### Shobnall PFA Christmas Market – Friday 6 December 2024, 3.30pm – 5.30pm

This year's Christmas Market on Friday 6 December 2024 will start at 3.30pm and will finish at 5.30pm. A separate letter has been issued outlining the plans and requests in more detail. As a reminder:

The PFA will be running a 'street food' stall at the Christmas Market. If you are able to donate any cakes or Asian food, the PFA would be very grateful if this could be labelled with ingredients to support those with allergies. Also, if possible, please could you indicate if it is suitable for



vegetarians or not? They ask that these are donated on the morning of the Market, so that all food products are as fresh as possible and will ensure that any containers are returned to you the following week via your child. Also, you are more than welcome to bring your own containers along to the event should you wish to have a 'takeaway' option!

- If you have any unwanted items for the bric-a-brac stall (i.e., toys, books, games etc.) that are in good condition, the PFA are happy to accept these donations in school from now. The PFA are also looking for any second-hand Christmas-themed items, such as decorations, to sell alongside as well.
- On the day itself, the children (and staff) are allowed to come to school in non-uniform! Christmas jumpers are permitted! The charge for this is for pupils in EYFS and Key Stage 1 to bring in a chocolate item (value of at least 50p) and pupils in Key Stage 2 to bring a bottle!
- Santa has confirmed his attendance! Tickets are available from Monday 2 December to Friday 6 December inclusive in front of the entrance to the key stage 2 playground before and after school, priced at £3.00. Included with the price this year is a selection box and you are more than welcome to take your own photos of your child/ren with Santa. Please note that payment will be <u>cash only</u> for these.
- If anyone would, or knows of anyone who would, like to hire a table at a charge of £10 for their own stall, please let the school office know and we can pass on details to the PFA.


### **Reading Corner**

### Attendance

Please read the <u>NHS 'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance</u> which has further information if you are unsure whether to send your child to school or not.

Children can come to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This includes general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose, or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above.

Please note, we can only accept and administer **prescribed medicines** that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration and dosage.



When reporting an absence, please could we ask that parents contact the school office <u>before 9.30am</u> and state clearly reasons for absence.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

### Nursery

Our adventures in Nursery this week...

This week we have been sharing the story of The Three Billy Goats Gruff and completed some wonderful activities including re-telling the story in our role play area.

During our Concept Cat work, we have focused on the word most and have been sorting toys between different characters to identify who had the most.

We had an exciting time learning new songs for our Christmas performance. It has been fun practicing on the stage, we have all listened to instructions brilliantly.

### Reception


Our adventures in Reception this week...

We started off the week with a surprise in our classroom! We had lots of different objects including a bear, moon, lots of stars and a gift bag with Reception Class on the tag. We tried to solve the mystery by looking at all the different clues. Eventually, we found that all the clues linked to a wonderful story called, 'Whatever Next.' By Jill Murphy.

After sharing the story, we explored it further through activities such as story sequencing, rocket designing and galaxy playdough patterns. We even re-enacted the story – that was lots of fun!

Later in the week we used the story to create a story map and made actions for some of the words. We enjoyed retelling the story in this way.

Throughout the week we have also been practicing our Christmas performance! We sat beautifully on the stage and have started to learn some exciting new songs. It has been interesting learning about the Christian story of Jesus' birth and discussing the different characters.



### Year 1

Year 1 children have been completing lots of art this week as part of our 'Make our Mark' unit, where they had to work collaboratively to create a group piece of art. The children were provided with a range of different media (pastels, chalk, wax crayons, felts, pencils and biros) and had to listen to a piece of music while creating a drawing based on the sea. Miss Barker was so impressed with what the children created, and they are being displayed in the KS1 corridor for all the children to see. In English, the children have been learning to write in past and present tense as well as using full stops and capital letters. In maths, we have been continuing to develop our understanding of subtraction. A great week in all - well done Year 1!

### Year 2

What a fantastic week it's been in Year 2! The children have been working incredibly hard and making great progress in all areas of learning and I'm excited to share some of the wonderful activities and achievements we've been involved in recently!

In English, we've been diving into the world of storytelling. The children have thoroughly enjoyed creating their own portal stories, and it's been a joy to watch their imaginations come to life through their writing. Every day, they are becoming more confident in expressing their ideas and developing their skills as writers.

In Art, we've been exploring the fascinating world of pottery. This week, the children have been creating their own pinch pots, inspired by the work of artist Ranti Bam. It has been amazing to see their creativity shine as they shape and mould their pots.

In PSHE, we've been focusing on kindness. We've been discussing how important it is to show kindness not only to others, but also to ourselves. The children have explored the many ways we can be kind to the people in our community—whether that's our family, friends, classmates, or the wider world. It has been heartwarming to see how the children are reflecting on the impact of kindness and how we can spread positivity wherever we go.

Excitingly, the children have also received their parts for the Nativity and are absolutely thrilled! They've been practising their lines and already know most of the words to the songs. It's wonderful to see their enthusiasm, and I'm sure their performance will be something very special.

### Year 3

This week, Year 3 have been busy and creative in their learning! In English, the children have been drafting and editina their reports about football, working hard to improve their writing with thoughtful edits. In Maths, they've started an exciting new unit on multiplication and division, exploring different methods and strategies to solve problems. In DT, the class has combined creativity with electronic science, creating posters about the Stone Age by adding simple circuits with a bulb to light up their designs. It's been a week full of curiosity and hands-on learning!

