Online gaming enjoys an apparently ever-increasing level of popularity, and many players are eager to connect with one another as they enjoy a friendly competition or go for the win side by side. Whether it's to strategise and coordinate, or simply have a chat as you indulge in your hobby, the fact remains that plenty of games now offer means for their players to talk to one another, be that in a text or voice format.

Unfortunately, this functionality – which is used to connect with strangers just as often as it is with friends – poses several risks to younger players, and it's vital for parents and educators to understand these safety concerns. This free guide offers

expert advice on the issues that may arise when using in-game chat, and lets you know how to safeguard the children in your care as they make use of this technology.

#### **Shadow Creatures**

Written by Chris Vick

Inspired by his own family history, Chris Vick has written a compelling and fascinating novel, which not only illuminates a little-known aspect of World War 2 history, but also evocatively weaves in the culture, language, folklore and legends of Norway.

The story is cleverly preceded with a scene from now with Georgy on holiday asking Bestemor (grandmother) Tove and Grandtant (great-aunt) Liva about the old woman encountered in the woods and learning what happened to all of them all those years ago. This demonstrates the point that we do need to capture these stories before the generations that experienced them disappear altogether.



Tova and Liva share the storytelling and their different perspectives on the action as it happens, this adds to the dramatic tension and reveals the very different characters of the sisters, who were just 12 and 9 when the German occupation started. They are telling the old woman's story too, for this is Agna, the free-spirited outsider in their village, hero worshipped and followed everywhere by Liva, who is determined to resist the rules and restrictions imposed by the invaders. With fishing and hunting forbidden, food rationed, books burnt, and the school curriculum Nazified, there is lots to resist.

## SHOBNALL SHOWCASE!

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

#### **Nursery**

Our adventures in Nursery this week...

It has been another fantastic week of learning in Nursery this week.

The children had lots of fun noticing number 1 and 2 and used some fantastic subitising skills to describe what they had noticed. We also used our maths learning from this week to notice 1 and 2 in the environment with some interesting discoveries including some conkers, tree trunks, bins and trays!

Back in the classroom, the children enjoyed using some of their findings to create a range of autumn crafts!

Later in the week the children explored a range of musical instruments and had fun making their musical shakers and talking about what sounds it makes.

#### Reception

Our adventures in Reception this week...

This week we have continued our home theme by exploring our locality. We had fun spotting and sharing some of our favourite places to visit which included The Meadowside Leisure Centre, Shobnall Park, Costco, Garden King, convenience stores and Barton Marina!

After sharing the story, 'If I Built a House,' by Chris Van Dusen we thought carefully about how we would design our own homes. We then drew some fabulous pictures and explained our creations.



"It's an Elsa House, made of ice from Elsa's magical powers. It's all blue my favourite colour." (Minnie)

"Hot wheels house and it will have a slide to get inside the window." (Jaheem)

"Mine will be a fish tank it will have fish tanks for the windows and a water slide to swoosh down." (Freddie)

We then saw some pictures of some very strange houses that people live in which included, a giant teapot, a home in the shape of a dog, a giant shoe and even an upside-down house with the chimney for a door!

Our maths adventures have included sorting, comparing and matching. We had a great time sorting flower petals into different colours, shapes and sizes. We then matched various sets together at our colourful tea party where we used the petals to make soup, tea and rose bubble juice.

#### Year 1

In maths, the children have been learning to compare different numbers. They have been using the vocabulary greater than, less than, and equal. The children enjoyed using cubes and lollipop sticks to demonstrate different number sentences. In English, the children have been continuing to write simple sentences with full stops and capital letters. They are working exceptionally hard to segment and write key words. In history, we have been continuing our learning about Queen Elizabeth II and have created a fact file about her life. Miss Barker was impressed with how much all the children could recall from our previous lesson. In geography, we have been labelling the countries that make up the UK, using our map skills. As



part of National Poetry Day, Miss Barker shared some different poems with the class. The children thoroughly enjoyed hearing lots of different types of poems. Keep up the hard work Year 1!

#### Year 2

This week Year 2 has been full of exciting learning and hands-on activities! In English, we've been exploring a real diary entry written at the time of The Great Fire of London. The children have been fascinated by the historical details and are eager to learn more. In Maths, we've been focusing on number bonds, with lots of engaging activities to help build their confidence with


numbers. Our Forest School session was a huge success, with the children practicing fire striking, making creative mud faces on trees, and crafting beautiful fire scenes inside jars. They topped it off with a cozy treat of hot chocolate and biscuits! In Science, we've been exploring how stretchy different materials are, which has sparked plenty of curiosity and excitement. To finish off the week, the children absolutely loved their first martial arts session on Thursday and can't wait for the next one!

#### Year 3

This week, our Year 3 students have been engaged in a variety of exciting activities! In English, they've been diving into the text "Cave Challenge," exploring new vocabulary and discussing the emotions of the young explorers who discovered the Stone Age caves in France. In Maths, they've begun their unit on addition and subtraction, focusing on number bonds within 1000. In RE lessons, the children have been learning about Sikhism, including the significance of the K's and the Khalsa. Finally, in science, they've been discovering how fossils are formed and even had the opportunity to create their own fossils!

#### Year 4

What another great week the children have had in Year 4! In maths, the children have been looking at adding 2 four-digit numbers together and I have been so impressed with how well the children have done with this and the presentation of their work has been exceptional! In English, the children have written up their persuasive text to convince me to visit their selected country and it has been great to see how far the children



have progressed with their English in only a matter of weeks. Finally, at the start of the week, the children conducted a scientific investigation to identify conductors and insulators, and the children loved adding in different objects to see if it would conduct electricity! Another wonderful week Year 4! Well done!

