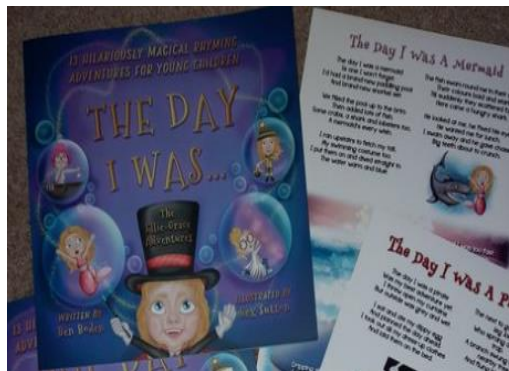

### Travelling to School Safely



We thought it prevalent to share with you the following advice from the government with regards to safe travel to school next week. In addition to this advice, we would like to make you aware of the current ongoing construction work taking place along Shobnall Road outside the school. It may be pertinent to park at the Albion Pub and walk up for those travelling by car and also to consider setting off from home a little earlier because of the traffic

lights either side. Please take care when crossing the road and listen out for ongoing traffic. However you do travel to school, stay safe.

## GOVERNMENT ADVICE

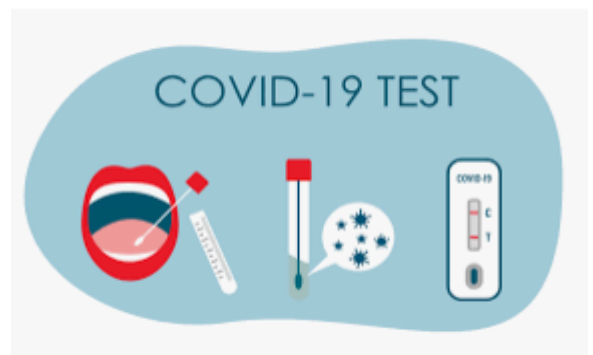
- If you live a short distance from your school or college, walk, cycle or scoot to and from school wherever it is possible and safe to do so
- Avoid sharing a car with anyone outside of your household or support bubble
- If you are using public transport to get to school or college, plan ahead and allow more time for your journey
- When you are travelling by public or dedicated school transport, don't forget to:
  - wear a face covering (unless you are exempt, including if you are aged 11 and under). It is important you wear them for the entirety of your journey, including inside a bus or train station
  - social distance where possible
  - wash or sanitise your hands regularly
  - be considerate to fellow passengers and staff.

## Asymptomatic Testing Information for Parents and Adults in Households with Children at School or College

NHS Test and Trace announced earlier this week, that all adults in households with school and college age children without symptoms can now access regular rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing.

Undertaking regular, rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing helps reduce transmission of the virus. Parents and other adults in households with children at school or college, who do not have symptoms, can now access regular, rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing. This includes childcare and support bubbles.



Tests are fast, easy and completely free. There are [different ways](#) for a household, childcare or support bubble to collect their test to take at home, twice-weekly:

- through your employer, if they offer testing to employees
- by collecting a home test kit from a local test site – anyone aged 18 or over can collect 2 packs of 7 tests
- by ordering a home test kit online – please do not order online if you can access testing through other routes, this frees up home delivery for those who need it most

If you have any queries about the tests, and you live in England, please call 119 (free from mobiles and landlines). Lines are open every day from 7am to 11pm.

Children of primary school age (and below) without symptoms are not being asked to take a test.

Testing is voluntary, but strongly recommended to all who are eligible. Alongside the vaccine, washing hands, wearing face coverings, and maintaining social distancing, rapid testing plays a vital role in reducing transmission rates. Getting into the habit of regular testing as part of our everyday lives will help us all to play our part and do what we can to protect each other.

## Forest School at Sinai House

We have been working alongside the restoration team at Sinai House for some time now and have been asked to forward some information to you below, which we hope you may be able to help with:



*“My name is Ben Gomme and I am part of the team working to restore Sinai Park House in Shobnall, Burton. A key part of this is the development of an outdoor learning programme, including the construction of a forest school on site. This is primarily aimed at local children but will cater for a range of groups, including adult learners and those with SEN. As one of Burton’s primary schools this may be of benefit to your pupils, and we hope you can give us a few moments of your time.*

*During the ongoing pandemic we have seen the impacts of the lockdown on the mental health and social lives of children, as well as the challenges of home schooling for parents and teachers. Forest schools have proved to be effective in improving pupils’ performances at school, particularly attitude to learning, focus and team skills. The direct engagement with nature and the environment helps better mental health among children, particularly after weeks and months of confinement indoors. We also hope that the variety and uniqueness offered by a forest school at Burton’s oldest building will open new doors for pupils and present new opportunities and prospects in the long term.*

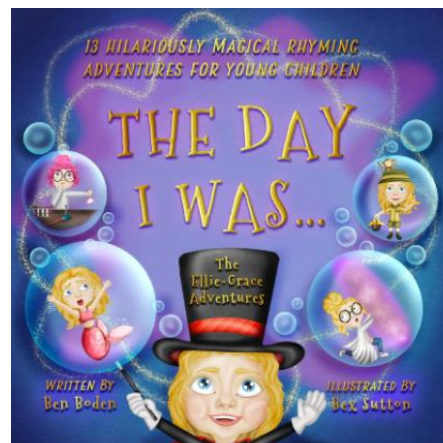
## Reading Corner
