Remember, personification is when you give a non-living object a human characteristic. See the examples below...

- The whiteboard <u>proudly displayed</u> its new ideas, hoping for applause.
- The clock <u>wawned</u> at the slow afternoon, dragging its hands in boredom.
- The books <u>huddled together</u> on the shelf, murmuring stories to one another.
- The desk <u>stood tall</u>, ready to support the weight of knowledge.
- The pencil danced gracefully across the paper, leaving its mark behind.
