Easter

Easter, which is also called or know as Resurrection Day, is a holiday that is celebrated every spring. Among Christians, it is a celebration of Jesus Christ being raised from the dead. Christians believe that it is the most important day of the year. Some people who are not Christians celebrate Easter as the beginning of spring. Many people attend a church service on Easter Sunday, even if they do not attend church. regularly thought it would be interesting to share some facts with you about this very special day:



- Easter is not held on the same date every year. This is called a moveable feast. Currently, all Christian churches agree on how the date is calculated. Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon which occurs on or after March 21st. This means it is celebrated in March or April. It can occur as early as March 22 and as late as April 25.
- The English word "Easter" is derived from Eostre, the name of the Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring. Her festival occurred at the vernal equinox. The French word for Easter, Pâcques, comes from the Greek word for Passover, which is the Jewish holiday that is celebrated at about the same time of the year.
- Though many used to eat lamb on Easter because it was celebrated near Passover, Americans began eating ham because it would cure over the winter and be ready to eat by spring.
- The tradition of wearing new clothes on Easter came from a superstition that said that if someone wore new clothes, they would have good luck for the rest of the year.
- ♠ The first chocolate egg was produced in Bristol, England, in 1873. Cadbury began making chocolate eggs in 1875; currently, Cadbury produces 1.5 million creme eggs per day.



Although their lives were often filled with sadness and their world was only as large as the distance they could walk, their inner worlds were bound only by their imaginations. Hungry for stories, these children devoured novels and poetry, history and fables. And with the gift of a group of toy soldiers, they were inspired to make their own tiny books ... a passion that would last them a lifetime.

Attendance

Please read the <u>NHS</u> 'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance which has further information if you are unsure whether to send your child to school or not. We are always happy to advise in line with this guidance, so if you are still in doubt, please contact the school office if your child develops any symptoms and we can discuss this further with you.



Children can come to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This includes general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose, or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above.

Please note, we can only accept and administer **prescribed medicines** that are in-date, labelled, provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include instructions for administration and dosage.

If your child arrives late, it is the responsibility of the adult to report to the school office and sign the "Late Book", giving a reason for lateness. This is important so that the school office knows your child is in school and can mark your child in in the class register. The class registers in the classrooms close at 8.55am when lessons start.

When reporting an absence, please could we ask that parents contact the school office <u>before 9.30am</u> and state clearly reasons for absence.



Following a significant increase in labour costs from Mellors (including rise in National Living Wage, National Minimum Wage, and increased NI contributions) we have been strongly advised to adjust the costs of school meals accordingly.

This means that from 28 April 2025, the cost of school meals for all children (except those in Reception/KS1 and those in receipt of Free School Meals) will rise to £3.00.

If you believe you may be entitled to Free School Meals, please a quick online assessment to see if you qualify.

Nursery

Our adventures in Nursery this week...

This week in Nursery we have enjoyed taking part in lots of Easter themed activities and crafts including decorating Easter eggs, making Easter cards, building wooden bunnies. We also reflected upon Easter is a time which celebrates new life and explored signs of new life. The children had fun painting their own chicks and watching clips of baby lambs at the farm.

The Nursery children have had a fantastic final session at Forest School. They helped the Easter Bunny find some chocolate that had been dropped, spotted Easter eggs hiding in different places and used their subitising skills to say how many they



could see, as well as decorating wood cookies and doing a range of Easter crafts. The children also learnt a new skill of how to use a hammer. They enjoyed learning about an old Japanese art technique called 'Hapa Zome.' The children showed great control and care when using the hammers and loved seeing the different colours and patterns appear on the fabric.

It has been an Easter fun-filled week as we have learnt all about the importance of this special Christian festival. We showed super teamwork when sequencing the Easter story and had fun acting some parts out!


It was then time to transform some very boring eggs into egg-travagant ones! We were very creative in the resources we chose and displayed enjoyed our masterpieces with each other.

During PE we practiced our football skills by listening carefully to instructions. We dribbled the ball carefully and then had to freeze placing different body parts onto the ball. It was lots of fun and got quite competitive!

It has been a wonderful end to a fantastic half term, we have worked very hard which has shown in the phonics quizzes we completed this week! Miss Alexander and all the staff are extremely proud of us – we are Reception superstars!

