General Election – Thursday 4 July 2024

Local Authority Returning Officers are responsible for arranging polling stations across constituencies and are entitled to use publicly funded schools – including academies and free schools – free of charge. Shobnall Primary & Nursery School has been used historically as a polling station and a large turnout of voters is anticipated for the forthcoming General Election on Thursday 4 July 2024. We received confirmation yesterday that the school will be used as a polling station. Due to safeguarding regulations (i.e. contact between our pupils and the public), our own risk assessments and stipulations for the Returning Officers, this does mean that the school will have to close on this day. I know this will come as a great source of frustration to some of you but due to the reasons specified, we have no choice but to do so.

You may have noticed though from looking at our Dates for the Diary section of the newsletter that the Year 4. 5 and 6 performance of The Wizard of Oz is planned for this day. This is still going ahead as those children will be at the Brewhouse Theatre anyway on that day. Year 4, 5 and 6 will receive a letter next week informing them of the arrangements.



Apologies for any inconvenience this may cause, but I wanted to inform you as soon as possible to allow you enough time to make any necessary arrangements you need to for childcare, particularly if you have children in Nursery, Reception, Year 1, Year 2 and/or Year 3.

Sports Day – Monday 10 June 2024



D-Day

D-Day - 6 June 1944 - was the largest amphibious invasion in the history of warfare. The statistics of D-Day, codenamed Operation Overlord, are staggering. The Allies used over 5,000 ships and landing craft to land more than 150,000 troops on five beaches in Normandy. The landings marked the start of a long and costly campaign in north-west Europe, which ultimately convinced the German high command that defeat was inevitable. Here is some information you need to know about D-Day:

- On D-Day, 6 June 1944, Allied forces launched a combined naval, air and land assault on Nazioccupied France. The 'D' in D-Day stands simply for 'day' and the term was used to describe the first day of any large military operation.
- Lieutenant-General Frederick Morgan and his team of British, American and Canadian officers submitted plans for the invasion in July 1943. Although limited planning for an invasion of Europe

began soon after the evacuation of Dunkirk in 1940, detailed preparations for Operation 'Overlord' did not begin until after the Tehran Conference in late 1943.

 By 1944, over 2 million troops from over 12 countries were in Britain in preparation for the invasion. On D-Day, Allied forces consisted primarily of American, British and



Canadian troops but also included Australian, Belgian, Czech, Dutch, French, Greek, New Zealand, Norwegian, Rhodesian and Polish naval, air or ground support.

- The invasion was conducted in two main phases an airborne assault and amphibious landings. Shortly after midnight on 6 June, over 18,000 Allied paratroopers were dropped into the invasion area to provide tactical support for infantry divisions on the beaches. Allied air forces flew over 14,000 sorties in support of the landings and, having secured air supremacy prior to the invasion, many of these flights were unchallenged by the Luftwaffe.
- Nearly 7,000 naval vessels, including battleships, destroyers, minesweepers, escorts and assault craft took part in Operation 'Neptune', the naval component of 'Overlord'. Naval forces were responsible for escorting and landing over 132,000 ground troops on the beaches. They also carried out bombardments on German coastal defences before and during the landings and provided artillery support for the invading troops.
- 'Overlord' did not bring an end to the war in Europe, but it did begin the process through which victory
 was eventually achieved. By the end of August 1944, the German Army was in full retreat from France,
 but by September Allied momentum had slowed. The Germans were able to regroup and launched a
 failed but determined counter-offensive in the Ardennes in December 1944. This defeat sapped
 German manpower and resources and allowed the Allies to resume their advance towards Germany.

HERE EVERYDAY READY ON TIME

Regular school attendance is important for children and young people. Research shows there is a clear link between high attendance and educational outcomes, leading to better life opportunities and the best results that an individual can achieve.

There are also other benefits to young people's wellbeing such as nurturing long-lasting friendships, engaging in new activities and enabling young people to be able to develop in a supportive environment.

Across the UK, we are seeing a drop in attendance rates and attendance in Staffordshire schools is down by 2.3% compared to previous years. For



this reason, Staffordshire is rolling out their 'Little Heroes' campaign, to support Key Stage 1 pupils, and below are some links to resources which we thought parents might find useful.

On the internet or on social media, it's likely that you've come across the occasional pop-up – promising a great deal on some product or service, declaring that you've won some kind of prize, or making any other number of tempting claims. This marketing tactic has been around for almost 30 years and shows no signs of disappearing any time soon.

