
We are always happy to advise in line with this guidance, so if you are still in doubt, please contact the school office if your child develops any symptoms and we can discuss this further with you.

Created in 2018 by a small indie studio that (at the time) had only four employees, Among Us has become one of the gaming world's biggest breakout hits of recent years.


In 2020, for example, it was the world's most-downloaded mobile game.

Its simplicity helped Among Us to resonate with younger players in particular: the game's second largest audience slice is the 13–18 age bracket.

While the 7+ age rating, emphasis on teamwork and cartoonish, colourful graphics all suit a young fan-base, however, the game does carry more serious risks than betrayal by a team-mate or an untimely on-screen demise – with in-game purchases and possible contact from strangers on the guide's list of hazards that trusted adults should bear in mind.

SHOBNALL SHOWCASE!

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

Nursery

We have been listening to a story based around the music of the 'Carnival of the Animals' where two boys disappear through a magical door and meet many different animals on their travels. We have loved practising our own lion and elephant movements in PE with Mr Attwood as well as using percussion instruments to represent our own animal sounds.

We have also been busy learning about our families and made comparisons between them. The Nursery staff brought family photos into school to share with the children, so that they could learn more about their key workers and make comparisons between families. Next week we look forward to looking at photos brought in from the children, as way of learning that all families are different and intend to display them on 'Our Family' tree in the classroom!

Reception

Our adventures in reception this week....

We have had a busy week exploring homes as part of our 'On Our Doorstep,' topic. We were surprised to find out about all the different types of homes people live in and enjoyed sharing all about our own.

It was great fun developing our story telling by adapting the three little pigs with the three little dogs and the big bad chicken! We retold the story with our new actions and used our writing toolkit to begin writing the story as a class.

The home theme continued as we carried out an exciting investigation to create a home for the pigs using sweets and cocktail sticks. We worked magnificently in our groups, discussing how we could make the house strong and helping each other to attach the different parts. We did a great job because when the big bad wolf dryer appeared it couldn't blow our houses down - we were so happy that the pigs were safe!

We also used a variety of construction to create homes for the pigs. It was fun using the large construction and we made some big houses















outside with some wonderful additions including a crate fence, post box and a leaf carpet.

Throughout the week we have been sharing all of the different places we have been caught reading! So far these include – Ava in the boot of a car, Jacob on the ghost train, Fred on a swing, Hamza on a bike and Elliot at Sudbury Hall!



Year 1

In English this week, the children have written their own version of 'The Gingerbread Man'. They have loved changing the main character and retelling from memory. I am so proud of all that they have achieved this week and how hard they have tried with their writing. In Maths, the children have been learning to use the <,>, and = signs to solve number sentences as well as ordering numbers in ascending and descending order. In COOL

time this week the children have been learning how to take turns and play a range of different board

games as well as creating some beautiful paintings. We also learned how to do some 'Happy breathing' in our Happy Mind session, which the children loved. Well done Year 1!

Year 2

Year 2 have had a great week beginning a new story for their English work. They have begun looking at 'Out of This World', which is a story set in space! The children have explored new vocabulary linked to the story and have generated some fantastic adjectives to describe space. In maths we have been looking at comparing numbers using inequality signs and practical resources. This week in Religious



Education we have been focusing on the story of 'The Good Samaritan'.' They have been thinking of times they have been helpful and supportive. Year 2 had another great week in Forest School exploring and trying new things! Well done, Year 2!

Year 3

Year 3 have had a great week! They started their Geography topic by locating countries in Europe using atlases to help. They have been learning retrieval skills in guided reading whilst studying the book George's Marvellous Medicine by Roald Dahl. In English they have been learning to use suffixes and casual conjunctions. Well done for a great week!

Year 4

Wow, what another busy week we have had in Year 4! In maths, the children have been looking at rounding to the nearest 10,000 and 1,000 and I have been so impressed with the children looking at the correct column on a place value grid to help them round up or down. In English this week, we have started our new unit looking at Hannibal and the second Punic war, which links well to our history topic. The children have been finding the meaning of key vocabulary and have used a timeline to order the events in chronological order. In French, the children have been describing people's appearance using their hair and eye colour to explain how they look. Finally, the children have enjoyed reading our class text, 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' and have been looking at different character profiles and how the author uses vocabulary to engage the reader. Another brilliant week Year 4! Keep it up!



Year 5

In English this week, Year 5 completed their diary entries, which were inspired by the Apollo 11 Moon Landing. It was fantastic to see how much they have learnt over the past four weeks as they applied it within their final piece of writing. All the children's writing was engaging and factual; a fantastic start to writing in Year 5! In Maths, the children have grasped addition and subtraction of 5-digit numbers easily. They have been able to use the column method to solve missing number problems, as well as solve multi-step word problems. In Science, the children explored the solubility of materials. They conducted an experiment to test whether different materials would dissolve in water. Year 5 couldn't believe some of the outcomes, including wax which shocked all the children as it did not dissolve and was still dry after being submerged in the water!

