


Croaky: Quest for the Legendary Berry

Reception

We have had another fantastic week getting to know our new friends and carrying out the different routines of the day!

This week we thought carefully about our emotions and what happens to us when different feelings come to visit. We explored anger and shared what causes us to feel this big feeling and that it's ok to be angry. After sharing the story 'Ravi's Roar,' by Tom Percival we discussed the different tools we need to help us calm down!


"A fidget toy is good for popping." (Zaynab)

Year 1

Another amazing week in Year 1! The children have all been working extremely hard in becoming more independent and remembering to change their reading book in the morning as well as handing in homework books and their reading diaries. We are all so proud of how they are adapting to the challenges of being in Year 1. In English, we have been focusing on how to form letters correctly and ensuring that they sit properly on the line. In maths, we have been using a tens frame to represent amounts of objects and matching them with their numerical values. In COOL time, we have been learning about Queen Elizabeth II and creating a timeline of her life, learning the importance of technology as well as identifying technological items around the classroom. In our 'My Happy Mind' sessions we have been learning about Team H-A-P and neuroplasticity. Well done Year 1!

Year 2

This week, Year 2 embarked on their first Forest School session, and it was a fantastic experience for the children. They thoroughly enjoyed exploring the outdoors and engaging with nature, which has been a wonderful addition to their learning routine. In Maths, we've continued working with tens and ones, focusing

on recognising and creating different numbers. The students have been practicing their skills using tens frames and counters, showing great progress.

In English, we've introduced the use of commas in a list, and the children are quickly grasping this concept and applying it in their writing. Our history lessons have brought Guy Fawkes into the spotlight, sparking some fascinating discussions and learning opportunities. In Science,



we've been investigating different materials, sorting them into man-made and natural categories, which is enhancing the students' understanding of the world around them. Overall, Year 2 is settling in beautifully and engaging enthusiastically with their learning. Keep up the great work, Year 2!

Year 3

This term, students have been working on exciting projects across all subjects! In English, they planned and began writing their own informative texts about flowers, developing skills in research and structuring nonfiction writing. In Maths, they've been learning to partition numbers within 1000, strengthening their understanding of place value. Science lessons have explored the fascinating world of rocks, as students learned about the three types of rocks and their characteristics. In Art, they've been mastering the use of shading to add tone and depth to their drawings, and they've also learned the technique of frottage, where they create textured designs by rubbing surfaces with various materials. It's been a creative and knowledge-filled term!

Year 4

What another fantastic week that we have had in Year 4. I have been so impressed with how well the children have settled into the expectations of Year 4 and it was lovely seeing so many parents at Meet the Teacher on Tuesday afternoon. In maths, we have continued with our place value unit, and it has been wonderful to see the range of ways that the children have been able to display their answer. In English, the children have been researching their own country in preparation for writing their own persuasive text to convince people to visit that country on holiday! The children have also been exploring the potential dangers of electricity and even had the opportunity to start to build their own circuits! Furthermore, the children have started their history topic for this half term, and they have been investigating the timeline of the Roman Empire! Another brilliant week Year 4, well done!



Year 5

Year 5 have worked hard this week on building their classroom routines. Their aim for the year is to be the best class in the school, and they are certainly well on their way to achieving this! Tuesday saw the Year 5 children have their first swimming session! Mr Attwood said it was a great success but asks that all children remember to bring towels and underwear to put on afterwards! In History, the class learnt about the Tudor family tree and Henry VIII's many wives. In Science, Year 5 learnt about the properties of materials and whether they conducted electricity. The children are thoroughly enjoying their current whole class text in guided reading, which is 'Cirque du Freak'. It has been wonderful to see the progress that the children have made with their fluency, as well as how much they are enjoying this spooky text! Keep up the great work Year 5!

