# Sports Day - Monday 19 June 2023



#### Whitsun

The Spring Bank Holiday, or otherwise known as late May Bank Holiday is a nice day off work and school for most people in the UK, and it falls on the last Monday of the month of May. Here are some facts about this public holiday:

The Spring Bank Holiday used to be on the Monday after Pentecost, otherwise known as Whitsun or Whit Monday. This was a holiday in the Christian calendar which is a moving feast determined by the date of Easter. This is still a holiday in over 30 countries around the world.



- Until 1967, Whit Monday (which the date shifted year on year) was a formal Bank Holiday in the UK. In 1971 however after a trial period it was shifted to fall on the last Monday of May every year and to be called the Spring Bank Holiday. It's not known why this changed but it might have been in order to cease confusion.
- While most will take a trip, go for a walk, or catch up with friends, others around the country will participate in some strange customs. On this day every year, people race down a steep hill following a large round cheese on Cooper's Hill in Brockworth, Gloucestershire, and the first person to cross the finishing line wins a Double Gloucester cheese weighing about 8lbs. In Endon in Staffordshire, the villagers dress their well, hold a village celebration and crown a girl as the Well Dressing Queen. Local men hold a



competition, known as 'Tossing the Sheaf', in which they compete to see who can toss a bale of straw the highest. In other places, boats are blessed, Morris dancers put on displays and local festivals are held.

Since becoming a Bank Holiday in 1971, the official legislation did not and still does not specify a name for the holiday, merely when it occurs i.e. last Monday of May. While most people call it Spring Bank Holiday, it's also known as Late May Bank Holiday, and Summer Half Term Bank Holiday.

# **Online Safety Tips**





# **Nursery**

This week in nursery we have been learning all about dinosaurs. The children have enjoyed finding out information about dinosaurs through looking on the internet, in books, play figures and sharing their own knowledge. On Wednesday, we had listened lots to the dinosaur song, 'The Brontosaurus Stomp' and the children did a fantastic job at creating music to accompany it. They also showed brilliant creativity by making a dinosaur skeleton using pasta and coloured sticks. What a fantastic end to another half term in Nursery!

# Reception

The reception children began the week learning about their favourite minibeast. They were very excited to carry out their own research using iPads and books and were surprised by some of their findings.

On Tuesday afternoon, the reception children were joined by parents and family members to help make a costume, ready for their Ugly Bug Ball! It was fabulous that so many of you were able to support



this - thank you! There was lots of fun and team work as the children got busy being creative and the results were fantastic!

On Thursday afternoon, the children had a fantastic time at their Ugly Bug Ball! They all enjoyed wearing their costumes and singing songs as they marched down to the forest. They all had a great time searching high and low for bugs using the clues given. It was a fun packed afternoon with lots of dancing and singing. I can hardly believe the children only have one term left in Reception - they really are all superstars!

#### Year 1

Year 1 have been busy learning about position and direction in Maths this week. In English we have started a new topic on the lifecycle of a sunflower. They have planted their own sunflower and looked at new vocabulary for the topic. We have been excited to start our new DT topic where we will be making puppets based on Little Red Riding Hood. We have designed our puppets and explored joining techniques such as gluing, pinning and stapling. Have a lovely half-term, Year 1!

#### Year 2

It has been another superb week for Year 2. In Maths, the children have continued their learning on fractions – they have learnt about unit and non-unit fractions, as well as finding the whole when a fraction of an amount is given. In English, all the children have worked exceptionally hard on writing a set of instructions about how to raise frogs from frogspawn. As the Year 2 children were experts at this already,

writing the instructions came very easily and they were able to include adverbs, time adverbials and noun phrases to make sure that their instructions were informative and exciting to read. On Tuesday afternoon, Year 2 had the pleasure of attending a multi-skills tournament at John Taylor High School. All of the children had a fantastic time completing a range of activities, including football, tag-rugby and a beanbagtoss. The most exciting part of the afternoon was an appearance from Spiderman who encouraged all the children to take part and provided music to keep us all motivated!