Year 6

This week in Year 6, we have been linking our learning together in English and Geography. In Geography, we named and located some countries in South America whilst identifying famous human and physical landmarks found there. Being able to see where Sao Paulo was in relation so Manaus on the map has really helped us in our English lessons to make sense of the distance Gilma has travelled to help her aunt and uncle on the farm in Manaus. Oscar and Joseph even brought in their own world map and globe for us to have a look at! On Wednesday, we investigated why shadows have the same shape as the objects that cast them by solving a real-life problem. Our mission assignment was to make sunbeds from Playdoh and use mini umbrellas to solve where the umbrella was best placed so that it provided maximum shade from the sun. We really enjoyed this session. We were very lucky to have had a visit from our local MP, Kate Kniveton on Thursday. She told us all about her life as an MP and we got the chance to ask some important questions. Towards the end of the week, we celebrated National Poetry Day and exploring the theme of Refuge. We listened to Micheal Rosen's poem 'On the Move Again' before creating our own poems. Some fantastic work was produced. I feel we have a class full of aspiring poets. Well done Year 6, a great week!

Reading Corner


This week's recommended read is for children aged 11+...

Private Peaceful

by Michael Morpurgo

It will seem odd when reading this book that the author enjoyed writing it the most of all the 90 or so he has written so far. That's because it's the one that most touched a nerve with him, that he was most passionate about and as a consequence he lost himself completely in it while writing.

The story of a young farm boy who took on the nightmare of the trenches in the First World War is essential reading not just for a child starting out in life but for parents of any age. It's a brilliant story about childhood, about growing up too young, it's about loss and friendships and love and war.



The author's anger at the appalling treatment of young men in the story is clear and the hope is that the British government will realise their wrong-doing and pardon ALL those young men whose story this was written for.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

MONGUS

A multiplayer 'social deduction' game set in outer space, Among Us enjoyed a surge in popularity in 2020, and has since maintained a dedicated fan-base (globally, around 60 million regular players each month) thanks to its unique nature, simple premise and ease of access across numerous platforms. The game's on-screen action revolves around danger, disguise and deception – and there are certain parallels to be drawn with some of the real-life risks that parents and carers of young Among Us players need to be aware of.



WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

SENSITIVE PREMISE

In Among Us, up to three players are secretly assigned to be alien imposters, tasked with murdering their colleagues while the survivors try to unmask them. While the concept's not far removed from traditional games like Wink Murder or TV shows such as The Traitors, some parents may feel uncomfortable about their child playing a video game in which deception and killing are prioritised.

VIRTUAL VIOLENCE

The on-screen death of characters may be fundamental to the gameplay of Among Us, but the majority of the animations depicting this are deliberately cartoonish and only appear very briefly. However, it is worth bearing in mind that the game has a PEGI age rating of 7 – meaning that certain elements (however heavily stylised they may be) could still upset some younger players.

CHAT BETWEEN PLAYERS

With up to 15 people participating in each game online, a large part of Among Us' appeal is speculating with fellow players who the imposters might be and making accusations. This dialogue through the in-game text chat can occasionally become heated – and could, of course, involve your child being put into contact with people (including adults) who they don't know in real life.



GOING OFF PLATFORM

While Among Us provides basic ways to communicate, many gamers prefer to use external services such as Discord: a popular app which offers voice and video chat functions. These undeniably make cooperation easier, but also create a potential route for children to hear inappropriate language – or for strangers to message them privately in an environment which isn't regulated by the game itself.

IN-GAME PURCHASES

Among Us is free to download on mobile devices, and costs less than £5 to obtain on console and PC. A related longer-term pitfall, though, is that the game also includes options to pay for upgrades such as removing ads on the mobile version or adding cosmetic touches to characters (such as different costumes). It's certainly possible that a child could spend a significant sum without realising it.



Advice for Parents & Carers

CONSIDER SOFTER ALTERNATIVES

Although Among Us is hugely popular with young gamers, it's possible that some children might find the murder themes unsettling. If so, plenty of similar social deduction games are available (in both digital and traditional board game formats) which downplay the potentially grislier elements: some centre around undercover spies, for instance, and there's even a Marvel superhero-themed variant.

CHAT ABOUT CHATTING

You might feel it's prudent to talk to your child about the risks associated with voice chat while gaming, explaining in particular that strangers online aren't always who they claim to be. Keeping the conversation relaxed will reinforce your child's confidence that they can always come to you with any online concerns – not just about Among Us, but any potential future issues as well.

DISCUSS DISCORD

In general, Discord is an excellent app for keeping online communities together because of its use of dedicated individual servers, which allow comprehensive control over who can join – and who can't. Once you're familiar with the platform, you could set up a secure server for your child and their friends to communicate during games of Among Us, with no access for people they don't know.

AMONG US, AMONG FRIENDS

When your child and their friends get together, they can enjoy a private game of Among Us by choosing a 'local' lobby – that is, only people connected to the same WiFi (your home network, for example) can enter. This prevents any random online users – who may be total strangers – from joining and removes the need for voice chat, as the players are all physically in the same location.

STOP SURPRISE SPENDING

If you're concerned about the possibility of your child racking up an unexpected bill on Among Us' microtransactions, you could consider using a prepaid card with a set limit. Likewise, you could specify in the game's options that adult authorisation is required for every purchase – or you could make sure that no payment methods are enabled on the device that your child plays the game on.
