**Shobnall PFA Christmas Market – Friday 3 December 2021,
3.30 – 6.00pm**

The PFA Christmas Market is only a week away and we look forward to seeing as many of you there as possible! It promises to be a great event and I must express my sincerest thanks to the PFA, who have been working tirelessly to make this event extra special and safe!

Please refer to the letter, which was been emailed to you last week, if you are planning to attend which outlines in more detail the plans and COVID procedures. Some of this important information has been summarised for you below:

- The PFA will be running a 'street food' stall at the Christmas Market. If you are able to donate any cakes or Asian food, the PFA would be very grateful if this could be labelled with ingredients to support those with allergies. Also, if possible, please could you indicate if it is suitable for vegetarians or not? They



ask that these are donated on the morning of the Market, so that all food products are as fresh as possible and will ensure that any containers are returned to you the following week via your child. Also, you are more than welcome to bring your own containers along to the event should you wish to have a 'takeaway' option!

- If you have any unwanted items for the bric-a-brac stall (i.e. toys, books, games etc.) that are in good condition, the PFA are happy to start accepting these donations in school from Monday 29 November.
- On the day itself, the children (and staff) are allowed to come to school in a Christmas jumper! The charge for this is for pupils in EYFS and Key Stage 1 to bring in a chocolate item (value of at least 50p) and pupils in Key Stage 2 to bring a bottle!

We ask that all visitors enter the school grounds via the car park gate located just off Reservoir Road. Please could we ask that you are patient because you may have to queue for a short while as we may need to restrict numbers entering momentarily, whilst visitors navigate their way around the Market. So that visitors are off the road itself, please use the pavement and the grass verge on Highcroft Drive. Families are welcome at any point from 3.30pm onwards. If coming straight after school, we ask that parents collect children from the usual place and then make their way round to the entrance.



On entry, you will be asked to hand sanitise and you will be given a map of the school so that you can direct yourselves around our one-way system and find where the relevant stalls are located. Look out for the arrows but school staff will be on hand to point you in the right direction if necessary. Please feel free to go round more than once! The exit will be via the gate on the key stage 1 playground.

Please could we ask you to:

- Wear a face covering.
- Use the hand sanitisation points located around the school and before handling any items on stalls.
- Be aware of others as you move around the school to maintain suitable distancing.

In addition, we would also encourage you to:

- Complete a LFD test prior to attending on the day of the event.
- Not attend if you or anyone in your household is displaying symptoms or currently has tested positive for COVID.

Parking

A very unfortunate incident was witnessed by several parents outside the gates on Reservoir Road on Monday, and thank you to those who made us aware of what happened. From what we know, this occurred because of inconsiderate parking from one of our parents that heightened a neighbour's frustration at this recurring situation. Despite their reaction being inappropriate, especially in front of our pupils, we must ask yet again that parents respect our neighbours and make use of the Albion Pub's car park when dropping off and collecting children from school. Our greatest fear is that someone is going to be injured if this situation does not improve. We also ask that those parents collecting reception children vacate the area by 3.30pm and use one of the other entrances if necessary because staff start leaving from that time onwards.



Unfortunately, as a school, we are powerless when it comes to the legal enforcement of this. We can only encourage, and I think you'll agree that so much is in place to 'encourage'. It is tiresome receiving endless complaints from residents who are of the assumption that this is the school's problem to address. Legally, it isn't. It is concerning, and will ultimately cause reputational damage to the school but all we can do is encourage. Our advice is always to contact the police if you are witness to something that you believe is a breach of the law or contact our local councillor (contact details available on the Staffordshire County Council website) to express your concerns.

There are rules on parking, so please make sure you aren't parking dangerously or causing issues for others. It's important that you do NOT park:

- on zig zags and double yellow lines
- in a way that blocks access for emergency vehicles
- opposite to or near to a junction
- on a bend
- near the brow of a hill
- near a school entrance, bus or tram stop
- over or on the driveway of a property
- over a dropped kerb
- on the pavement - this can cause problems for parents with prams, wheelchair or mobility scooter users and the elderly.
- on or near crossing points where a school crossing patrol operates, this can impede their view, making the crossing unsafe

Bitcoin, released in 2009, was the first cryptocurrency; other platforms have since launched such as Ethereum, Tezos and Filecoin. As cryptocurrency becomes a more established part of digital life, young people are bound to encounter it – so it's vital that trusted adults understand its risks, and how it can be explored and used safely.

In the guide, you'll find tips on a number of potential risks such as complex technology, scams and risky investments. We hope you find this useful!

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

Nursery

You know Christmas is coming when the Nativity practice begins! In Nursery, we have been on the stage for the first time this week, which was a little overwhelming for some children whilst others were born to be actors and actresses! In addition to this, we have been talking about when and why we should brush our teeth. The children have been sent home this week with a tube of toothpaste and a challenge to record their tooth brushing routine for 4 weeks! Hopefully, this will help to embed a daily routine for the children. In Maths, we have been practicing our subitising skills and have been recognising groups of 1-3 objects instantly, without needing to count them!

