



Solar lights are low-maintenance, cost-effective, and


come in a variety of styles such as pathway lights, string lights, and lanterns.

Recently rising in popularity among children and young people, Wizz is a social networking app that allows users to chat live with people from around the world. In similar fashion to a dating app, it facilitates conversations with people that users would not ordinary meet – but of course, making connections to individuals online bring its own self-evident potential safety issues.

While Wizz makes use of face recognition technology to assess users' age and group them by age group – but the software is far from perfect

and is no guarantee that some individuals won't attempt to exploit the app for sinister purposes. The guide examines Wizz in detail, identifying pitfalls that parents and carers should be aware of.

In the guide you'll find tips on a number of potential risks such as catfishing, explicit content, and examines how trusted adults can teach young people to avoid these possible threats.

SHOBNALL SHOWCASE!

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

Nursery

The children in nursery have been really excited this week as we have placed 12 eggs inside an incubator and are counting down to hatch day! We have lots of nonfiction books that we are using to learn more about chicks and will soon be chick experts! Through our Commando Joe's scheme of work, we were introduced to Eddie Empathy and worked as a team to rescue Mr Owl from a tree, bandaged up his poorly wing and found out what owls eat, by researching this online. We then found some food to help make him better. Commando Joe would be very proud of us! This week, we have also learnt about jungle animals and have compared the jungle environment to life in Burton. The children have shown brilliant creativity whilst making their jungle collages. They were super excited to share them, and we had lots of fun guessing which animals were hiding in the jungle. We linked this learning with our science where we have been exploring different habitats of animals. The children did a fantastic job at identifying the habitats of different animals!



Reception

It has been a brilliant week in Reception with lots of additional visitors to our class! The week began with the children exploring the celebration of Eid Al-Fitr! They enjoyed listening to the different ways some of their friends celebrated and they all had a fun packed afternoon completing a range of Eid based activities. The highlight of the afternoon was having the opportunity to have henna applied onto their hands.

The children have also been working hard at strengthening their maths and exploring different ways to make 6.

Forest School was fantastic as the children enjoyed creating portraits of the King and crowns using natural materials in preparation for the coronation!

Year 1

Year 1 have enjoyed learning about Judaism and the day of rest in RE and they have been reflecting on their favourite day of the week too. In English they have started their new topic, a narrative about hedgehogs. During Maths children have started to count in 2s, 5s, and 10s and have been looking at how to make equal groups. Well done Year 1!



Year 2

Year 2 have continued to work extremely hard in the lead up to SATs. In Maths they have learnt about equivalence of fractions and finding ¾ of an amount as well as how to tell the time to quarter past, half past, quarter to, o'clock and in increments of 5 minutes. Year 2 have continued to look at VIPERS questions each day with a specific focus on longer pieces of text. In the afternoons, the children started their new unit of learning in PSHE about relationships. The class read the story 'My Magic Family' and learnt about all the different types of families. Year 2 also learnt about 'My body, my choice' which taught the children about asking permission before giving people hugs and other forms of physical contact.

TADPOLE UPDATE: The Year 2 tadpoles continue to thrive in their classroom environment. They are now beginning to grow legs, have started eating fish flakes to support their growth and have a 'hammock' in the water so that they can begin to climb onto dry land and breath air!

Year 3

Year 3 have had a wonderful week in Science learning all about what makes our food healthy. In Maths, they have continued learning about mass and have been comparing and ordering kg and g. In English, we have started writing our explanation text about magnets. The children have also been learning all about sharing and community and how this links to Sikhism. All in all, a super week Year 3! Keep it up!

Year 4

Year 4 have had a wonderful week this week. In maths, the children have been learning how to divide a one- and two-digit number by 10 and I have been blown away by the children's understanding of the place value of this. In English, the children have created their own character to put in their story to raise awareness of the dangers of electricity and we have planned them ready to write next week. Across the


curriculum in Geography, we have been learning about different time zones around the world and we had a fantastic discussion to identify the need for different time zones around the world. The children have also created a double page spread comparing two different European countries! Furthermore, the children have continued to practise their timetables in preparation for their multiplication check and the hard work is really starting to pay off for all of the children. Year 5

Year 5 have had a great week learning about decimals to databases, and karma to keeping healthy!

In Maths, the children have continued strengthening their understanding of decimals and rounding. They have recalling their understanding of the place value of digits and working to round numbers to one decimal place. They have used number lines and place value counters to understand help them principles of rounding.

