# **SHOBNALL SHOWCASE!**

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

#### **Nursery**

This week the Nursery children became scientists and set up an experiment to explore the affects of different liquids on eggs (that represented our teeth). Just after two days, we couldn't believe the difference! The egg in orange juice turned the shell bumpy and very rough and the egg in vinegar went soft and lost the brown shell colouring! "It's bouncy, like a dog's bouncy ball!" The egg in water showed no change, so we had lots of discussion about what was best to put in our water bottles when we come to Nursery! We have carried out lots of Dentist role play this week as well as telling our own stories and practicing for our forthcoming Graduation!

#### Reception

The Reception children have had a brilliant week exploring holidays.

They have focussed on various holiday destinations and shared their own experiences of travelling in different ways.

In maths the children have explored capacity and volume using sand and water. They made some fantastic comparisons using mathematical vocabulary.

The children have also been celebrating their achievements by revisiting goals they set themselves earlier in the year. These included golf distance shots, swimming without armbands, using the correct letter formation, riding a bike without stabilisers and tidying up more. They have certainly shown a great deal of perseverance and we are very proud of them!

#### Year 1

Year 1 have had a great week this week. They made their scrumptious salads last week and this week they have evaluated their work. In topic this week we have started Science and they have been exploring plants. The children have already started to use their investigative skills by identifying different trees and flowers. We are going to continue this exploration next week with an experiment. This week in Maths they have started learning how to tell the time. The children behaved fantastically on the trip as well as applying their knowledge from the science lessons. They have also taken away a lot of new vocabulary that they will apply to their poetry writing next week. Well done Year 1!

#### Year 2



Year 2 have had a wonderful final week with Miss Martin-Mills! This week was the children's final testing week which was an opportunity for the children to demonstrate the wealth of knowledge that they have gained this year. As always Year 2 did their best work, and it has been wonderful for them to reflect on how much they have learnt this year and how ready they are for Year 3! Once tests were complete, the fun could begin! Year 2 had the fantastic opportunity to be the first children in the school to use the BRAND NEW IPADS! And wow, they truly are amazing and a huge improvement on the old ones. The children used ScratchJr to create their own programs and create moving pictures. In addition to computing, the children had a DT day where they were able to create moving pictures using sliding, wheel and lever mechanisms. Using split pins certainly was a challenge, but all the children had great fun and completed some fantastic traditional fairy tale inspired moving pictures. However, this DT day was no ordinary day because a

MIRACLE happened! The children were hard at work, when suddenly commotion started as a cat strolled into the classroom! Miss Martin-Mills jumped into action and picked up the (assumed to be) stray cat. However, Jonah suddenly leapt out of his seat and said 'That's Theo! 
This week's recommended read is for children aged 9+...

# What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

**WHAT ARE** THE RISKS?

# **PUBLIC SERVERS**

Joining a public network (called a server) lets your child potentially interact with strangers through text chat. Some servers focus on building, while others are dedicated to role-playing – encouraging direct player interaction. Anyone can join public servers and connecting to one is relatively simple. Public server IP addresses (and therefore someone's location) are easy to find with search engines.

## **GRIEFING**

Some people in Minecraft delight in purposefully damaging or destroying another player's creation. This is called 'griefing' and is a form of bullying: it intentionally spoils someone else's experience in the game by deleting hours of their work and forcing them to start from scratch. Many public servers treat griefing as a severe offence and frequently ban offenders. THT THT THT

## **ADDICTIVENESS**

Minecraft's gameplay is relatively simple, and the outcome (when a child has built something new, for instance) can be extremely gratifying. This can make the game highly addictive. It's easy to lose track of time while playing Minecraft, causing committed young players to forget about other activities like homework or enjoying family time.

# **SCARY ELEMENTS**

The visual design and gameplay of Minecraft is purposefully child friendly, so there's nothing too untoward in the game. However, some of the 'baddies' that can be encountered might prove a little too scary for very young players. In the game, certain enemies come out at night and are accompanied by audio – such as zombie moand skeleton hope rattles – that may upperve young ones. bone rattles - that may unnerve young ones.

## ADDITIONAL PURCHASES

After initially buying the game, players can make optional extra purchases for cosmetic items and other bonuses. Minecraft Realms is an optional online subscription (requiring regular payments) that lets users run a multiplayer server to play with their friends. Most games consoles also need an active subscription to enable online play - so online gaming can enable online play – so online gaming can quickly become an expensive hobby.

# Advice for Parents & Carers

# RESEARCH CONTENT CREATORS

There are a lots of Minecraft content creators who release helpful videos about the game on YouTube and Twitch. Not all of these, however, are suitable for children. Watching these content creators' channels yourself first is a safe way to find appropriate Minecraft videos to share with your children. This also helps you learn more about the game itself, and how your child plays it.

# CHOOSE THE RIGHT MODE

Selecting 'Creative' or 'Peaceful' mode allows children to play Minecraft without having to contend with enemies. It's also a great way for you to get used to playing the game with them, since the difficulty level is lower. This allows you to work together on a long-term project, creating something special without the threat of moaning zombies or creepers damaging your build.

# HOST A PRIVATE SERVER

THT

The easiest way to find a safe server for your child to play on is to make one yourself. Hosting a server prevents strangers from finding it, unless they've been given the necessary joining details. A private server also lets you control who's allowed to enter and – if necessary – to ban someone who shouldn't be there. This is the closest equivalent to parental controls in Mineralt equivalent to parental controls in Minecraft.

## ENCOURAGE BREAKS

It's easy for the hours to fly by while your child is playing
Minecraft, so reminding them to take regular breaks is essential.
This is a useful way for them to learn good time management, which they'll benefit from as they get older. It will also teach them to play their favourite games in moderation – limiting addictive behaviour and allowing them to manage their day better.

# TALK ABOUT STRANGERS

At some point in their lives, almost everyone needs to have contact with a stranger online. Talking to your child about online safety, therefore, is essential – as is having a plan in place for dealing with any hostile or difficult strangers. Ensure that your child knows never to tell a stranger about themselves online, and that they should come to you straight away if they do encounter a problem.
