

The children took part in a range of activities including creating their Eid lamps, mark making henna patterns and creating moon and star symbols for Eid.

Year 2 have had a great first week back! In English they have been creating and planning their own alternative fairytale narrative. They have enjoyed


Reception

It was great to find out that we will be having a minibeast adventure this half term as our topic is, 'A Bug's Life.' We began exploring this by sharing what we knew about minibeasts and what we would like to investigate further.



using their own imagination on how they can twist traditional fairytales, just like our model text 'Cinderelephant'. In maths this week they have been continuing to learn about multiplication and division within their 2's, 5's and 10's times tables. I must say the children are becoming real whizzes! In RE this week the children have been learning about Islam and how the religion has a sense of belonging and a wide community. The children have enjoyed talking about their own places that they feel that they belong to. Well done Year 2 in a hardworking week!

Year 3

Wow what a great first week Year 3 have had! We have also started a new writing unit in English about a mystery and the children are super excited to be able to begin writing their own! In Maths, we have been learning about fractions and the children have worked exceptionally hard on their times tables. We have also begun our new unit in science about light and reflection. Keep up the fantastic work Year 3!

Year 4

What a productive first week back we've had this week! In maths, the children have been applying their fractions knowledge that they learnt last term to identify fractions as decimals. In English, the children have been identifying the features of a poem in preparation for writing their own poem next week! Across the curriculum, the children have been investigating the true meaning of the noble 8-fold for Buddhists and have been understanding the difficulties and challenges that Buddhists may face to uphold the noble 8-fold at all times. In Science, the children have been investigating animals and their habitats and have also been identifying different food chains. As always, the children have continued to learn their timetables in preparation for their multiplication check with it only being roughly 6 more school weeks away! Well done Year 4, keep it up!

Year 5

Year 5 have had a brilliant first week back. In Maths, the children have moved onto learning about perimeter. They have been able to work out the perimeter of polygons and rectilinear shapes, as well as lengths of edges when the full perimeter has been given. The highlight of the week was Year 5's sunny and warm Forest School session! The children were ecstatic to be able to explore the area in springtime, but the glorious weather didn't stop them creating a mud slide and getting rather muddy (sorry parents)! All of the children were extremely helpful down at Forest School and worked on getting the area tided up. This included placing new stepping stones, creating a new fire pit, cleaning the outdoor classroom, rebuilding the fairy garden, as well as creating dens from repurposed logs. All-in-all, a fantastic first week back!

Year 6

This week in Year 6 the children have been busy in Maths investigating how shapes with the different perimeters can also have the same area. We also looked at the formula to work out triangles and used



this to help us do the inverse to calculate the length of one of the sides when the area was given. In English we are very excited as we are beginning to plan our own short stories where our aim is to create suspense and tension. In PSHE, we considered the importance of looking after our own mental health, considering the challenges daily life can present us with and what support can be put in place to help us. In Science, we looked at the function of the heart and what is meant by oxygenated and deoxygenated blood. We finished the week by celebrating Eid with all our peers. A great week!

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about



WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Despite launching in 2011, Township remains popular with children and adults alike. A city-building game with farming elements, it tasks players with developing their settlement and unlocking new features along the way. Aimed at the more casual gamer, it's mostly child friendly – but there are still some related risks to be mindful of.

MISLEADING PUBLICITY

Township's developers have previously faced criticism for advertising the game on social media by using clips of gameplay which can't actually be found in the final product. This may well lead to a child or young person downloading the game with severely misplaced expectations of what they'll be playing.

IN-GAME ADVER

While it's common for mobile games to feature in-game advertisements for other products and services, Township employs a particularly egregious strategy seen in several similar products. It offers users in-game currency in exchange for watching such adverts, which can obviously encourage young people to willingly expose themselves to marketing material.

IN-GAME PURCHASES

The game's core concept of building up a settlement to increase its population and income can feel slow paced at first – and players are incentivised to spend real-world money to move things along more quickly. That can mean handing over anything from £1.99 to £19.99 for these in-game boosts: amounts that can rapidly add up to a considerable sum if left unchecked.

TIME-CONSUMING **GAMEPLAY**

Township's gameplay loop of acquiring resources and reinvesting them into your little community is a fun one – but this rewarding sense of making progress can lead to players spending far more hours staring at the screen than they realise. There are also special in-game events which run for a limited time, designed to entice players into even longer gaming sessions.

ONLINE MULTIPLAYER MODE

After reaching level 19, players in Township can form a 'co-op' and unlock the option to exchange goods with up to 30 other users. Online multiplayer modes are nothing new, of course – but neither are the potential risks they pose to children and young people. Chances are, youngsters will be interacting with complete (and possibly much older) strangers within the game environment.

Advice for Parents & Educators

DISCUSS THE GAME IN ADVANCE

While older children may notice and understand that Township might be marketed in a potentially misleading way, it could be worth explaining to prospective younger players how and why the game differs from what's been advertised. This will help them to manage their expectations and avoid any possible disappointment if they do decide to download and play it.

BE WARY OF EXTERNAL SITES

Township's makers state that all in-game ads are age-appropriate: children won't be shown adverts recommending more violent titles, for instance. Even so, clicking on these adverts can take players out of the game and onto external sites that have nothing to do with Township or its developers: this raises the risk of children encountering inappropriate content or being tempted by online purchases.

MONITOR SPENDING AND SCREEN TIME

More modestly priced in-app bundles can be a welcome treat for a child wanting to speed up their progress in Township, but it's wise not to leave a linked payment method active in case a youngster gets carried away. Likewise, to prevent Township from causing an increase in screen time, parental controls on most devices allow limits to be placed on how long a game can be played each day.

TALK ABOUT ONLINE STRANGERS

Township's online multiplayer mode (as with any game which includes that functionality), is an avenue through which a child could be contacted by people who they don't actually know. It's worth reminding young Township fans, therefore, not to give out any personal information to strangers online – whether that's within the game itself or in the social networks associated with it.
