Dear Parents/Carers,


Despite it being such a short week, the children have experienced such an incredible one in school, celebrating The Coronation of His Majesty The King! This is an event that will go down as one of the most important moments in British royal history. The world will be watching as the new monarch is crowned on Saturday 6 May 2023 at 11am.


As well as enjoying parties, themed lunches, and singing The National Anthem, the children have also been finding out about all the traditions and history associated with the coronation as well as embracing their creativity by producing some artwork to commemorate this momentous occasion. Their work is currently being collated on to one huge display but to get a flavour of what each class has been doing, you can read the 'Shobnall Showcase' later in the newsletter and see for yourself from the photographs we have gathered on Twitter.

The children wanted to share some of the information and facts they have found out about what will be happening tomorrow:




 The Coronation will take place in Westminster Abbey, London. Westminster Abbey is a very special place in the UK as it's a 900-year-old church that has been the site of coronations, weddings, and funerals of royals for hundreds of years.

 In 1953, Queen Elizabeth's coronation procession was 5 miles long and took two hours. This time, King Charles' and Queen Camilla's procession is only 1.3 miles long – just a quarter of the length of Queen Elizabeth's. They will travel from Buckingham Palace in a special coach called the Diamond Jubilee State Coach. The procession will take them along The Mall via Admiralty Arch, to Trafalgar Square, before going down Whitehall and Parliament Street. They will then go around Parliament Square to Broad Sanctuary, which is where Westminster Abbey is located.

 At the start of the Coronation ceremony, the Archbishop of Canterbury will introduce the King to the crowd. Next, King Charles will take an oath to protect the Church of England and the law. Then, he will sit in an old wooden chair called the Coronation

Chair, which was made in 1300 and will have holy oil put on his head, chest, and hands. After that, the King will be given a big golden orb and a sceptre. Finally, the most important part – Charles is crowned with a special crown. He will move to the throne, and everyone will kneel to show their respect. Queen Camilla will go through the same steps.

 King Charles will be crowned, like how it has been done for centuries, with the St Edward's Crown. The crown was named after St Edward the Confessor and it has been used to crown English and British monarchs since the 1300s. A new version of this crown was made in 1661, because the old one got melted down during the Civil War. The current crown is made of solid gold and has 244 precious stones on it! Queen Camilla will wear Queen Mary's crown which is made of silver and gold and has 2,200 diamonds on it.



Next week promises to be very busy, especially for our Year 2 and Year 6 children, who will be completing their SATs. I would like to take this opportunity to wish all the children the very best for next week as they sit these tests. Not only have the children been working very hard to get themselves prepared so that they are equipped to try their hardest, but the teaching team have also worked exceptionally hard to get

them ready. As we build up to next week, I am positive that the children will shine as they always do and I hope that they use this weekend to relax so that they are fresh and energised to give them their absolute best on Tuesday. Don't forget that school is closed on **Monday 8 May** for the Bank Holiday, which has been set for us all to enjoy the celebrations over the weekend! We hope that whatever it is you have planned, you have a wonderful time!

Wearable tech is increasingly big business. More than 170 million smartwatches were sold globally in 2022, for example, with Apple biting off the largest chunk of the market (26% - some distance ahead of Samsung, in second with 9%). That's partly because they have more than 21,000 apps available for their devices, allowing users to customise their smartwatch experience.

course, lean towards the higher spec end of the market – usually with price tags to match. Sourcing a less expensive alternative, however, often also means inferior safety features to protect young wearers. That's just one of the potential hazards highlighted in our guide to smartwatches. In the guide you'll find tips on a number of potential risks such as location tracking, causing distractions at school and the danger of theft.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

## EYFS

This week has been a very special week in nursery and reception as we have been learning all about His Majesty The King's Coronation. The children have enjoyed listening to the story, 'The King's Coronation' and exploring the slide along book with their friends. We have also been busy preparing for our Coronation Regalia, making crowns and flags. The highlight for this week was making pancakes. The children all did a fantastic job at listening carefully to the instructions to make pancakes. We had a lovely time decorating our pancakes and they went down a treat!

## Year 1

Year 1 have had a lovely few days this week! They have been working hard in maths to find doubles. In English they have written character descriptions about a hedgehog. We have enjoyed learning about the Coronation this week and have created some lovely class collages of the crowns that will be worn in the service! A very exciting week!



## Year 2

Despite this week being a short week, that hasn't stopped Year 2 from cramming in the learning! In maths, the children have recapped place value, addition and subtraction, and multiplication and division in preparation for SATs next week. The children have developed lots of strategies this week to support

them in finding answers in longer pieces of text. As always though, the tadpoles have been the centre of attention this week again as they have now grown legs and moved into their newly improved habitat which allows for the froglets to climb out of the water and breathe air.



## Year 3

What a wonderful few days we have had in Year 3 this week! We have been learning all about different types of skeletons in science and have created our own information posters. In maths, we have finished learning about capacity and are able to recognise capacity in millilitres and litres. The children have been continuing with their learning about The Iron Man and have been looking at the vocabulary the author has used to describe the colossal, iron giant. The children have had a lovely day today, celebrating the King's Coronation. The children have created their own montage with symbols that represent our new king!