### Year 4

What a lovely week we have had in Year 4 this week! In children maths, the have continued to excel with their multiplication and division unit, and we have been looking at the 7 times table this week, which some of the children found difficult to remember. In English, we have started our new unit looking at narratives around the dangers of electricity and the children cannot wait to write their own narrative on this topic! The children have also been looking at the different types of teeth in science and were fascinated to learn about the number of teeth



that humans have within their lifetime. In history, the children have been looking at the importance of the Colosseum for the Romans and even had an opportunity to act out what it was like inside the Colosseum! Finally, the children have enjoyed another fantastic yet freezing afternoon at Forest School. They had the opportunity to build dens, create a mud slide and even use the fire lighting equipment! Another wonderful week Year 4, **well done!** 

### Year 5

Year 5 have had a productive and exciting week filled with challenging tasks and creative projects!

In Maths, they have been delving deeper into fractions, tackling complex problems involving adding and subtracting mixed-number fractions, as well as mastering the tricky concept of finding the lowest common denominator.

In English, the children have been crafting their alien invasion stories. After planning their imaginative plots complete with unexpected twists and turns to captivate their readers—they have drafted their opening paragraphs. They've also begun skilfully incorporating dialogue between characters to drive their narratives forward, a challenging technique they've embraced with great success.

In Science, Year 5 analysed the results of last week's experiment on recovering a solute from a solution using evaporation. They wrote outstanding conclusions, demonstrating their understanding of the process and proving their hypotheses correct.

Thursday brought an exciting change of pace, as the children participated in a martial arts workshop. They thoroughly enjoyed learning how to coordinate their movements, focusing on controlled footwork and precise punches. Most importantly, they took away a valuable lesson: the best form of self-defence is using your words.

Well done, Year 5!

### Year 6

We have had a great week this week in Year 6. In maths we have been learning how to multiply and divide fractions by integers. In English we have looked at features of a diary recount and cannot wait to begin writing our own diary in the perspective of a child during WW2 who had been evacuated. On the topic of WW2, I am so impressed with all of the children's projects that they have been working on over the last 6 weeks. I can see the hard work and determination that has gone into such an array of different projects. It was lovely when we shared them with the class on Thursday. I am so proud of all of the children. We as a class cannot wait to show you them in our class assembly next Thursday. In our other topic learning this week, we have looked at the Christmas Story in RE and what is meant by the term incarnation and in computing we designed and created our own websites.

# 10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators **EDUCATING CHILDREN ON** SPENDING AND SAVING

Evidence shows that children's spending habits begin to form as early as seven years old. With primary schools in England not required to teach financial literacy, many young people are reaching adulthood without knowing the basics of budgeting. This guide explains how to teach young people about money in a practical way, giving them the understanding to become savvy spenders and savers.

### **PROVIDE POCKET** MONEY

Giving children money – even a small amount – can help them learn to make their own budgeting decisions about how to spend or save it. Research shows that youngsters who receive pocket money are more likely to become adults with strong financial skills and significantly less

### **USE A PREPAID CARD**

Being able to pay by card is essential these days, with some retailers not accepting cash since the pandemic. Prepaid debit cards are available for children from the age of six, allowing them to get used to spending like they will as adults with no risk of dipping into an overdraft. Learning about money is like learning to swim – you need to get in the pool and have a go!

### PRACTISE BORROWING 3

Although official borrowing is only available to over 18s, kids need to understand how debt and interest works before they become adults and are exposed to credit cards or 'buy now, pay later' schemes. For a safe means of teaching them about this, parents could offer them extra pocket money but explain that it needs to be paid back by a certain date, plus an extra couple of pounds as interest.

### ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATION 4

Chatting about money and how much things cost will teach children that finance is a part of everyday life and not some "scary adult thing". Parents can involve them in budgeting for the weekly shop, for example, working together to get everything on the list while keeping the total below a certain number. Letting young ones make spending decisions in a safe space can build up their confidence regarding money.

# DISCUSS THE PRESSURE TO SPEND

# TELLING 'NEED' FROM 'WANT'

Learning how to prioritise spending is an important life skill: the difference between life's essentials and "nice to haves" is key to budgeting. If children pester you for treats while shopping, it's the perfect time to say "That's a want. We're getting our needs first." You could show how you budget for food, electricity and so on before buying fun things.

# **ENCOURAGE SAVING**

Getting children saving early can set them up with a useful habit for their adult life. Suggest that they set something aside every time they receive money and help them set a target for how much to put away, so they feel motivated to continue. For example, encouraging them to save for a friend's birthday gift can get children much more invested in what they buy.

### SPARK INTEREST 8 IN INTEREST

Motivate children by telling them about interest; you can describe it as a reward for saving money. Explain how everything they put away will grow over time. As an exciting example, explain that 1p doubled every day for a month would amount to approximately £10 million. Some prepaid cards for young people also offer interest; parents and carers could also add a little to supplement what their child saves and show how it works.

## **PAYING FOR CHORES**

This is a complex debate with no right or wrong answer: it depends on what works for each individual family. However, it can be one of the best ways to teach children that money needs to be earned and helps to create more mindful spenders. If parents aren't keen on paying for everyday chores, they could ask the children to suggest their own ideas for earning a little extra

PROTECT CHILDREN FROM SCAMS 10

Whether it's YouTube ads or a hint of envy at a friend's recent purchase, spending triggers are everywhere. Encourage children to notice how clever shop design (like placing sweets at the checkout) and offers such as '2 for 1' deals entice us to spend more. Challenge them to resist impulse buys by getting them to sleep on it before deciding to spend.

Scams are a terrifyingly easy way to lose money, and children are generally more likely to be taken in due to a lack of experience with these financial criminals. As a minimum, make sure they're aware of the most common scams they could be exposed to - by text, email and phone, for instance. Young people should tell a trusted adult about any unexpected message or call and never give out their personal information.
