# Shobnall PFA Christmas Market – Friday 1 December 2023, 3.30 – 5.30pm

The PFA Christmas Market is only a week away and we look forward to seeing as many of you there as possible! It promises to be a great event and I must express my sincerest thanks to the PFA, who have been working tirelessly to make this event extra special and even better that last year!

Please refer to the letter, which was emailed to you last week, if you are planning to attend which outlines in more detail the plans and stalls that will be there. We hope that you can come along and support.

To help with the last-minute preparations for the event, here are some reminders from the PFA:

- ▲ The PFA will be running a 'street food' stall at the Christmas Market. If you are able to donate any cakes or Asian food, the PFA would be very grateful if this could be labelled with ingredients to support those with allergies. Also, if possible, please could you indicate if it is suitable for vegetarians or not? They ask that these are donated on the morning of the Market, so that all food products are as fresh as possible and will ensure that any containers are returned to you the following week via your child. In the guide, you'll find tips on a number of potential risks such as ageinappropriate content, dangerous challenges and contact with strangers.

Remember, <u>every pupil</u>, <u>every day</u>! Thank you for your support.






#### **FREE Uniform!**

#### Nursery

Our adventures in nursery this week...

The Nativity preparations have begun and the children in nursery have been working so hard singing the songs and remembering their parts! We have also been on the stage for the first time, and we are so impressed with how well they all sat during the rehearsals.

We have also started our new book, 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' and there has been some fantastic story telling going on, especially mimicking what the troll says!



The children have really enjoyed going to the 'Tinker Table,' making their own troll figures like the one in the story. We have been really impressed with their imagination of how they have been selecting their own resources to give detail to their troll figures. We have had some extremely scary, evil trolls!

The children have loved listening to the story 'My Mum and Dad make me Laugh,' by Nick Sharatt and have been busy noticing lots of different patterns on a range of clothes, objects and in the environment. The children have created some fantastic AB patterns, and we are so proud of how well they are doing in all areas of their learning!

#### Reception

At the start of the week it was fantastic exploring our igloo, we love how cosy and toasty it made us feel, especially with the flashing lights! Later in the week it was transformed into a spaceship, and we now use control panels to explore space. We love looking out for stars and some of us have even landed on the moon. This was very exciting as we have learnt all about the first moon landing by sharing the story, 'Moon's First Friends,' by Susanna Leonard Hill.

We have had a great time continuing our adventures with the story, 'Whatever Next,' by Jill Murphy. It has been super re-telling the story using our talk for writing actions and sequencing pictures.

We also acted out the story and went on our own adventure to the moon! It was very funny when Cooper was lifted in the rocket and we all screamed with laughter when we got sprayed with water when it started to rain!

Our Christmas nativity rehearsals have begun, and we have made a great start practicing our lines and songs. We are looking forward to continuing this next week!

#### Year 1

Year 1 have had a lovely week. In Maths, we have been learning to add and subtract 1 and 2 from a number below 10. The children found this concept quite tricky, but we have been resilient learners and used our concrete resources to help us. In English, we have been learning about the pronoun 'l' and using finger spaces when we are writing our sentences. In Geography, we have been learning all about Burton. We went on a walk and visited different places so that we could then create our own maps. We found houses, factories, a park, and a forest. We loved learning what is in our local area. In COOL time, we have been learning to use a keyboard, being a weather reporter in our role play area, designing our own maps and monuments of Burton as well as practising our reading of phase 4 words. Well done Year

#### Year 2

Year 2 have had a great week this week! In English they have been continuing to learn about The Great Fire of London and the different features of writing a diary entry. In maths they have been learning how to add 10's to 2-digit numbers. They have used lots of concrete materials to support this. They especially like to use the base 10 to help them work out the answers. In History this week the children have learnt about Guy Fawkes and the Gunpowder Plot as well as learning about The Great Fire of London. The children enjoyed reading about different artefacts and discussing which ones are more useful and reliable to us. Well done!

#### Year 3

Year 3 have had a great week! They have started their multiplication and division unit in Maths where they have looked at multiples of 2s, 5s and 10s. They have been working hard to write their reports in English all about football! In History they have been investigating the Stone Age by identifying primary and secondary sources. We have also begun learning our Christmas play which is just around the corner!

#### Year 4

We have had another brilliant week in Year 4 this week. In maths, we have started our new unit looking at multiplication and division. This unit focuses specifically on timetables, so the children are finding it thoroughly enjoyable to apply their knowledge of their multiplication and division facts! In science this week, we have been learning about the different types of teeth that humans have. As part of this, we have set up an investigation to identify whether all liquids effect our teeth the same! We have done this by placing an egg in a variety of different liquids and we are observing them daily to notice any changes. Also, we have continued with our Forest School sessions and the children have been designing and making Roman crowns and have been using clay to make Roman jewellery once again! A brilliant week Year 4!



