#### Shobnall PFA Christmas Market – Friday 6 December 2024, 3.30pm – 5.30pm

This year's Christmas Market on Friday 6 December 2024 will start at 3.30pm and will finish at 5.30pm. A separate letter has been issued outlining the plans and requests in more detail. As a reminder:

The PFA will be running a 'street food' stall at the Christmas Market. If you are able to donate any cakes or Asian food, the PFA would be very grateful if this could be labelled with ingredients to support those with allergies. Also, if possible, please could you indicate if it is suitable for vegetarians or not? They ask that these are donated on the morning of the Market, so that all food products are as fresh

as possible and will ensure that any containers are returned to you the following week via your child. Also, you are more than welcome to bring your own containers along to the event should you wish to have a 'takeaway' option!

- If you have any unwanted items for the bric-a-brac stall (i.e., toys, books, games etc.) that are in good condition, the PFA are happy to accept these donations in school from now. The PFA are also looking for any second-hand Christmas-themed items, such as decorations, to sell alongside as well.
- On the day itself, the children (and staff) are allowed to come to school in non-uniform! Christmas jumpers are permitted! The charge for this is for pupils in EYFS and Key Stage 1 to bring in a chocolate item (value of at least 50p) and pupils in Key Stage 2 to bring a bottle!
- Santa has confirmed his attendance! Tickets are available from Monday 2 December to Friday 6 December inclusive in front of the entrance to the key stage 2 playground before and after school, priced at £3.00. Included with the price this year is a selection box and you are more than welcome to take your own photos of your child/ren with Santa. Please note that payment will be <u>cash only</u> for these.

Recent user numbers for the messaging app Snapchat currently sit at approximately 800 million and figures from data gathering company Statista indicate that roughly 20% of those users are under 18. That's a lot of young people participating in this sprawling social media platform, many of whom are potentially unaware of the associated risks.

It can be tricky to know how to safeguard younger users on Snapchat but we aim to show you how, while also giving you in-depth knowledge of the online safety risks posed by this platform.

#### Attendance

Please note, we can only accept and administer **prescribed medicines** that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration and dosage.

When reporting an absence, please could we ask that parents contact the school office <u>before</u> <u>9.30am</u> and state clearly reasons for absence.

Let's have a sneaky peek as to what has been going on in our classrooms this week...

#### Nursery

Our adventures in Nursery this week...

This week we have continued practicing our Christmas performance and it has been lots of fun trying on our costumes. We can sing the songs brilliantly and have a great time adding the actions.

During our Concept Cat work, we have focused on the vocabulary, 'next to.' We practiced this in many ways including using the Concept Cat house by placing the cat next to various objects.

#### Reception

Our adventures in Reception this week...

This week we have shared the story, 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt,' by Michael Rosen. We enjoyed bringing the story to life by going on our own bear hunt. We also used lots of great vocabulary linked to our maths learning as we crept under the cargo net, walked around the moon, ran through the space station and stood next to the space rocket.

We have also been busy having fun practicing our Christmas performance. It has been great fun singing, dancing and trying on our costumes. We are so excited to share it with our grown-ups next Tuesday and Wednesday.



#### Year 1

The children have had a wonderful time in English and are beginning to use the personal pronoun I, finger spaces and have been learning to read and write common exception words. Miss Barker is really impressed with all the children and how they are now beginning to apply their phonetical knowledge of phase 3 and 5 to

spell words. In maths, we have been continuing to add and subtract using a number line as well as solving some addition and subtraction word problems. During our afternoon sessions, we have been continuing with our rehearsals for our Christmas nativity. The children's singing and dancing skills are amazing. In our RE lessons, we have been looking at the gifts Christian's give to Jesus at Christmas, as well as looking at weather symbols in geography. Well done Year 1.

#### Year 2

This week in Year 2, we've had an exciting and productive time! We've been practicing hard for our upcoming nativity play, and the children are absolutely loving it. Their enthusiasm and creativity are shining through as they prepare for the performance.

In English, we've been working on our portal stories, and the children are nearly finished with the drafts of their imaginative tales. It's been wonderful to see their ideas come to life on paper!

We've also begun our geography lessons, starting with learning about compasses and labelling them. The children were very engaged, and we're looking forward to diving deeper into our studies.

To wrap up the week, we went on a walk around our local area, where we explored what's around us. We used all our senses to observe and describe the sights, sounds, and even smells of our community—although maybe not as much tasting!

It's been a fantastic week full of learning and fun, and we're excited for the weeks ahead!

#### Year 3

This week, Year 3 children have been busy with an array of exciting activities across the curriculum! In English, the children have completed editing their football reports and proudly published their final pieces – well done! In maths, they've been working hard on multiplying and dividing by 2 and 3, showing great determination. History lessons have taken them back in time to the Stone Age, where they explored how people lived, built models of Stone Age houses, and even wrote imaginative diary entries from the perspective of Stone Age people. They also investigated primary and secondary sources to uncover fascinating facts about this period. In science, the focus has been on the human skeleton, with the children learning to name and label its key parts. It's been a week full of creativity, discovery, and learning!

