## May Day

May Day is a festival that celebrates the arrival of Spring. This day is celebrated throughout the world. In many countries it is a major holiday such as the United Kingdom, India, Romania, Sweden, and Norway. In many countries the day is celebrated as Labour Day. Here are some facts about the day...



- May Day has a long history and tradition in England. The day is celebrated with music and dancing. Perhaps the most famous part of the celebration is the Maypole. Children dance around the Maypole holding onto colourful ribbons. Many people use flowers and leaves to make hoops and hair garlands as well. A lot of towns also crown a May Queen on this day.
- May Day has changed throughout history. In Greek and Roman times, it was a day to celebrate spring and specifically the goddesses over spring. In early Gaelic times as well as in pre-Christian times in Scandinavia, May Day was also a day to celebrate the coming of Spring. When Christianity came to Europe and England, May Day became intertwined with Easter and other Christian celebrations.
- Morris Dancers in England wear hats decorated with flowers, suspenders, and ankle bells. They stomp their feet, wave handkerchiefs, and bang sticks together when they dance. One traditional May Day dance in England is called the Cumberland Square.
- A Maypole stands all year long in Inkwel, England. It has been there since 1894. Maypoles were sometimes made from old ship's masts.

Events include a Science Fair, short film showings, Nature Trail opening, recycled craft workshop, poetry session, mini exhibitions, and story-time workshops.

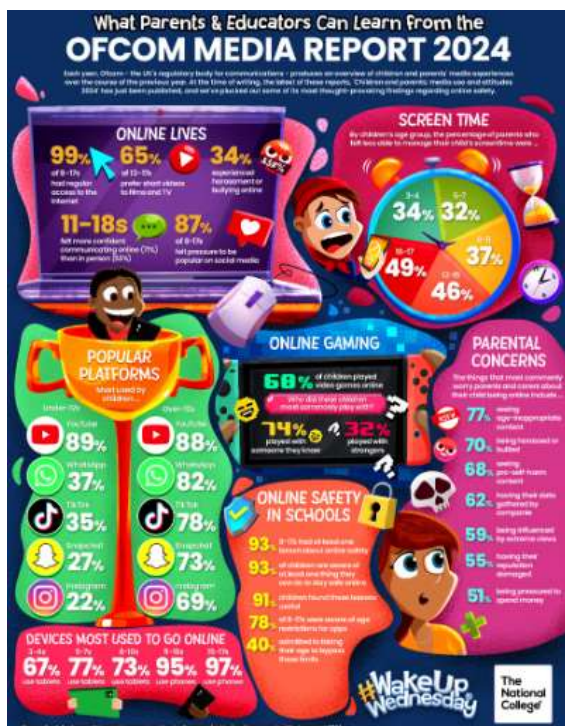
Partnering with local organizations, they offer activities like pebble painting, sunflower planting, treasure hunts, bug hunts, and litter picks.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

### Nursery

Nursery adventures this week...

The Nursery children have had an exciting week working fantastically in all areas of learning.

The children have continued with their 'Sunflower Challenge' and have been removing a seed from its pot to look at any changes. We have been amazed by what has happened in the compost, and the size of some of the roots, when nothing actually appears to be growing! The children are learning and using lots of new vocabulary daily by carrying out this challenge.

We have also begun reading our new class focus book 'The Enormous Turnip.' The children have enjoyed retelling 'The Enormous Turnip.' They all worked brilliantly together and did a fantastic job at carrying out their roles of their chosen characters.

The children then embraced their creativity as they explored colour mixing and making different shades of purple to paint their turnips.



On Wednesday, it was time for another exciting Forest School session and the children had fun joining in with activities which included painting wood cookie sunflowers, collecting natural materials to make sunflower homes, and finding minibeasts!

We ended the week with carrying out an investigation of 'growing a balloon turnip!' We discussed what is happening to the balloon, why it is getting bigger and where is the gas coming from. The children were fascinated having the opportunity to grow an enormous turnip like the one in our class story.

Well done children, another fun packed week of learning!

## Reception

Reception Adventures this week...

We have been continuing our minibeast adventures with a focus on ladybirds. We added lots of detail by using pastels to create our own ladybirds and completed some writing to label the different body parts.

It was great carrying out our own research using books and iPads to find out surprising facts.

Did you know that...

After that we used the iPads to design our own ladybirds showing our fabulous creativity. Another wonderful week in Reception!



