Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

Nursery

This week in Nursery we have started our new topic on 'All Creatures Great and Small'. Having read the story Dear Zoo by Rod Campbell, we have discussed animals that would and would not make good pets and have met some pets that belong to members of staff in school! Mrs France brought in Pippy, her hamster and Mrs Farrington brought in Hetty, her Cockapoo! The children were very excited about their special visitors and enjoyed learning about the needs of the different animals, as well as showing great care whilst petting them! Unfortunately, we haven't met Mrs Sangster's pet snake yet, but did get to look at the latest skin that has been shed! This week the children have also begun their balance bike course with Mr Attwood and have made a very promising start!

Reception

The Reception children have had an exciting start to the new term. It was fantastic to see them arrive to school eager to begin learning all about minibeasts for our new theme 'It's a Bugs Life.'

They thoroughly enjoyed carrying out their own research using books and IPads and enjoyed listening to each other as they shared lots of interesting facts.

The children were very happy to find out that a group of ladybirds is called a loveliness!

The children were very excited as we headed down to Forest School to begin our first session.

I was very impressed with the children as they listened carefully to the various expectations such as, walking around the fire circle and moving natural materials appropriately. They all became explorers as they found a variety of minibeasts including a huge worm





and beetle! They also created their own minibeasts using natural materials and joined in with games and songs.

We can't wait for next week's session when we hope to bring some minibeasts back to the classroom!!

Year 1 have had a great first week back! In English we had a bourbon thief in the classroom and the children used their investigating skills to find out the perpetrator. The children are then going to use their knowledge of the events that took place to write a news report. In Maths we have started our new topic of division and the children have been super resilient with this tricky unit of work. We have used lots of concrete resources to help with our understanding of grouping numbers. In our topic this week, we have been looking at science and the changes in the season. Yesterday we went on a lovely walk looking for any signs of it being springtime. The children loved this activity and we even spotted some lambs.

Year 2

Year 2 have come back with an abundance of energy after the Easter Holidays! This week it has been full steam ahead with SATs revision. Each day the children have been looking back at all the things they have learnt this year, from column addition & subtraction, to the difference between a verb and an adverb. It has been wonderful to see how much the children have retained and they are brimming with confidence about the upcoming SATs week. However, the highlight of the week was on Friday afternoon when Year 2 participated in Bhangra Dancing, led by JTHS. It was fantastic to see all the children participating fully and enjoying a well-deserved dance after all their hard work this week!



Year 3

Year 3 have had a great first week back. We have continued learning about fractions in our maths lessons. The children have been counting forwards and backwards in tens using a number line to support them. In English, we have started our new unit 'Myths and Legends'. The children have enjoyed reading a range of myths and legends and learning about the key features included. On Friday, the children created a description of a mythological creature using a thesaurus to help them to include interesting vocabulary.

Year 4

Year 4 have made a superb start to the summer term! It has been fantastic to see that some of the children have been able to create their Ancient Egyptian project over the Easter break and they look amazing! I can't wait to see what the rest of the children bring in over the coming weeks. In Maths, we have started our new unit on decimals looking at dividing a number by 10 into a decimal, where the children have been using the place value grids to aid their learning. As always, the children have continued with their revision of timetables. In English, the children have been learning about classical poetry and have created their own classical poem! Across the curriculum, the children have started their new topic in French to identify how they say the time. A great first week back Year 4!



Year 5

Year 5 have settled back into school well after the Easter holidays, enjoying their first Forest School session which went very well. Despite the colder weather, the children thoroughly enjoyed the activities out in the fresh air. Miss Lord organised all activities and we were joined by Mr Hussein and Mr Rowley.

In English, this week the children have been thinking about reasons why children should be able to use electronic devices after reading a letter from Mr Hussein and Mrs Knight. The children have been learning about using persuasive phrases and writing in a formal manner.

Year 6

After a well-deserved Easter break, Year 6 have come back to school with a hard-working attitude! The children have been spending their time revising different areas of maths, reading and writing in preparation for their SATs tests in a couple of weeks.

You may also like to note that the governing body has a code of conduct and that any new governor will be expected to sign up to and adhere to that code.

How to apply

If you are interested in applying for the role, please complete the attached candidate form obtaining signatures of two other parents/carers of a registered pupil at the school/at one of the schools in the academy trust and return to Mr D. Adams by Friday 6th May 2022. If we receive more applications than there are vacancies, a secret ballot will be carried out. We will inform you closer to the time if we have to do this.
