing, the children have been learning about 'How to be Healthy'. Through this topic they have completed independent research, drafted sections for their information poster and next week they will be creating their posters - we can't wait to see the finished product! In the afternoons, Year 2 have been doing geography. They have completed fieldwork on the KS1 playground to analyse the human and physical features, using a grid reference to support their findings.



Year 3

Year 3 have been drafting and editing their hiking adventure story and we are so impressed with their writing stamina. The children have been continuing their learning about time and the difference between а digital and analogue clock. In geography, we have been learning all about volcanoes and even made some of our own! We also had our class assembly this week and all the staff in

Year 3 could not be any prouder of the hard work and dedication that the children have shown. Keep it up!

Year 4 have had another brilliant week this week. Firstly, what a fantastic afternoon all the children had on Monday for Sports Day! It was amazing to see the teamwork and sportsmanship shown by all the children on a fantastic afternoon. In maths this week, we have been learning about triangles, polygons and quadrilaterals and also learning about the different types of angles. In English, the children have been writing an information text about Ancient Egyptian homes and settlements and it has been really pleasing to see the children take their time and really think about how their writing is impacting the reader. Elsewhere this week, we have been practising our Brewhouse performance in the hall with year 5 and year 6 and it has been so pleasing to see that all of the children have been busy learning the songs at home. Finally, to finish the week, the children have had a final practice for their class assembly ready for next week. A fantastic week Year 4!

Year 5

An amazing Sports Day for Year 5 earlier this week. We were so impressed with their determination in the heat, and they worked well as part of a team.

In English this week, the children have been researching key events from the Battle of Hastings in preparation for writing a recount as a Norman soldier. The children were so enthusiastic, and they are excited about writing their final recount. They have begun their planning and have discussed how they think a Norman soldier would feel on the eve of the battle.



In Maths, the children finished have their topics and geometry have great shown understanding of shapes and using coordinates. Our new topic this week decimals and the is children have made a flying start being able to recall place value for each digit in a number and use this to check their understanding.

We have had our first rehearsal for the Brewhouse performance and the children have begun to showcase their singing skills!

Year 6

A very busy week for Year 6 this week. We have finished our descriptive writing piece basing our ideas on the film clip 'Francis' from Literacy Shed. This tense clip has proved to be a great stimulus for our writing. We have used a range of techniques to ensure our writing creates suspense and tension, using sentence starters and powerful adjectives. In maths we looked at problems involving shape (position and direction). We have been reading our whole class text 'Kensuke's Kingdom' and are excited to find out what happens next. The children performed amazingly well in their Brewhouse rehearsals this week. I am so proud of them all for the effort and dedication they put into this.





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What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Artificial intelligence – particularly in terms of how it generates natural language – has seen significant development over the last six months, with companies releasing new Al-based software or adding an Al element to existing apps (such as Snapchat, for example). One form of Alto become especially popular has been the 'Al friend' or chatbot, as children eagerly experiment with these new-found computer-generated companions. There are now numerous apps available with this 'virtual friend' functionality, with the likelihood of it being added to other successful platforms soon.

CONTENT AND ACCOUNTABILI

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Al chatbots may not always be able to recognise when content is age inappropriate or harmful and should be filtered out. So there's a possibility that children could be exposed to offensive language or explicit material while conversing with their virtual friend. The companies producing such AI solutions are also unlikely to take responsibility for any content that their algorithms generate.

REDUCED SOCIAL CONTACT

An excessive reliance on chatbots for social interaction could potentially cause a child to begin reducing the amount of face-to-face communication they have, leading to social isolation. If young people become dependent on chatbots to provide companionship, it could very likely hinder the development of their real-life social skills.

LACK OF SENSITIVITY

Chatbot software isn't always sophisticated enough to pick up on subtle emotional cues or recognise subtle emotional cues or recognise signs of distress in children, as most humans would. It might therefore fail to respond appropriately. Al misinterpreting what it's being told or replying insensitively to a young user who's already struggling could potentially impact a child's emotional wellbeing or exacerbate any existing emotional issues.

UNINTENTIONAL BIAS

Al companions are only as reliable as the information they've been programmed with. The algorithms they use, therefore, may unintentionally promote bias, stereotypes or discriminatory behaviour (as many originate from the USA or the UK, for instance, they can display a distinctly western-centric worldview). This could lead to children developing skewed attitudes and behaviours.

COGNITIVE **LIMITATIONS**



Although many are now undeniably advanced, Al-powered chatbots still have limitations in terms of understanding complex concepts, context and nuance. Depending heavily on chatbots to help with learning or solving problems may stunt the development of a child's own powers of critical thinking, creativity and ability to engage in open-ended discussions with other people.

PRIVACY CONCERNS

Chatbots typically collect data about users, including personal information and conversations. This is ostensibly to improve their performance as they gradually learn about our behaviour – but many experts are warning that there may be significant risks associated with how this information is stored and used (the possibility of potential breaches or misuse by third parties, for instance)

Advice for Parents & Carers

CREATE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT

If your child is keen to engage with AI chatbots, encourage them to do so in a safe environment: ideally in a shared space at home, so you can easily keep an eye and ear on their progress. Set up appropriate content filtering measures in close by and ready to help with any questions or concerns that may arise.

FIND A BALANCE

Work alongside your child to establish the right balance in terms of how they might use AI-powered chatbots – and when it's appropriate. It's important to make sure that children are still getting plenty of opportunities to learn to solve problems for skills through face-to-face conversations with friends, family members and teachers.

CHAT ABOUT CHATBOTS

If your child is already expressing an interest in Al apps, a relaxed, natural chat should help you to discover which ones they're aware of and how they're using them (or are planning to). Discuss these options with your child and perhaps do your own research to ensure you think they're suitable. Once you're totally happy, you could sit with your young one and begin exploring AI chatbots together.

TAKE CONTROL

As with any form of app or game, when it comes to AI chatbots we'd strongly recommend that you consider employing parental controls (either on the device being used or within the software itself) to manage which apps your child can download and use. This is particularly important for younger children, who may be more at risk of being upset or frightened by inappropriate content.

RECOGNISE THE RISKS

It's unlikely that most children will have even considered the potential risks attached to having a virtual companion. So it's probably wise to explain some of the possible hazards and challenges of AI chatbots to your child. In particular, emphasise that AI isn't a real person (however much it might sound like one) and may occasionally tell them something that isn't entirely impartial or accurate.