## Year 1

In English, the children have begun to research a big cat and gathered information, which they could use to write about them. The children are excited to begin drafting their report next week. The children have finished their unit of learning about mass and capacity and are able to compare different quantities using the correct mathematical terminology. The children have blown Miss Barker and Mrs Sadya away with their determination when it came to sewing their puppet. All of the children tried so hard to use a blanket stitch in order to attach the two pieces of felt together. We are really looking forward to adding the decorations next week. Well done Year 1!

## Year 2

Year 2 have had a brilliant week, full of learning and exploring! In English the children have begun to plan their own set of instructions about making bread. They have enjoyed looking at the pictures of when they got to make their own last week and sequence them into the correct order. In maths they have begun their fractions unit. They have been exploring finding halves and quarters of objects, pictures, and amounts. In DT

this week the children have continued learning about different shapes that are the strongest and which would be the best for a structure. The children have each designed and made a chair for Baby Bear to sit on. Year

2 held great discussions in science when they were looking at the effects and changes within a rainforest. The children were very passionate about how humans should stop deforestation to protect the habitat and the animals! Well done Year 2 on a great week!

### **Year 3**

Year 3 have had a wonderful week! In English, they have finished their creative writing and have spent extensive time editing, perfecting and writing up their stories. Mrs Knight and Mrs Morris are delighted with how much effort they have put into these and with how fabulous the final versions are. The children have also continued with sharing their Iron Age projects – they have really enjoyed this topic and can't wait to learn more! Another great week for Year 3! Well done!

### **Year 4**

It has been another really busy week in Year 4 this week! In maths, we have been partitioning decimals into tenths and hundredths. We have also been able to flexibly partition them. In English, the children have been identifying synonyms and antonyms of words to expand their vocabulary bank. The children also conducted a science investigation this week where we were exploring the vast wildlife that lives up at Forest School! Finally, towards the end of the week, we have been investigating Howard Carter's famous discovery of one of the most important archaeological finds in Ancient Egyptian history! We have had some of the children start to bring in their Egyptian projects and they have been amazing so far! I cannot wait to see what the rest of the class bring in over the next couple of weeks! Another fantastic week Year 4, well done!

### **Year 5**

Despite this week being a strange week, with a day off on Thursday, Year 5 have continued to work hard and push themselves in everything they do. In English, the children have continued to work on their explanation texts about their chosen life cycles, ensuring that they include rhetorical questions, parenthesis and write in a formal tone. In Maths, Year 5 have moved onto shape, and this week they have been learning how to measure angles using a protractor (which proved trickier than anticipated!). In Science, the children have been learning about the gestational periods of a variety of animals, and through their learning they created a top-trumps-style game all about different gestational periods!



### **Year 6**

This week we have been very busy doing lots of practice papers to help prepare for our SATs. We have also completed lots of maths lessons learning how to measure angles with a protractor. We have also looked out how to calculate the sum of interior angles in polygons. On Friday, we investigated drawing circles with a pair of compasses, using our ruler to measure the radius. We have completed lots of SPAG revision and feel confident with the passive and active voice, along with determiners and articles. Overall, we have had a very busy (but fun) week in Year 6.

## Reading Corner

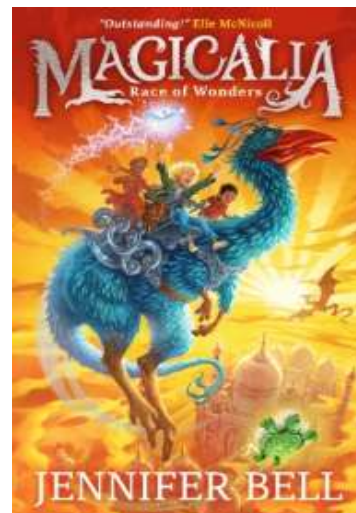
This week's recommended read is for children aged 9+...

Each year, Ofcom - the UK's regulatory body for communications - produces an overview of children and parents' media experiences over the course of the previous year. At the time of writing, the latest of these reports, 'Children and parents: media use and attitudes 2024' has just been published, and we've plucked out some of its most thought-provoking findings regarding online safety.

