Update NHS COVID-19 Symptoms Lists


The NHS <u>COVID-19</u> symptoms in adults and <u>symptoms</u> in children have been updated.

Adults and children who have symptoms of a respiratory infection, including COVID-19, should follow the <u>UKHSA</u> <u>guidance</u>. Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with

other people, where they can. They can go back to school, college or childcare and resume normal activities when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend. Please note that, free COVID-19 tests are only available for specific groups due to the universal testing offer ending on 1 April.

Easter

Easter, also called Resurrection Day, is a holiday that is celebrated every spring. Among Christians, it is a celebration of Jesus Christ being raised from the dead. Christians believe that it is the most important day of the year. Some people who are not Christians celebrate Easter as the beginning of spring. Many people attend a church service on Easter, even if they do not regularly attend church. We thought it would be interesting to share some facts with you about this very special day:



- Easter is not held on the same date every year. This is called a *moveable feast*. Currently, all Christian churches agree on how the date is calculated. Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon which occurs on or after March 21st. This means it is celebrated in March or April. It can occur as early as March 22 and as late as April 25.
- The English word "Easter" is derived from Eostre, the name of the Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring. Her festival occurred at the vernal equinox. The French word for Easter, Pâcques, comes from the Greek word for Passover, which is the Jewish holiday that is celebrated at about the same time of the year.
- Though many used to eat lamb on Easter because it was celebrated near Passover, Americans began eating ham because it would cure over the winter and be ready to eat by spring.
- The tradition of wearing new clothes on Easter came from a superstition that said that if someone wore new clothes, they would have good luck for the rest of the year.
- The first chocolate egg was produced in Bristol, England, in 1873. Cadbury began making chocolate eggs in 1875; currently, Cadbury produces 1.5 million creme eggs per day.

Reception



It has been a super busy week in Reception!

We started off the week learning about Easter and completed some role play scenarios linked to the Easter story. Our learning continued as we visited our local church for an Easter service.

The children have also enjoyed baking this week and made some biscuits in the shape of different sea creatures. They carefully measured and mixed the ingredients before rolling out the dough and using a cookie cutter. There was some fantastic discussion as the children commented on the changing texture of the ingredients. They then had a great time decorating their cookies with some icing. They all thought it was magic as the white icing turned to different colours!

On Tuesday afternoon the children were joined by parents and family members to carry out some boat making! It was fabulous that so many of you were able to support this- thank you! There was lots of fun and

team work as the children got busy being creative and the results were fantastic!

On Thursday the children took part in the class assembly based on our topic 'On the High Seas!' We were all so proud of the children as they shared their learning, dancing and singing to a packed audience. They truly were amazing and have grown (not only in height) so much since the last time they were on stage at Christmas! I can hardly believe the children only have one term left in Reception-they really are all superstars!

Year 1

What a fantastic end to a fun filled term! Year 1 have had a great week of learning. In English they have been continuing to write their diary entry about their adventure to the Moon. All of the children have worked extremely hard on this piece of writing and they have all come a long way since the beginning of the year. In maths we have been exploring multiplication, the children have had a great attitude and a high level of resilience when approaching this topic. We used lots of manipulatives and concrete

resources to support our learning. In topic this week we have been focusing on History. We have been learning about the Apollo 11 mission to the moon and the great space race. The children have all engaged with this learning and have very much enjoyed the topic! I hope you all have a great Easter holiday and a well-deserved rest ready for next term.

Year 2

Year 2 have had a jam-packed week this week! They started off the week with some history lessons around the theme of 'I have a dream'. Year 2 learnt about Emily Davison and the suffragette movement, Rosa Parks and her fight for equality and Martin Luther King Jr and his civil rights leadership role. The children were enthralled by this topic and could not believe that the world used to be so segregated. Year 2 found the idea of protests very interesting and couldn't believe that Emily Davison went on hunger strike!

After completing their learning in History, Year 2 enjoyed engaging with their DT topic 'Textiles; Fabric Faces'. The children learnt about different types of fabric and a range of joining techniques. They created some fantastic mixed-media self-portraits (you can see a sample of these on Twitter!). The most challenging joining technique was definitely sewing...the children were very patient whilst threading a needle and doing a running stitch! Year 2 were very proud of their finished product, as they should be!

Year 3

Year 3 have had a wonderful final week of term! Wednesday was our last Forest School session. The children worked as a team to complete a scavenger hunt by finding a range of hidden objects. As this was our final session, we all helped to clean the environment ready for the next class of children to enjoy their Forest School sessions next term. Over this half term, it has been wonderful to see how the children have grown in confidence and developed a range of skills at Forest School.

The children attended the Easter Service earlier in the week and we have been learning all about the Easter story in our RE lessons. On Thursday, we learnt all about Ramadan. The children shared their experiences whilst enjoying a Ramadan cookie kindly baked by one of our class mates. A fantastic final week Year 3. Enjoy your well-deserved break!

Year 4

We have had a wonderful last week of term in Year 4! The children have completed their history unit of study on the Anglo Saxons and the Vikings! This involved a variety of different research methods of using both books and iPads to gather information on topics such as famous leaders, culture, religion, and the significance of the Vikings on history! Furthermore, the children have also been learning about the role of forgiveness in the Easter story and this fitted in perfectly to our trip to the church on Tuesday for our Easter Service. As always, the children have worked incredibly hard on their times tables this week and I would just like to take the opportunity to say a colossal well done to all the children for their work on these. As we approach the summer term, the progress the children have made with their times tables has been phenomenal and I couldn't be more proud! Well done for all of your hard work this term Year 4! Year 5

The children have absolutely loved this week in school because they have been working on their design and technology unit of Seasonal Foods. The pupils were asked to design and make their own healthy pizzas. The children have been working with Miss Allen to learn all about health and hygiene when preparing food. The children then evaluated the final products against their designs.



The children have been given an extended piece of homework which links into their history unit for next term of Early Islamic Civilisations. I hope this gives the children the opportunity to be creative over the Easter holidays.



Year 6

This week, Year 6 have shown a great deal of resilience and determination throughout our mock SATs week. All pupils are aware of how SATs week will run and have built up their confidence and knowledge accordingly. We have been beginning to look at ratio and proportion in maths, using the ratio symbol and language and linking this with fractions. In science, we have completed our investigation, considering which environment is the best to keep bread in and which environment produces the most mould growth.

Cassie Morgan has three wishes — to have more books, to go on an adventure, and to see her mother again. So begins the intriguing opening of Skye McKenna's magical five-book series that's pitch-perfect for readers who loved *The Worst Witch* and are ready for something a dash edgier.

Seven years have passed since Cassie's mother left. At her austere boarding school, she tries to make herself invisible while wondering about the key her mother left. It was "a treasure chest, a secret vault, the door to the home she and her mother would someday return to". On the verge of being sent to an orphanage, Cassie seizes an opportunity to escape, determined to find her mother.



Hedgely is conjured with chocolate-box English quaintness - think cooked breakfasts, sweet treats, village shops, opulent orchards, fragrant honeysuckle and roses. It's a place lovers of timeless fairy tale worlds will be utterly entranced by, not least when Cassie is confronted by shapeshifters and the threat of the Erl King who wants her mother's key. With a thrillingly twisting climax, this first book in a quest quintet will leave readers hungry for lashings more magic.