Year 6

We have had a great week in Year 6. We started the week with PE where we looked at dodging skills. In maths we have finished our unit on place value and where we revised rounding numbers and used number lines when working with negative numbers. We started our history topic on WW2 and are very interested in how it impacted Britain and the world. In science we explored how light travels, how we see things and how shadows are formed. In English we were exploring the use of hyphens to avoid ambiguity and used these to create compound adjectives to describe a pair of trainers. We ended the week with an RE lesson where we looked at the meaning of commitment and ways in which it can be shown. This is the first lesson on our unit in RE where we will look to answer the enquiry question 'What is the best way for a Muslim to show commitment to God?' Overall, a great week in Year 6. Well done everyone.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators SUPPORTING CHILDREN TO NACE CONFLICT EFFECTIVE

Disagreement is a natural part of human interaction. This can seem particularly true when dealing with the sensitive issues that arise for sec<mark>ondary-aged pupils. This g</mark>uide brings you 10 top tips which can help prevent conflicts arising or mitigate their impacts when they do.

INSPIRE RESPONSIBILITY

The best approaches to conflict resolution are restorative. This means that rather than adults imposing their own solutions on children who have had a disagreement, they should work with them. Allowing them to handle it can feel empowering to young people and will hopefully teach them to manage their own disputes as they move towards adult life.

ACTIVELY LISTEN

Remember to give every child the opportunity to voice their opinion, regardless of their age, stage of development, special educational needs, or other individual requirements. This can be done using a variety of different communication methods. For example, some children find it easier to express how they're feeling using pictures and drawings, while some prefer to write their ideas down.

BE CURIOUS

Demonstrating how to approach conflicts with a mature and empathetic mindset can set a good example to children, which can prove a useful skill for them later in life. Model this by asking inquisitive-yet-respectful questions about the issue at hand. Really try to understand where all parties are coming from, and share information between them when and where appropriate. This should encourage young people to mirror your behaviour, teaching them to be curious about the other sides of a conflict, and thus being more willing to hear them out.

Children and young people may come from a range of different backgrounds and cultures or have protected characteristics which may cause them to see things from various angles. Having a school and community culture which celebrates and embraces diversity in all things – including diversity of opinion – means people are more likely to feel heard and understood.

BE SUPPORTIVE

Discussions may be sensitive or, in some cases, even trigger negative emotions. Pupils may have mixed feelings about the issue at hand. They could be nervous or anxious before even coming to the table to talk about it. Try and create a space where all parties feel safe, welcome and comfortable. Allow breaks and time-outs if the conversation gets heated, to prevent anyone from saying something they might later

MENTALLY PREPARE

Think of how you can approach the conflict in a calm and regulated manner. Consider taking some extra time to prepare beforehand and finding somewhere quiet to relax. Even if you're not directly involved with the conflict, mediating can be a stressful experience in its own right. Make sure you're hydrated, fed and comfortable, and do the same for the young people involved. These may seem like insignificant factors, but it's important to remember that physical discomfort can trigger dysregulation, which can make it much harder to have a calm, productive conversation

GET YOUR FACTS STRAIGHT

Make sure you have all the facts, figures and timelines of the situation prior to the discussion. This should be done as objectively as possible with the aim of resolving the ongoing issue. You may want to risk assess any problems that may arise and look for possible solutions during your preparation time.

STICK TO THE POINT

Make the reason for, and purpose of, any meetings or communications clear prior to setting them up. Provide an agenda. Act as a neutral chairperson who can keep all parties on track. Make sure everyone has a chance to air their concerns about the issue being discussed and try to avoid talking about unrelated incidents. Close off with some action points, detailing what everyone can do to


BE SOLUTION FOCUSED

It's often said that the art of diplomacy is about giving others ladders to climb down. This means the main aim of any meeting or correspondence should be finding mutually acceptable and amicable solutions. Parents, carers, teachers and pupils should be aware there may need to be a compromise for the common good - and, most importantly, the good of the children you're supporting.

DON'T IGNORE OR AVOID CONFLICT

No one benefits from allowing concerns and grievances to fester, as this can lead to further division and mistrust, and ultimately doesn't help the children involved. Use our tips to open meaningful lines of communication. These should help you find a suitable resolution and minimise the number of conflicts you're faced with mediating overall.