Unfortunately, pop-up advertising carries with it various online safety risks, as we can never be certain where those links will take us or how legitimate their creators are.

These ads can be especially risky for children and young people, who may not yet be able to look at such marketing with a critical eye.

However, this free online safety guide will educate you on pop-ups, their associated risks, and how to safeguard yourself and young people from this phenomenon.



Year 6

This week in Year 6 the children have had a great week. We started the week at forest school where we began our topic on the Ancient Greeks. Some of us took part in creating the Greek alphabet out of natural materials. We also discussed what had changed in the forest school area since last time we were down here. Some of us couldn't wait to get stuck into den building where we recapped what knots we could use to tie the rope to the tree before attaching the tarps. We have also been busy in our writing this week where we have completed several first drafts in different genres to show case all of our knowledge. 



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Pop-up advertisements have been a staple of the internet since they were first introduced in the late 1990s. This form of advertising causes a small window or banner to appear in the foreground while someone is browsing a website. Although these adverts are merely irritating for most people, pop-ups can present more severe risks to younger users.

DECEPTIVE TACTICS

Children sometimes don't understand that adverts (including pop-ups) are designed to sell a product – and can't distinguish between a legitimate feature of a site and an advertisement. Video games, for example, can be full of pop-up ads that tempt users into spending money, yet they might take the form of a mini-game or extra level.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

While some adverts are targeted based on a user's interests and activity online, that isn't always the case. This means that children may unfortunately be exposed to ads for age-inappropriate goods or services such as tobacco products, alcohol and gambling sites.

MALWARE RISK

Most pop-ups from reputable advertisers are safe. However, in some cases, pop-ups can trick you into downloading malware – whereby cybercriminals install software on your device, allowing them to access your sensitive data. It can be difficult to know if malware has been installed on your device, so your best option is to avoid engaging with these pop-ups altogether. Be wary of sites that suddenly bombard you with ads or try to prevent you from leaving.

N UP TOD PRIVACY RISK

Many app and game developers will collect their users' personal data, such as their name, address, email address, geolocation information, unique numerical identifiers, photos and payment information. If a child clicks on an illegitimate pop-up laced with malware, all this information could be put at risk.

WARN

RACKING UP BILLS

If a child has access to a payment card on their device – be it a smartphone, laptop, or tablet – they could very quickly rack up a massive bill by interacting with pop-up adverts and buying products shown to them. Try to keep a close eye on their spending.

BEHAVIOURAL IMPACT

Research has found that pop-up ads can even have an impact on children's behaviour. Some of these adverts use manipulative tactics that take advantage of children's developmental vulnerabilities, intentionally or otherwise. This approach may cause a child's mood to shift: becoming more stubborn, for example, if they begin wanting their parents to buy a specific product for them.

Advice for Parents & Educators

START A CONVERSATION

It's important to have regular conversations with children about online advertising so that they understand the risks of interacting with pop-ups. For example, if a child asks for a product which has been advertised to them online, ask them why they want it and how they found it: this will present an opportunity to talk youngsters through the tactics used in online marketing.

SPOT THE SIGNS

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If you're concerned that a child may be following pop-up ads to make online purchases or viewing content that could be harmful, it's important to be able to spot the signs. Due to the often-manipulative nature of these adverts, children who interact with them regularly may show signs of distraction, stubbornness and an increasingly materialistic worldview.

MONITOR CONTENT

It can often be difficult to spot when a pop-up advert is malicious – even more so for impressionable younger users. It's important to monitor the content they're consuming to prevent them from clicking on something dangerous. If a pop-up ad seems too good be true – promising a free iPad, for example – it probably is.

PRIVACY SETTINGS

Most modern devices have privacy settings that let you limit the amount of advertising a child is subjected to while using apps or browsing the internet. You may also want to speak to teachers about avoiding sites and apps with advertising, as well as adjusting digital privacy settings on any education technology they use.

LIMIT SPENDING

Try to stay aware of what children are spending and ensure that payment details aren't linked to or saved on the gaming platform that they use. Most video games and internet-enabled devices have settings that can help you manage what children can or cannot purchase online.


CUT DOWN ON SCREEN TIME

Given the prevalence of pop-up ads (which can appear on everything from smartphones and tablets to internet-connected toys and games), it might be beneficial to limit the time children spend on digital devices to curb their exposure to digital advertising.