Reception

The children have had another fun week in Reception. They have been very excited to begin practicing our school nativity and they have shown super listening skills and followed instructions fantastically. They have also had fun learning lots of new songs and enjoyed singing these throughout the day.

This week's maths learning was focused on adding one more and the children have used the vocabulary, first, then and now to tell their one more stories using a variety of resources.

We have all been very impressed with the children during reading practice sessions as they worked hard on various reading skills including decoding, using their prosody and showing an understanding of what they have read through comprehension.



Year 1

Year 1 have been continuing to explore the story 'Beegu' in English. They have worked on writing a full recount for the story using time conjunctions and full sentences. They have then had a go at self-evaluating their work to see how they could improve their writing. In Math's this week we have started our new unit of work, which is working with numbers up to 20. This involved lots of practical resources and the use of our huge number line hanging in the classroom. This week in topic, we have practiced modelling our Christmas Bunting and then proceeded to make it, decorate it and hang it in the classroom. All I can say now is that the classroom is looking extremely Christmassy and we are definitely starting to get into the Christmas spirit. We have also begun our rehearsal's for the Christmas Nativity. I have posted all of the songs and lyrics onto SeeSaw so all of the children can practice their singing voices at home too!

Year 2

The Nativity preparations have begun! Last week the children received their Nativity scripts and since then they have been working hard to learn their lines. Year 1 and 2 had their first full run through on Thursday afternoon which was very exciting for all the children! In maths, the children have been enjoying their learning on money and have now completed the unit. All children are confident in identifying the different notes and coins and adding amounts of money. In English, the children have begun to plan their stories inspired by Room on the Broom and are looking forward to writing them next week. In the afternoons, Year 2 have loved completing their DT unit on 'Dips and Dippers'. Highlights of the unit included tasting and evaluating a range of dips and dippers, as well as making their own hummus and dipper - YUMMY!



Year 3

This week Year 3 have been learning about multiplication and division in their Maths lessons. We have been focusing on multiplying and dividing by 3 and have been practicing recalling the 3 times table by taking part in some fun multiplication activities each day.

This week in D&T, we finished making our fantastic kites. On Tuesday, we took them outside to put them to the test! We evaluated our kites and identified the strengths and areas that we could improve. Our learning in D&T has supported us within our English lessons as we are currently writing detailed instructions to explain how to make a kite. You have worked extremely hard this week Year 3, well done!

Year 4

In Year 4 this week, the children have completed their newspaper article reporting on everything that the school did to promote Anti-Bullying week last week. These have been wonderful to read to show how the children engaged in the activities last week. In Maths, we have moved onto our new unit of multiplication and division that the children are loving, due to all the hard work they have been putting in to learn their timetables. The children have also started their Geography topic and have been identifying the equator, hemispheres, and tropics of the world. In Forest School this week, Year 4 have continued to use a bow saw to cut wood, painted their clay sculptors from last week and have learnt the sheer lashing technique to tie a knot! A wonderfully positive week Year 4!



Year 5

Year 5 have thoroughly enjoyed this week as we have started a new descriptive writing unit inspired by a clip from Literacy Shed- Sometimes like the Stars. The children used a variety of sentence types and figurative language, which they have done well. The class have finished their marble runs this week in DT and they have worked in teams of three to complete these so lots of cooperation and perseverance has been shown to be successful. We are all very excited about Whitemoor Lakes next week! Just as a polite reminder- Please ensure all wallets and purses are clearly labelled before handing them in to Mrs Knight on Wednesday morning. Any medication will also need to be handed in to Mrs Knight after completing the medical form which is attached to this week's homework. There will be no homework for next week due to Whitemoor Lakes.

Year 6

Wow! What a busy week in Year 6! We had our class assembly yesterday based on our learning on World War Two - thank you to all that came to watch, we really hope you enjoyed it. We have been continuing with our fractions unit in maths and our information text unit in English. In our afternoons, we have been exploring South America in geography and beginning to look at



D&T, where we will be making Christmas tree decorations, using electricity, which links with our current science topic.