Year 1

This week, we've been exploring mass during our Maths lessons! The children have been learning to compare objects using the vocabulary "heavier" and "lighter" and have had great fun weighing different classroom items and discussing their findings. In English, we've started planning our own versions of Jack and the Beanstalk. The children have come up with some incredible different worlds in which the giant could live in. In PSHE, we've been learning all about road safety. The children practised how to cross the road safely, stopping, looking, and listening carefully. We have also completed our spider sculpture that we have created in Art. Finally, Year 1 and 2 had an amazing time at Peak Wildlife Park yesterday. The children were fascinated by all the animals, especially the polar bears, meerkats, wallabies, and penguins! We learned lots



of interesting facts, asked brilliant questions, and showed fantastic behaviour throughout the day. Well done to all! Have a wonderful break Year 1!

Year 2

We've had a lovely but very busy week in Year 2! In Maths, the children have been exploring capacity measurement. using metres and centimetres to measure all sorts of things around the classroom. In English, they've been using the iPads to carry out their own research on the Royal Family and have really enjoyed sharing their findings. We've also been busy in RE and PSHE, creating Easter cards and crafts, while in Music, the children loved experimenting with pitch and volume.

A highlight of our week was our trip to Peak Wildlife Park on Thursday. The children had a brilliant time walking around the park, spotting a range of and even feeding animals. wallabies - they were especially fascinated by a baby wallaby snuggled in its mother's pouch! We also saw a polar bear, which caused a lot of excitement. To finish the term, we celebrated the Tamil New Year, which falls on the 14th April. We enjoyed learning about the traditions and the importance of the sun in Tamil culture, and the children were delighted to take their learning outdoors. We shared some delicious Tamil food in the sunshine and had some lovely discussions about new beginnings and celebrations. It's been a fantastic end to the term, and we're so proud of all the children for their hard work and enthusiasm!

Year 3

This week, Year 3 have been busy exploring a range of exciting topics

across the curriculum! In English, the children have been planning their very own persuasive texts all about our wonderful school. They've been identifying fun and engaging aspects of school life – from our fantastic outdoor learning spaces to our creative lessons – to help persuade prospective parents that this is the perfect place for their children. In maths, we've been diving into the world of money, learning to identify different coins and practising how to convert between pence and pounds, a key life skill they've embraced with enthusiasm. Over in music, the classroom has been alive with rhythm as the children have been playing F major and A minor chords on the ukulele, keeping time to a lively Cuban beat. They've also been exploring the vibrant

movements of Latin dance, adding an extra layer of energy to their lessons! Lastly, a huge thank you to all the parents who joined us for our Forest School assembly! The children absolutely loved sharing their outdoor learning adventures with you. It was wonderful to see their pride and excitement as they showcased their experiences. As always, we're so proud of their hard work and enthusiasm.

Year 4



What a lovely final week Year 4 have had! In Maths, we've been exploring decimals and learning how to partition them. The children have shown great curiosity and enthusiasm when breaking down numbers and understanding how decimals work – a tricky concept they've tackled brilliantly! Over in English, we've been diving into a big question: *Is Banksy an artist or a vandal?* We've been investigating both sides of the argument in preparation for writing our own balanced discussions. The children have loved exploring Banksy's mysterious world and forming their own opinions. In Design and Technology, things have been extra delicious.

We've been designing, making, and evaluating our very own biscuits – and they didn't just look good, they tasted amazing too! It's been a brilliant way to combine creativity, teamwork, and a bit of baking magic. As we head into the Easter break, I'd like to say a huge well done to all the children for their hard work and positive attitude this term. Have a wonderful, restful, and fun-filled holiday – you've earned it!

Year 5

Despite it being the final week of term, Year 5 have continued to work hard and make great progress. In English, the children have enjoyed developing their tragedy stories, focusing on using different writing techniques to create atmosphere. Year 5's writing is now a joy to read! In PSHE, they concluded their 'Healthy Me' unit with a debate on whether the media and social media help motivate people to live healthy and safe lifestyles. The children used everything they've learned this term to present a well-rounded argument with supporting evidence.



The most exciting day, however, was Monday, when the children had a DT afternoon creating canapés! Split into three groups, they made 35 canapés each, including mini-bruschetta, bite-size omelette muffins, and Eton mess mouthfuls. The children worked hard to prep the food, always keeping food safety and hygiene in mind. After cooking, they got to taste their creations, which were a big hit! Shobnall's very own Master Chef, Mr Bishop, was on hand to sample the dishes and declared the Eton mess the most delicious, even going back for seconds!