#### Year 3















What a week Year 3 have had! We have been learning about the importance of orienteering as part of our new English unit, 'The Mystery Rucksack'. The children thoroughly enjoyed the completing obstacle course blindfolded and now understand the importance of giving specific directions. In Science, the children have been learning all about the importance of muscles and how they help our skeletons move. As part of the lesson, the children created their own muscle model which showed how our biceps and triceps work. On Thursday, children enjoyed an art day. They started off by creating a viewfinder to develop their sketching skills of plants. They then learnt about different types of printing for example, mono, transfer and block. In

order to create their mono print, the children went into our local area and collected a range of leaves in which they later used printing ink to print. The children then created their block prints by using cardboard and string as well as carving their design into the polystyrene tile. We cannot wait to see the finished results! Well done, Year 3!

#### Year 4

Year 4 have had a fantastic final week of the half term. In maths, we have started our new unit on money and have been converting between pounds and pence. In English, the children have written their formal letter, as though they have been travelling the world! In history, we have had a brilliant debate on the mysteries surrounding King Tutankhamun! The children really enjoyed looking at all the facts and then finally deciding for themselves on his cause of death. Furthermore, we have continued with our computing unit for this half term looking at photo editing and I have been blown away with the amount of knowledge the children already know about this! Finally, I have conducted a practise multiplication check with all the children, and they have done amazingly well! Keep up the good work year 4, keep practising those timetables and have a wonderful half term!

# Year 5

An amazing final forest school this week for year 5. They have thoroughly enjoyed it and Mrs Martin has organised so many wonderful activities.

In Science, the children have been investigating growth, and looking into whether older people have bigger hand spans.

The children have been considering how the choice of words/phrases in their writing can have a greater impact on the reader - creating a visual picture. They've written their own poems including personification and similes and discussed how expanded noun phrases can have enough syllables to be a whole line in their haiku poems.



In Maths, we have discussed different strategies for calculating perimeter and area of shapes. The children have shared their ideas and considered which strategies are the most efficient in arriving at the answer.

Our history topic, Early Islamic Civilisation, has given the children time to consider why Baghdad was located in such a great place to be influential in the world. They've looked at farming, trade, the Silk Road and why the House of Wisdom was such a great place for scholars.

The children have used their 'AND' and 'OR' understanding in computing to search more efficiently through a database about the passengers on the Titanic. They've found information from over 1,300 individual records by streamlining their search criteria.

Year 5 have worked incredibly hard this term and ready for their week of rest!

#### Year 6

In Year 6 this week we have been busy writing our biographies on a monarch of our choosing. There have been some fabulous facts that have been researched. I cannot wait to see the finished product. In maths we have been continuing with problem solving involving a range of topics. In R.E we have considered how our motivation and passion towards something effects our actions and considered how Muslims try to lead a good life. We had a music lesson which focused on creating a bassline using a glockenspiel to 'lock in' with the drum patterns we created a few weeks ago. We revised a kick drum, snare drum and hi hat and how they make up the drum kit. We then used the pentatonic scale (C- D- E- G- A) to create our bassline, ensuring we started on note C to fit with the kick drum. Overall, a great week!



Ema Vašková belongs to a family of famous scientists and yet she appears to have the very unscientific ability to predict events, but she is never allowed to talk about this. When she is sent to stay with her eccentric uncle in Prague, she fears she'll lose the chance to ever fit in and become a true scientist like her beloved older siblings. But there she meets the mysterious Silvie and soon the girls are meeting for secret midnight adventures aimed at conquering Ema's fears.

When Silvie disappears it's up to Ema to find her with the only clue pointing to the mysterious Midnight Guild. Ema proves herself to be both



resourceful and brave and she needs to be. It seems that Silvie has been on a quest to find a murderer and that Ema will discover more about her family history and her own abilities as well as save her friend. Ema is a really engaging heroine and this is an assured, inventive and original fantasy, populated with fascinating, and occasionally macabre, characters with which to follow Tooke's acclaimed debut The Unadoptables and likely to prove just as popular.