## ONLINE LIVES

**99%** of 8-17s had regular access to the internet

**65%** of 13-17s prefer short videos to films and TV

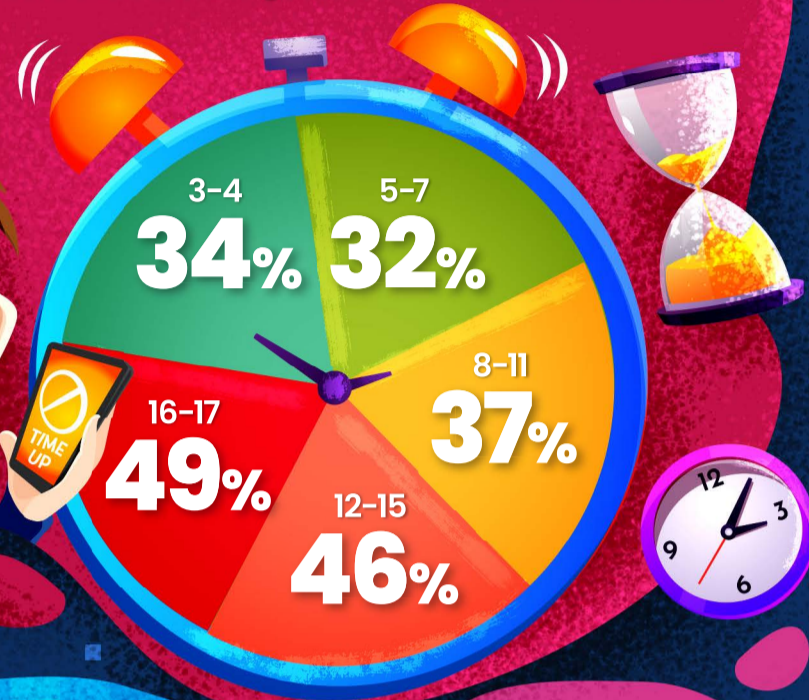
**34%** experienced harassment or bullying online

**11-18s** felt more confident communicating online (71%) than in person (53%)

**87%** of 8-17s felt pressure to be popular on social media

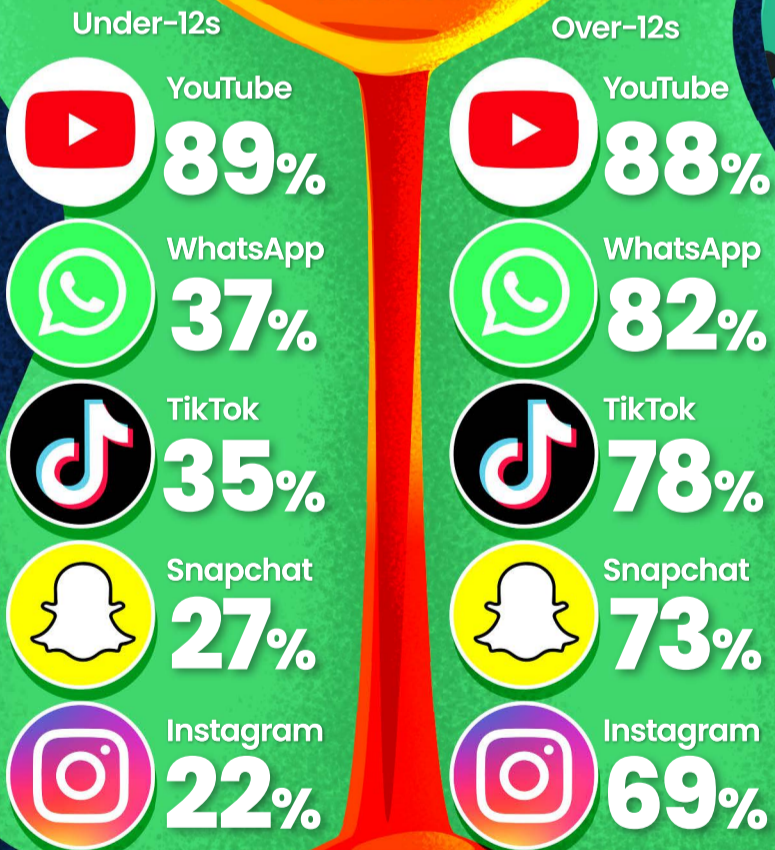



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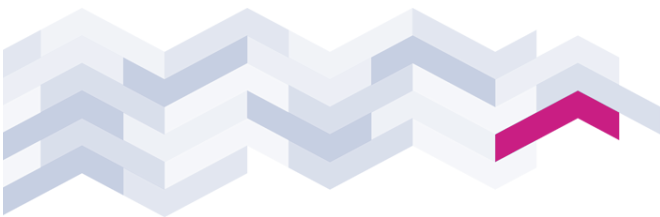
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