#### Year 4



In Year 4 we spent a chilly but enjoyable afternoon in

Forest School. We worked in teams to build dens and played different characters in role play scenarios. Some of us constructed an Autumnal art project using natural resources. We enjoyed a lovely hot chocolate and biscuit. In Maths we have been focusing on our 7 times table, investigating number facts and explaining our reasoning in detail. In writing our focus has been on information texts, considering features that make them unique. We have shown some great examples of focus this week in class, and are looking forward to our Christmas fair!

#### Year 5

Year 5 have had an amazing time on their residential trip to Whitemoor Lakes this week, as you will have read from the report at the beginning of the newsletter! Check out our X (Twitter) page for many, many posts documenting their time at the centre.

Year 6

This week in Year 6 we have started to write up our diary recounts from the perspective of an evacuee in WW2. We have enjoyed doing our class assembly on WW2 and we did really well. In DT we have been thinking of ideas about how to make our own electrical toys. We are so excited to see how they turn out. In maths we have been adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing fractions in all different ways. Year 6 have been enjoying making circuits in science on the computers.

## What Parents & Educators Need to Know about AP STREAK

Snapchat is a messaging app which allows users to send images, videos and texts to others. Its best-known feature is that anything sent 'disappears' 24 hours after it's been viewed; however, users are known to take screenshots or use another device to obtain a photo of their screen. In 2023, Snapchat added a chatbot function called 'My AI'.

My AI is Snapchat's new chatbot, which replies to questions in a human-like manner. However, the software is still in its infancy and has significant drawbacks, such as biased, incorrect or misleading responses. There have already been numerous reports of young users turning to AI for medical help and diagnoses, which could be inaccurate and therefore potentially dangerous.

## PREDATORS AND SCAMS

Predators can exploit Snapchat's disappearing messages by, for example, telling a user they have naked photos of them and will post them unless they're paid. Snapchat's own research found that 65% of teenagers had experienced this – on this app or others. This likely isn't helped by 'SnapMaps' – a feature which highlights your exact position in real-time. This is meant to help friends keep track of each other, but could be used for more sinister reasons.

### **MY EYES ONLY**

Snapchat has a hidden photo vault called 'My Eyes Only'. Teens can conceal sensitive photos and videos from parents and carers in this folder, which is protected by a PIN. You can check for this by clicking on the icon which looks like two playing cards. This takes you to the 'Memories' folder which stores photos, stories and the My Eyes Only folder.

## SCREEN TIME ADDICTION

GERESTRICTION

Snapchat prioritises user engagement, with features like streaks (messaging the same person every day to build up a high score). The app also has sections called 'Discover' and 'Spotlight', which show tailored content to each user. However, this could also be seen as an attempt to hook users into watching videos endlessly. Furthermore, constant notifications can lure people into using the app.

## **INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT**

Some content on Snapchat simply isn't suitable for children. The hashtags used to group content are determined by the poster, so even an innocent search term could still yield age-inappropriate results. The app's 'disappearing messages' feature also makes it easy for young people to share explicit images on impulse – so sexting continues to be a risk associated with Snapchat.

## **ONLINE PRESSURES**

Although many of Snapchat's filters are designed to entertain or amuse, the 'beautify' effects on photos can set unrealistic body image expectations – creating feelings of inadequacy in younger users. Snapchat now also has 'priority' notifications (which still get displayed even if a device is in 'do not disturb' mode), increasing the pressure on users to log back in and interact.

## Advice for Parents & Educators

## **UTILISE PARENTAL CONTROLS**

Snapchat's 'Family Centre' lets you view the details of the child's account their friends list and who they've spoken to in the last week – and report any concerns. You must invite a child to the Family Centre for them to join. To keep the child's location hidden on the app, go into settings and turn on 'Ghost Mode' and 'Hide Live Location', and ensure they know not to share their location with anyone.

### FAMILIARISE YOURSELF

Before you allow a child to download Snapchat, download it yourself and familiarise yourself with the app. Snapchat has produced a parents' guide to the app to help you understand how it works and any protections they have in place. A link for this can be found in the sources below.

### **BLOCK AND REPORT**

If a stranger *does* connect with a child on Snapchat and begins to make them feel uncomfortable through bullying, pressure to send explicit images or by sending sexual images to them, the child can tap the three dots on that person's profile and report or block them. There are options to state why they're reporting that user – such as annoying or malicious messages, spam or masquerading as someone else.

### Meet Our Expert

Dr Claire Sutherland is an online safety consultant, educator and researcher who has developed and implemented anti-bullying and cyber safety policies for schools. She has written various academic papers and carried out research for the Australian government comparing internet use and sexting behaviour of young people in the UK, USA and Australia.

### ENCOURAGE OPEN DISCUSSIONS

Snapchat's risks can be easier to handle if you nurture an open dialogue. For example, discuss My AI's responses to questions and how reliable they are. Talk about scams and blackmail before letting children sign up. If they're lured into a scam, encourage them to tell you immediately. Talk openly and non-judgementally about sexting, emphasising its inherent risks. Furthermore, explain how popular 'challenges' on the platform can have harmful consequences.

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
