The Week Before Christmas...

As you are all aware, next week is our last week in school before we break up for the Christmas holiday on Friday 16 December. It promises to be an enjoyable one but an incredibly busy one at the same time! With that in mind, I thought it would be useful to provide you with a few reminders regarding our plans:

- Christmas Dinner Day is on Wednesday 14 December. To get into the festive spirit, the children and staff can come to school in nonuniform, ideally with a Christmas jumper and/or Christmas attire! No donations required for this.
- On Thursday 15 December, the whole school are going to Lichfield Garrick Theatre to watch the pantomime of Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs. As we anticipate arriving back in school slightly later than when lunchtime usually commences, children can



take their own small snacks to have at the theatre during the interval. Please could parents ensure these are suitable for the children to carry, and dispose of afterwards, themselves. Many thanks.

These are rather more expensive than some other traditional toys and we would not want any of the children getting upset if they got damaged. Miss Alexander and Mrs Lukman already have some special activities planned for EYFS, so have stated that Reception and Nursery children do not need to bring in their own toys as they will be engaged in their own festivities!
- ▲ Schools closes as usual on **Friday 16 December** at **3.30pm**. Shobnall Stars will be open as normal for those families requiring wraparound care.

Up, Up and Away, Read and Read Every Day!

Children return to school in the New Year on Wednesday 4 January 2023. As this is a shorter week than usual, we will be undertaking some themed learning based around the children's favourite books! Please could we ask that the children bring in their favourite book to school when they return after the Christmas holiday, as part of the learning will be around reading for pleasure and celebrating all genres of literature; from stories to biographies, from picture books to poetry. Snow & Extreme Weather Procedures

The UKHSA has issued a cold weather alert due to the low temperatures expected across all parts of England over the weekend. With this in mind, I thought it would be a good opportunity to remind all our families about the school's procedures should we receive substantial snowfall and extreme weathers. The school will endeavour to remain open in the first instance and closing the school will only ever be chosen in the final instance. Please can I ask that you do not contact the school office asking if we are open, as we will always use our main methods of communication in the event of such a decision. You will all

receive a text message and the school Twitter account will also be used to state that this decision has been made. Please ensure that the school office has up-to-date contact details for you. We hope that we are not required to close but such a decision must take into consideration many factors, not just the amount of snow on the school grounds. For example, the safety of parents and families on their journey to school, the staff and their journey to school (many of whom travel some considerable distances through

remote areas) and, of course, the weather forecast and Met Office advice all play a part. I hope that this clarifies our procedures for you and many thanks for your understanding in this matter.

Scarlet Fever and Group Strep A Infections

The Secretary of State for Education, Gillian Keegan, is closely monitoring the increased cases of Group A streptococcus (Strep A) and scarlet fever. The Department for Education is working closely with the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA), who are leading on the response.

UKHSA is reporting an increased number of cases of Group A streptococcus (Strep A) compared to normal at this time of year. There is no evidence that a new strain is circulating, and the increase is most likely related to high amounts of circulating bacteria and social mixing.



Scarlet fever is caused by bacteria called Group A streptococci (Strep A). The bacteria usually cause a mild infection that can be easily treated with antibiotics. In very rare occasions, the bacteria can get into the bloodstream and cause an illness called invasive Group A strep (iGAS).

Strep A infections can cause a range of symptoms that parents should be aware of, including:

- Sore throat
- Headache
- Fever
- A fine, pinkish or red body rash with a sandpapery feel
- On darker skin the rash can be more difficult to detect visually but will have a sandpapery feel

If a child becomes unwell with these symptoms, you are advised to contact your GP practice or contact NHS 111 (which operates a 24/7 service) to seek advice.

If a child has scarlet fever, it is advised they stay at home until at least 24 hours after the start of antibiotic treatment to avoid spreading the infection to others.

Trust your own judgement and if your child seems seriously unwell call 999 or go to A&E if:

- your child is having difficulty breathing you may notice grunting noises or their tummy sucking under their ribs
- · there are pauses when they breathe
- a child's skin, tongue or lips are blue
- a child is floppy and will not wake up or stay awake.

At the time of writing, the chat app HiPal was among the App Store's top 20 trending downloads in the social media category. Effectively turning someone's phone into a walkie-talkie for instant audio communication, it offers the possibility of quick contact with new friends – which will ring alarm bells for most parents but is clearly having considerable appeal for younger users.

With features including photo sharing and private conversations available to chidren as young as 12, HiPal has attracted concerns around its use as a potential platform for sexting — while there are also worries about the

mental health consequences of teens receiving negative feedback about their pictures. This week's online safety guide tells you what you need to know.

Year 2

Wow - what a fantastic week Year 2 have had! Obviously, the main event was the KS1 Nativity in which every child made the staff, and their parents, extremely proud. All the children were superstars and gave the performance of a lifetime! Although the countdown to Christmas is well and truly on that doesn't mean our learning has stopped as the children have completed a unit of work in RE around the Christmas story. On Friday, Year 2 enjoyed an Art day where they drew and painted self-portraits (inspired by Thomas Gainsborough) as well as used IT to create some pop-art inspired self-portraits. Keep up the great work Year 2, 1 week to go!

Year 3

We have had a fantastic, festive week in Year 3! We thoroughly enjoyed sharing our Cosy Christmas Celebration with our parents and carers. Year 3 have been working extremely hard over the last few



weeks learning Christmas songs, lines and information. We hope the audience enjoyed our performance as much as we did. It has been wonderful to see the children's confidence develop on the stage. We are looking forward to getting involved with all the festive activities that are planned over the next week.