#### Year 5

As always, Year 5 have had a jam-packed week full of learning. In Maths, the children have been learning about addition and subtraction strategies using the column method, which they have flown through! In English, Year 5 completed and published their diary entries about the Apollo 11 moon landing. It has been wonderful to see the children's enthusiasm around this writing topic, and their published pieces of writing are wonderful...there will certainly be some pen licenses being handed out as a result! A highlight of the week was the children's French lesson on Wednesday, where the children learnt about body parts, as well as masculine and feminine nouns. Year 5 were able to translate descriptions of French 'Monster Pets', as well



as write their own descriptions in French. Bravo les enfants, continuez votre excellent travail!

#### Year 6

This week in Year 6 the children have been learning how to multiply a four-digit number by a two-digit number using short multiplication. Although we found this tricky at first, we have persevered with it, and we are now starting to understand the method. On Wednesday we started our new English unit on narratives. We looked at the model text called 'A Jaguar in the Chicken Coop'

and then create a fact file all about Jaguars in the Amazon Rainforest. This fits nicely with our afternoon topic in geography as we looked at naming and locating countries in South America. For poetry day on Thursday, we heard from different poets on Authorfy. In Science we looked at how shadows can change dependent on distance between the light source and the object. Overall, a great week in Year 6.

Once you have made your nomination and, in the weeks, leading up to the ceremony, please be advised that we will be in contact with you to request supporting evidence, which you should provide to the student's headteacher. Please be advised that you will be notified shortly after this process has taken place to let you know whether your nomination has been successful.

Please provide as many specific details about the achievement as possible, ensuring that you provide full details of which sport/ instrument (eg), the achievement involves.

If successful, pupils will be invited to meet with their headteacher to receive their very special gold pin badge award and certificate of exceptional achievement. At the end of each term students and their parents will be invited to attend a short celebratory event with a senior colleague from John Taylor MAT.

## What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

# IN-GAME CHAT

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Video games are continuing to grow in popularity – including, of course, among children and young people – and the emergence of gaming communities has been accelerated by the inclusion of chat functionality across many different titles. While in-game chat isn't inherently a bad thing, it can create some concerns about online safety and the people that children might be interacting with.

## DIFFERENT TYPES OF CHAT

There are a number of ways that gamers commonly chat with one another online. As the name would suggest, in-game chat happens within the game itself. There's also party chat: a group voice conversation that console users can have with anyone on the same platform. This tends to be more commonly used by players who already know each other. Finally, many gamers – especially on PC – will chat via a third-party app such as Discord.

### CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

Whether it's text- or voice-based, in-game chat is frequently open to all players to use. Many games default to making it an opt-in function, but some don't: meaning a child could start seeing messages within the game from people they're playing with, regardless of whether they know those individuals or not. While most strangers won't necessarily have ill intent, there are some who may behave inappropriately when chatting to a child – intentionally or otherwise.

## DANGER OF GROOMING

It's been reported that some young gamers have encountered older players online who pretend to be a lower age to manipulate children, sending gifts in exchange for chatting and sending photos. Just as on any messaging platform, it's good to advise young people to avoid speaking to strangers; emphasise that they shouldn't accept gifts from anyone online that they don't know.

## **BULLYING AND ABUSE**

While some in-game chat can turn toxic because of how a match plays out, others turn that way because of people who engage in trolling – in essence, behaving in an offensive and abusive way simply to cause pain or get a rise out of whoever they're talking to. These 'trolls' often lean on racial slurs, anti-LGBT sentiment and other hateful rhetoric; they normally feel most confident preying on younger, more impressionable gamers.

## POTENTIAL FOR PRIVATE CHAT



If a player would like a re-match with a stranger after meeting them in the game, they can send a friend request, or use the party chat together in the future. For the most part, this is harmless – but it might lead to messages being exchanged in private. This could then escalate to the sharing of private information, and potentially attempts to manipulate or scam younger players.

## COMPETITIVE ATMOSPHERE



Certain games are very competitive, and players can sometimes get upset if they feel a teammate is underperforming, an opponent won unfairly, or they're just a bad loser. This can lead to unpleasant messages that stray away from playful 'trash talk' and wander into the territory of bullying. Some players have been known to get incredibly abusive in situations like this, and the impact of this on a young gamer's emotional wellbeing could be severe.

# Advice for Parents & Educators

## LOCK-DOWN IN-GAME CHAT

In-game chat can often be disabled in the game's settings. This allows children to play without risk of contact from strangers – but it will need to be done in each individual game. Text chat appears in the corner of the screen in many titles, so it's normally easy to take a quick glance and see what's being said. With voice chat, explain to children what behaviour is inappropriate, so they can spot the dangers themselves.

#### REPORT POTENTIAL OFFENDERS

Most games offer a robust means of reporting other players, so you can flag an account as potentially harmful. This normally leads to the account not being matched with yours in the future and, if that person's conduct breaks any of the game's rules, they may be banned from playing entirely. This is done within the game itself, so each title has a slightly different process, but these tend to be designed for simplicity.

### **CONSIDER OTHER CHAT OPTIONS**

If a child wants to play with people they know, consider using party chat or a third-party service like Discord. This allows everyone involved to chat on a private server and even enjoy each other's company while playing different games. It's also far more secure, as anyone looking to join will need to request and be granted access – normally by whoever is hosting the chat.

### **COMMUNICATION IS KEY**

Make sure children understand the differences between being competitive and being abusive. Talk about what constitutes unusual or inappropriate behaviour from strangers online. Be clear that if anything ever concerns or worries them, they should tell a trusted adult as soon as possible. Empower children to identify the risks of in-game chat for themselves and reassure them they won't get in trouble for seeking help if anything goes wrong.