## Year 4

Year 4 have had a very busy week this week, especially with only being in for 3 days! In maths, the children have continued to learn about decimals and this week have been focusing on the value of a hundredth and where it should be positioned on a place value grid. In English, the children have written a fantastic story to raise awareness of the dangers of electricity and it has been fantastic to see the children reflecting so much on their own writing to identify where to improve. Furthermore, as part of the celebrations for King Charles III's Coronation this weekend, Year 4 have created a mosaic using a range of different materials to resemble his majesty's face! The children have also created bunting that they have hung up around the classroom. To end the week, the children enjoyed a brilliant coronation party! A great week Year 4. Enjoy the bank holiday!



## Year 5

With a shortened week, year 5 have still enjoyed forest school with the children printing using natural materials, including flowers. The children used the Bill hook to chop wood that involved them working closely as a team.

In Maths, the children have continued well with the decimals, fractions and percentages unit. They have been focusing on percentages and great confidence has been shown and they are using their vocabulary to explain their understanding.

We have continued with our new reading text, Journey to the River Sea by Eva Ibbotson. The children have used their retrieval skills to write about what has already happened so far in the story.



To finish off the week, the children have been involved in art-based activities to celebrate the Coronation and created a collage of King Charles' head. They could choose from a variety of materials to create their own bespoke version of a stamp or coin.

## Year 6

The final week before SATs! We have worked so hard this week to try and fit in any last-minute revision on topics we're unsure of before we show off what we know next week. We enjoyed Friday as we had another fab cricket session and got to celebrate the King's Coronation with a party in the afternoon. Lots of other classes have been busy creating coronation craft for a whole school display we are creating but we are saving ours until after our SATs are over. I am so proud of how well the pupils in Year 6 have worked over these past few months and cannot wait for them to show off their learning next week. Get lots of rest and enjoy the weekend. We can do this Year 6!

# 10 top tips for safely using SMARTWATCHES

Kids love gadgets, and smartwatches – available to buy from as little as £20 online – make a tempting gift. As with any type of mobile technology, though, smartwatches can pose risks to children unless they're used safely. Receiving unwanted calls, cyber-stalking and distracting a young person when they're crossing the road are all known risks associated with smartwatches. However, these devices can bring plenty of benefits for children and parents alike – so let's examine the pros and cons of smartwatches.

## AVOID CHEAP OPTIONS

A quick search online yields a torrent of cheap smartwatches for kids, costing as little as £20. It's wise to avoid this bargain basement tech: it tends to deliver a poor experience with inferior battery life, and it's hard to have faith in the software's safety. There have been cases of smartwatches being hacked to track or contact children; stick to known brands who have a reputation to protect.

## CONTROL CALLING

Many smartwatches have the facility to make or take calls. As with a phone, you may want to restrict who your child can call – or be called by. On Apple Watches, you can select trusted contacts who are allowed to ring your child, while other watches' controls vary hugely. Some need to connect to a linked phone for calls, so you may be able to block unknown contacts via that device instead.

## BEWARE HIDDEN COSTS

For a smartwatch to allow calls independently (that is, without being connected to a phone via Bluetooth), it will need its own mobile data plan. This might take the form of a tiny SIM card that you slot into the watch – or an eSIM, where the physical card is replaced by software settings. Either way, this will incur an additional monthly cost that you'll need to factor into any buying decision.

## ENABLE FAMILY SHARING

Apple Watches aren't cheap, but they do offer superb safety features – allowing parents to control calls, messages and emails on the device, as well as a location tracking system that can send alerts if kids wander beyond pre-set boundaries. Their SOS function enables children to contact emergency services instantly if they're in trouble, which simultaneously also alerts parents and carers.

## MAKE THEM COOL FOR SCHOOL

Some schools have banned smartwatches, as pupils have been using them as substitute phones. If your child's school does permit them, some devices can be set to prevent distractions in class. For example, Apple's Schooltime feature turns their watches into ordinary time-keeping devices during school hours. The display changes in this mode, showing teachers that it isn't being used for other purposes.

## BE MINDFUL OF BEDTIME

Many smartwatches offer sleep tracking, which some (usually older) children use to justify wearing them to bed. However, that also presents a temptation to message friends or check social media late at night, even if their phone is downstairs. Unless there's a valid reason not to, you could encourage your child to remove the watch in the evenings and ensure the charger stays in a different room.

## TRACK ITS LOCATION

Both Apple and Android devices have apps which allow you to track a smartwatch's location. They can also initiate an audio alert – avoiding those cushion-hurling panics when a treasured device can't be found at home. If you're planning to track your child's location via their watch, make them aware of that in advance. You could even make it a condition of them getting the watch in the first place.

## THINK 'SAFETY FIRST'

Smartwatches are often worth hundreds of pounds, which can make young people wearing one a target for thieves. Advise your child to keep the watch hidden in public (when possible) and not to resist if muggers demand their watch. If you manage to track a stolen device, pass that information to the police: location data isn't always accurate, so you could end up wrongly accusing someone.

## STORE MEDICAL INFO

Devices including the Samsung Galaxy Watch and Apple Watch can store the owner's medical details (such as their blood group and any pre-existing medical conditions), potentially giving emergency services access to vital information in a crisis. These devices also have 'hard fall' detection, which sends a text message to selected contacts along with a map showing the wearer's location.

## USE THEM AS MOTIVATION

If you're worried your child's spending too much time slumped on the sofa staring at screens, smartwatches are great fitness trackers and can be a powerful incentive to get moving. Some devices will alert the wearer if they've been inactive for a long time and encourage them to do some exercise. Many watches record the user's daily step count and measure other health metrics.