Our English writing topic has seen the children researching into what healthy eating is to enable them to write their draft version of their own







leaflet. It has been encouraging to see how much information the children could recall from last term's DT Food Technology topics about the Eatwell Guide and the importance of protein in the diet.

In RE, the children were discussing Karma, and the consequences of good and bad actions in Hinduism. Did you know that the game, snakes and ladders, was originally a Hindu game to show the impact of good and bad decisions in life?

In computing, we have been comparing the advantages and disadvantages of paper-based records and computer-based databases. The child had fun exploring databases about minibeasts and countries to compare the differences. Try asking your child if they can remember what a 'field' and what a 'record' are in databases!

Forest school gave children in year 5 the opportunity to make stamps for King Charles, and they enjoyed making necklaces and dens.

Year 5 have produced excellent written work this week across so many subjects!

Year 6

Year 6 have been working so hard this week with final preparations for their SATs. We had a mock SATs week to give them a taster of what the week will be like, and they have worked so hard. I am so proud of them all! In English we have been continuing with our recounts on Titanium. We finished the week with a cricket lesson. Keep up the hard work Year 6.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Wizz is a networking app which allows users to connect and chat with other people around the world Its principle is similar to a dating platform: users have a profile with up to three photos, along with optional interests and hobbies tags. This allows other like-minded people to be recommended in searches. If a user likes what they see on someone's profile, they can initiate conversation through the instant message feature; otherwise they swipe on. The app *does* use age verification technology when an account is created and groups users by age.

INTIMATE IMAGES

It's not unheard of for young people to be coaxed into sending suggestive images of themselves over apps of this kind. Given that Wizz connects users with strangers who may not be honest about their real intentions, a teenager might conceivably be persuaded to share sexually suggestive selfies by someone who they believed they had a trusting relationship with.

OVER-SHARING

Immediately after setting up an account, users start receiving friend requests (mainly from the opposite gender). For many young people, this will be excited and a boost to their confidence. As young people tend to be more trusting online and may believe what others tell them, however, this can lull them into dropping their guard and revealing personal information to strangers.

CATFISHING AND PREDATORS

Wizz uses Yoti, a digital ID system, to verify users' age. The AI only detects approximate age, though – so an older person who *looks* younger could be grouped with teens (or vice versa). Also, profile pics on Wizz don't have to match the face of the person who did the initial age. person who did the initial age verification: it would be fairly easy to create a fake account using another person's photos with a made-up name and age.

The app claims to provide a secure and inclusive environment, but our researcher couldn't find any parental controls or safety features in evidence. If you report another user for inappropriate behaviour, you are offered the option to block them – but there's no indication as to whether the no indication as to whether the block has actually been successful, and there was no follow-up contact from the developers.

SECRETS AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

Wizz sent our researcher occasional 'mystery' friend requests from a blurred-out profile. To discover the sender's identity, users can either watch a video (usually an ad for a game or app) or take out a monthly subscription. Cynics might suggest this could be a way to exploit young people's curiosity into making them pay for the app, and that the 'secret pay for the app, and that the 'secret admirers' are bots rather than real people

EXPLICIT CONTENT

on Wizz very quickly turned sexual. Users frequently suggested 'taking it to Snap' (Snapchat's disappearing image feature can make it conducive to sharing explicit selfies), connecting on other social media, swapping nude or semi-nude pictures, or holding sexual chats. These users created an impression of the platform being sleazy and unsafe for young people.

Advice for Parents & Carers

TALK IT OUT

your child has downloaded Wizz, talk to them about why they like and who've chatted with. Have they shared any personal details with this person or connected with them on other social media platforms? Refresh your child's memory of the various risks that can arise from engaging with strangers online and get them to consider using a similar app with more robust safety features.

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BE SUPPORTIVE

When connecting with strangers on apps like Wizz, seemingly innocent chats can quickly progress to become sexually explicit and lead to nudes being sent. Make sure your child knows to come to you if they're uncomfortable about anything they've been sent or been asked to send. If they've already shared something that they now regret, reassure them that you'll support them no matter what.

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Young people are far more inclined to see the good in others; they often overlook the fact that scammers set up fake accounts on apps like this with the intention of getting money or personal data. Remind them that not everyone online is who they claim to be, how easy it is for someone to create a bogus profile, and why it's vital to think twice about sharing anything on networking apps.

KEEP THINGS TRANSPARENT

It might feel awkward, but regular chats about your child's online life can be beneficial. If they seem suddenly anxious or secretive around their phone or tablet, they may have something they need to get off their chest. You could also consider not allowing digital devices in their bedroom, especially overnight — that's when a lot of the riskier conversations on apps like Wizz tend to take place.