#### Year 5

As always, Year 5 have had a busy week! In English, the children have started planning and drafting



their very own 'Alien Invasion' stories. They have been working hard on including lots of description within their writing, as well as dialogue between characters to move the story on. In Maths, Year 5 have been re-capping previously taught strategies around fractions, so that we are secure in our knowledge before moving onto the very tricky fraction concepts covered in Year 5. In Science, Mrs Wilkinson taught the children about evaporation in their science topic of 'Changes of Materials'. Year 5 were stuck on a desert island and had to investigate which water would be safe to drink; the water from the sea, or the water from the river. Through their evaporation experiment, Year 5 discovered that when salt water

evaporates, salt crystals are left behind! In RE, we have started investigating our big new question, 'Is the Christmas Story true?'. This has included looking at how eye-witness accounts can differ, reading Matthew and Luke's versions of the Christmas story and looking at historical accuracies.

#### Year 6

This week the children have been working hard in maths, looking at multiplying and dividing fractions. I have seen some fantastic reasoning and problem solving skills. In English, we have continued with our work on diary recounts and looking closely at our model text 'The Diary of Alessandro Volta' to explore key features of a diary. I am so impressed with the projects that the children have completed for their WW2 extended homework pieces. We have had a range of items brought in to showcase their learning. A very well done to all the effort that has been put into such tremendous pieces of work. In Science, the children have been so engaged in learning about electricity and used the equipment to explore the effects voltage has on an electrical circuit. A great week, well done Year 6.

**WHAT ARE** THE RISKS?

TikTok is a free social media platform that lets users create, share and watch short videos ranging anywhere from 15 seconds to 10 minutes in duration. The app gained notoriety for its viral dances, trends and celebrity cameos and can be a creative, fun platform for teens to enjoy. Now available in 75 languages, it has more than a billion active users worldwide (as of spring 2022) and is most popular with the under-16 age bracket. In fact, a 2022 Ofcom report found TikTok to be the most-used social media platform for posting content, particularly among young people aged 12 to 17.

# AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

While TikTok's "Following" feed only displays videos from users someone follows, "For You" is a stream of clips 18 based on their previously watched content. Most videos on a child's "For You" feed will therefore be light-hearted and amusing, but it could potentially surface something unsuitable. TikTok's guidelines prohibit the sharing of illegal or inappropriate content, but the sheer volume of uploads mean they aren't manually monitored and vetted.

## DANGEROUS CHALLENGES

Due to TikTok's immense popularity, some young people have unfortunately been influenced by videos challenging them to perform harmful, criminal or even deadly acts. One extreme example was the 'blackout' trend, which encouraged users to hold their breath until they passed out from a lack of oxygen. It led to two families filing lawsuits against TikTok over the tragic

### CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

With around 1.1 billion users globally, the potential for contact from strangers on
TikTok is high – especially as accounts
created by over-16s (or youngsters using a
false date of birth) are set to public by
default. This not only means that someone's
profile is visible to everyone else the app: t also lets their videos be suggested to others and enables anyone to comment on them or download them. UU

# **IN-APP SPENDING**

TikTok is free, but users have the option to buy TikTok coins, which can be used to purchase emojis in the app. These emojis are then sent as rewards (retaining their monetary value) to other users for videos they've created. Coin bundles range from £9.99 to an eye-watering £99; TikTok's policy is that they can't be bought by under-18s, but it's possible to bypass this with a fake birthdate.

Like all social networking platforms, TikTok can be addictive: figures show that young people are investing increasing amounts of time in it. In the UK, children with TikTok spend an average of 102 minutes per day on the app, versus 53 minutes on YouTube. This compulsive repeated use can interfere with their sleep patterns – leading to irritability – and distract them from other activities.

## **TIKTOK NOW**

Introduced in late 2022, the 'TikTok Now' feature lets users post a daily video or photo at the exact same time as their friends. Users receive a synchronised notification at a random time of day, giving them three minutes to take a video or real-time photo. This addition can not only be a distraction to young people but could lead to them inadvertently sharing private content such as their location.

# Advice for Parents & Carers

## **ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING**

Family Pairing allows parents to link their TikTok account with their child's and control their settings remotely. Parents can then, for example, turn on Restricted Mode (reducing the chances of a child seeing inappropriate content); set screen time limits; and manage their child's ability to send messages (and to whom). Children can't alter these settings without parental approval.

### MAKE ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

RAME

Although under-16s will have their TikTok account set to private by default, bypassing this setting is relatively easy. However, parents have the ability to manually set their child's account to private – meaning that their videos won't be visible to strangers and they won't be able to exchange messages with people who

## LIMIT IN-APP SPENDING

If your child is using an iPhone or Android dévice to access TikTok, you can alter the settings to prevent them from making in-app purchases. We'd recommend that you enable this feature, as it's quite easy for a young person – without realising what they're doing – to spend a significant amount of real money buying TikTok coins so they can unlock more features of the app.

### **DISCUSS THE DANGERS**

If your child wants to use TikTok and you're happy for them to do so, it's crucial to talk about the potential risks in this type of app. For example, ensure they understand not to share any identifying personal information – and that they realise they could be exposed to inappropriate content. Thinking critically about what they see on TikTok can help children become generally more social media savvy.

### READ THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something inappropriate or upsetting that they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the possible signs. Increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags, as are failing to complete homework or regularly not eating meals.