Year 6

It's been a brilliant end to the half term in Year 6! In science, we've been investigating the question: Does moisture affect the speed at which mould grows on food? We used two pieces of bread – one damp and one dry – as part of our experiment. The damp bread was our independent variable, and we've been carefully observing and recording any changes each day. In maths, we explored the mean average, learning how to calculate it and solve problems where the mean is given, and we have to work out the original values. In English, most of us have now finished writing our recounts. I've been really impressed with the children's use of show-not-tell to express emotion and build atmosphere in their writing. Have a lovely half term! Have some rest but also remember bitesize chunks of revision so you are ready for your SATs which are eight days after you come back. Well done Year 6!

ATTENDANCE WHY IT MATTERS



Persistent absence means pupils who miss more than 10% of school every year.



For each additional day of absence between years 7 to 11, the typical pupil could miss out on an average of £750 in future lifetime earnings



Persistently absent pupils in year 10 and 11 could earn £10,000 less on average at age 28, compared to pupils with near perfect attendance

This rises to almost E20k less on average at age 28 for those who are severely absent



For employability over a sustained period, people age 28 were around:



Less likely to be employed when persistently absent



Less likely to be employed when severely absent

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about SEARCHENGINES

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Search engines are an integral part of everyday life – with Google alone processing around 100,000 searches every second. Search engines use algorithms to predict which results will be useful to us, though this can expose children to inappropriate content, misinformation and even scams. This guide explains the risks associated with search engines and offers practical advice to help safeguard young users online.

MANIPULATED SEARCH RESULTS

Although search engines take site reputation into account, trustworthiness isn't the main factor. Instead, they use algorithms that can be gamed via tactics like search engine optimisation (SEO), which is big business. As a result, users may encounter misleading content and low-quality commercial products that appear more credible than they actually are.

MISINFORMATION AND DISINFORMATION

Search engines index billions of web pages – and not all of them are factual or safe. Children might stumble across false information or even deliberate disinformation, especially when searching for trending topics or controversial issues.

ENGINES BEYOND GOOGLE

Even if Google's SafeSearch is enabled, children may use lesser-known search engines that don't have similar protections. Some of these alternatives are less effective at blocking unsavoury content – sometimes by design – making it easier for children to encounter harmful or explicit material. Parental controls may also struggle to detect and block these

FUNNY JOKES LILLEGAL CONTENT CAN SURFACE

Search engines are designed to retrieve content based on keywords – not to judge whether that content is lawful. As a result, even illegal or harmful material can appear in search results. Children might assume that anything found through search engines must be safe, just because they're so widely used. This misunderstanding can lead to accidental exposure to seriously inappropriate content.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT EXPOSURE

Although parental controls like Google's SafeSearch exist, they aren't foolproof, and search engines may bypass them. Young users may still see inappropriate images or content, especially in image searches, even though they may not be able to click on the results. Some niche search engines lack even basic filtering, posing further risks.

UNRELIABLE AI SUMMARIES

Al Overview offer Al-generated

CENSORED

Some search engines now offer Al-generated answers at the top of results. While these can be helpful as webpage summaries, they're not always accurate. There have been instances where Al summaries have presented false or even dangerous information, reinforcing the need for critical thinking.

Advice for Parents & Educators

AI OVERVIEW

ACTIVATE PARENTAL CONTROLS

While no parental controls tool is perfect, this software can help reduce the likelihood of inappropriate content appearing in search results. Use tools like Google Family Link to set search restrictions and monitor your child's browsing activity.

QUESTION AI-GENERATED CONTENT

While AI content is generated quickly and often appears legitimate, teach children that, just because an AI summary is well presented, it doesn't mean it's accurate. Encourage them to review the sources behind AI summaries and check the information with reputable sites or fact-checkers.

IDENTIFY AND AVOID ADVERTS

One of the ways search engines generate revenue is by showing adverts to their users. Sponsored search results are labelled, but they're not always easy to spot and can sometimes be malicious. Show your child how to distinguish between paid ads and organic search results – explain why some ads might be misleading or unsafe.

PROMOTE DIGITAL LITERACY

Encourage children to question the motivation behind online content and develop critical thinking, as not all sites can be trusted. Some deliberately misinform users in order to sell products or promote misinformation. Developing a critical mindset is one of the best defences against these tactics.



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