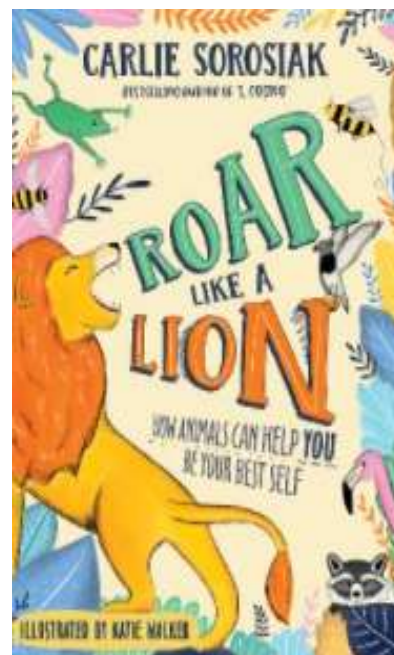
Reading Corner

Roar Like a Lion

Written by Carlie Sorosiak

A guide to being the best – and happiest – person you can possibly be, this book takes a highly original approach and advises readers to learn lessons from animals. Author Carlie Sorosiak has gathered lots of examples of animal behaviour that demonstrate the importance of being yourself, of being brave, finding friends, being resilient. These range from meerkats who stop bullying and stand up for one another to wombats who shared their burrows with other animals during Australia's bushfires. A particularly effective example is that of a racoon stuck in a storm drain for hours before eventually being released – the moral: all this will pass. It's quirky, absorbing and enticingly do-able while Sorosiak's cheerful, positive approach sets the perfect tone. Full of warmth and wisdom, this is a book to recommend to stressed young people.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about CRYPTOCURRENCY

What is cryptocurrency?

Cryptocurrency is software enabling the exchange and storage of digital 'coins' representing financial value. To monitor who owns which coins, platforms save an online record of every transaction, called a 'ledger' or 'blockchain'. This is secured by cryptography: a set of methods for protecting sensitive information. Bitcoin, released in 2009, was the first cryptocurrency; other platforms have since launched such as Ethereum, Tezos and Filecoin. As cryptocurrency becomes a more established part of digital life, young people are bound to encounter it – so it's vital that trusted adults understand its risks, and how it can be explored and used safely.

COMPLEX TECHNOLOGY

Like any new software, cryptocurrency comes with bugs, flaws and limitations. Already, it hasn't yet evolved to be as user-friendly as web browsing or social media. Using it safely means spending time learning about the complicated technology it uses. We would strongly suggest anyone considering getting involved in cryptocurrency should consult specialised tutorials to learn about it properly in advance.

WIDESPREAD EXAMPLES

Cryptocurrency software for smartphones is often free to download from app stores. Emails with links to cryptocurrency services can land in any inbox. Cryptocurrency is also advertised on search engines, on social media and in online games (for example to buy add-ons which help players level up). It can't be purchased easily without a credit card or bank account, but young people will still be exposed to cryptocurrency in various settings.

CHANCE OF SCAMS

Cryptocurrency provides another opportunity for scammers to extract personal data and money from unsuspecting web users. Unlike credit card transactions or wire transfers, a bank can't reverse cryptocurrency transactions once they've been made – making it an appealing channel for online extortion. These transactions do leave evidence in the blockchain, however, which means that cryptocurrency scammers can and do get caught.

BEING LOCKED OUT

If you forget your online banking password, you can reset it by proving your identity in another way. In the world of 'crypto', however, the private key to access your funds can't be reset. Cryptocurrency operates without intermediaries like banks – no one stores a copy of users' private keys. This has security benefits, but also presents the huge risk of permanently losing access to your account. Learn how to store private keys securely before purchasing any significant amounts of cryptocurrency.

RISKY INVESTMENT

Prices can be very volatile, so cryptocurrencies are considered high-risk investments. If you might need your savings soon, don't hold them in cryptocurrency as their value could drop suddenly and sharply. Sometimes, cryptocurrency may be a profitable investment – but note that any gains are taxable. You may even have to pay tax when exchanging one cryptocurrency for another if the exchange rate's exchanged is priced higher than it was when you bought it.

Advice for Parents & Carers

AVOID IF UNSURE

In the UK, cryptocurrency is considered risky, because users aren't well protected if something goes wrong. Most cryptocurrencies use software developed by decentralised communities, so there's no customer service and no support if your funds get stolen or you lose access to your mobile cryptocurrency wallet. Unless you understand cryptocurrency, it's probably best not to use it. After all, if you couldn't comprehend the highway code, it wouldn't be safe for you to drive.

EXPECT EXPOSURE

If your child plays online games that involve some form of virtual currency, and has access to some kind of payment method, they may find themselves in a position to buy and use cryptocurrency. There's probably no immediate danger, but discussing the potential risks with them could be useful. If your child is old enough to understand the concepts of spending and saving or to grasp the basics of programming, then they're old enough to learn about cryptocurrency.

CHECK CREDENTIALS

Buying cryptocurrency for the first time involves wiring funds from your bank to a cryptocurrency exchange – a business that converts your money into cryptocurrency. They can also store cryptocurrency for you, though this could present a security risk. Cryptocurrency businesses in the UK must now comply with money laundering regulations: the Financial Conduct Authority's website has a list of all businesses that are approved, and it's best to avoid dealing with any that aren't.

STAY CAUTIOUS, STAY INFORMED

Approach cryptocurrency with caution as well as curiosity. Don't click on links in unexpected emails relating to cryptocurrency and beware of promotions promising free cryptocurrency in exchange for personal information. Avoid mentioning on social media that you own cryptocurrency, as this can attract scammers. Stay informed of potential new risks and regulations by regularly checking specialised sources (such as CoinDesk).

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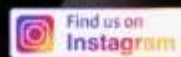
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