Year 4

Year 4 have had a lovely penultimate week of the Autumn term. The children took part in their last session of Forest School and the children enjoyed taking part in a range of Christmassy activities. These included a chocolate coin hunt around Forest School and creating Christmas decorations using clay! In the classroom, the children have been using their

vast knowledge of timetables to help us with our next unit in maths, which looks at multiplication and division. The children have also been creating their own podcast as part of our Computing unit for this half term! Finally, the children have started their art topic for this term and have been researching the importance of L.S. Lowry! A fantastic week Year 4!

Year 5

After last week's outdoor adventures, the children in year 5 have thoroughly enjoyed art and Design Technology this week! They have been exceptionally creative and have linked their understanding to other topics and subjects too.

In Art, they have been learning





about Pop Art and then re-creating a pop art piece of artwork. They have used clear lines and shapes to do this. In Design Technology the children have been investigating marble runs, gravity and creating their own designs. They spent time considering their design and then added annotations to clearly label parts, materials and other important information that helped other children (and the adults) understand how their marble run would work. They practiced their evaluation skills too on Mrs Barlow's marble run, giving feedback as to how she could improve her design and the functionality of the product.

In Maths we have started our new topic on fractions so please use opportunities at home to discuss fractions and equivalent fractions with the children. When cutting a pizza or cake, talk to them about the size of each slice and what proportion of the whole this represents.

Year 6

This week the children have been working hard during the penultimate week of the Autumn Term. In English we have been writing persuasive leaflets on visiting a new tourist attraction in Florida. We were able to be creative by making up our own tourist attraction and using persuasive features to attract a certain audience. In maths we have remained resilient as we have got our teeth stuck into dividing

fractions. Although this is a tricky concept, we have enjoyed learning it by putting the method to use into real life concepts. We have finally finished reading our book, Hana's Suitcase, which was a very emotional but insightful read for the whole class. We finished the week by making our 2023 calendars.


This week's recommended read is for children aged 7+...

Southgate – Ultimate Football Heroes

Written by Matt and Tom Oldfield

From playground, to pitch, to manager's dugout, Southgate presents an entertaining, inspirational biography of the man who sparked new energy from the Three Lions, and new hope in England footie fans. Written with all the "I-could-almost-be-there" energy of a top match report, this new addition to the Ultimate Football Heroes series is a fast-paced page-turner.

The book opens with a thrilling scene many of us will remember — England's edge-of-your-seat penalty shoot-out against Italy in the UEFA Euro 2020 final. While the shot from Arsenal's golden boy Bukayo Saka was saved, meaning England lost the match, this opening chapter centres



a theme that runs through the book. Namely, Southgate's sense of togetherness and support of his players: "Remember, we win together and lose together. It was my decision for you to take that penalty and you were brave enough to step forward when I asked you to. So, be proud." We then skip back to Southgate's formative years and move through his days as a centre back for England, and his stint as Middlesbrough's captain, right up to the present day Well, almost – at the time of writing England have just topped their group at the 2022 FIFA World Cup. Come what may, fans of the beautiful game will take much from this.



 Never place candles near your Christmas tree or furnishings. Don't leave them burning unattended.

 Make sure your family and visitors staying for the festive period know what to do in an emergency.



4 On the 4th day of Christmas

 Decorations can burn easily. Don't attach them to lights or heaters.



6 On the 5th day of Christmas

 Never overload electrical sockets. Always switch Christmas lights off and unplug them before you go to bed.



6 On the 6th day of Christmas

 The risk of accidents, especially in the kitchen, is greater after alcohol is consumed.














 If you are planning to celebrate with fireworks, store them in a metal box, read the instructions, never go back to a lit firework and keep a bucket of water nearby.



 Make sure cigarettes are completely extinguished before you go to bed.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about



WHAT ARE THE RISKS? HiPal is a trending social media app which turns phones into walkie-talkies, allowing people to have voice conversations with friends or strangers. There are two account options: one for users aged under 12 and one for those aged 12 or above. The former has fewer features and limits interaction with strangers, enabling use of the walkie-talkie feature or photo sharing with friends and family only. The 12+ accounts offer more options, including adding strangers as friends, sharing photos and videos publicly, sending private messages and holding voice chats with strangers as well as friends

Almost immediately after our expert downloaded the app, strangers began to message privately – asking for provocative images or sharing explicit photos of themselves. Likewise, in the 'Explore' feed, many of the pictures and videos are innocent ... but some are far more salacious. There is always the risk of other users secretly saving a revealing photo and re-sharing it elsewhere.

NEED FOR VALIDATION

Some users – particularly girls – post photos on apps of this type hoping for positive reactions and comments to boost their self-esteem. Suggestive images tend to attract more flattering feedback, encouraging the user to post more frequently and with more explicit content. Conversely, receiving unkind comments about their picture can impact a young user's confidence and sense of self-worth.

Advice for Parents & Carers

EMPHASISE CAUTION

BUILD RESILIENCE

AVOID OVER-SHARING

Young people should think carefully about what they share in their profile, bio and posts. Talk to your child about not disclosing personal details such as phone numbers, other social media accounts or images which could reveal where they live or go to school. It's essential for children to recognise that strangers can assemble a detailed profile of someone based on things they can find online.

CONSIDER MENTAL WELLBEING

Many users on HiPal publicly share photos that are intended to be alluring in the hope of gaining more likes, friends and positive feedback – boosting their self-esteem and making them feel more self-assured. When young people regularly engage with social media platforms, it's important that parents and carers keep in mind the potential impact such platforms can have on mental wellbeing.




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
